**August 2013 – Present: Lieutenant, Watch Commander** – Shift operations commander for second watches East Precinct. Respond to major events occurring city wide and screen major incidents, arrests, and uses of force. Manage employee performance and personnel matters, conduct investigations of complaints and interact with the community and local press.
