SUBJECT: - Forced Labor on the Relief Line

:- The City Council, City of Seattle TO

Gentlemen:

The thirteenth article of the U.S. Constitution declares slavery or involuntary servitude, except as runishment for a crime, shall not exist within the boundaries or possessions of the U.S.

The one argument used by the reactionaries is of course, that no one can be compelled to work, but neither are the Releif Authorities under any obligation to furnish meal tickets that is relief, to the unemployed.

Their argument is a weak excuse, however, as we intend

to prove in this letter.

It is not the fault of the unemployed as a class, that they are unable to secure employment at a wage commensurate with present living standards. The government protects the owners of the machinery of production, who, through the ecenemic system in use, known as the "profit system", have because of the inherent contradictions of such system, thrown millions of workers out of employment. Since the government and its implements, the Army, Navy and police are used to prevent the workers who are the majority in number of the population, from producing and exchanging commodities that are necessary for the welfare of this numerical majority, that this government is responsible for the present situation and the government cannot, without repudiating the Constitution, demand that the workers labor without pay.

The government is, or should be, for the solving of this economic condition, if it cannot or will not, it has misrepresented its ability. If the government assists in the attempts to force workers to work for nothing except their board and clothes it is sponsering slavery, regardless of the amount of work performed, and therefore it is using its power to drive

the workers into slavery.

We oppose this in principle because our class interests are involved. If we work for nothing but our board and lodging, sconer or later the entire laboring class will be forced to do the same.

We, therefore, stand on this declaration; We will perform no work for less than Union wages, paid in cash. We also state that any worker who does accept employment at less than union wages, is actually helping to cut wages and aiding and abeting the policy of forced labor which is being inauguarating by the Relief authorities.

While such a worker may not be termed a "scab", during periods of comparative peace between employers and employees, in lines of work where labor is not organized, they are "scabs" when given the opportunity to organize, and refuse to do so.

We demand, therefore, that the City Council send resolutions to the Relief authorities in Seattle and Olympia for the action taken on their part of trying to force workers to perform involuntary labor.

We also demand, that the city council recognize our right to strike and peacefully picket all forced labor projects without

police intimidation.

We demand all work relief to be the thirty hour week six hour day steady work at trade union rates of pay. For those not employed, under the above conditions, unemployment and social insurance at the expense of the government and the employers.

Do you know that forced labor in the U.S.A. is unconstitutional? Below, is an exact reproduction of Article 13, of THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION U.S.A.

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a purishment for crime of the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States or any

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

One worker refused to sign this card on Friday, Jan. 11th until the sentence; "These conditions I hereby accept" were scratched off. He was then forced to sign the work ticket before getting his meal ticket. The worker answered, "I am willing to work for Union Wages, I will work but any answered, "I am willing to work for Union Wages, I

will work but only under protest, I am against forced labor!"

He was then asked, "Do you think I am getting Union Wages?"

The worker answered, "Well if your'e not, why don't you quit scabbing?"

Mr. Moore, Relief administrator in Seattle made this statement to the "Times" on January 10th, 1935; "Men who recieve their meals from the W.E.R.A. restuarant are given food tickets, which may be denied because of a persistant refusal to do a mimumum amount of work." Thus we have forced labor! In another paragraph he states, "A small cash allowance is made weekly to all homeless men." This is a lie! Workers do not recieve any cash allowance for work performed as the above ticket proves, excepting a few who receive \$1.00 a week for steady work and these are special cases.

Workers refuse to sign these work tickets! But if you are forced to sign these tickets, cross out these lines; "These conditions I hereby accept," This work therefore becomes, Involuntary Servitude, Then if you are forced to work, or lose your ticket, bring the work ticket to the Grievance committee of the Unemployment Council.

WORKERS! - Organize and demand union wages for all work performed! Cooks, waiters, shoemakers, barbers, and all other workers on the relief form committees of action and send delegates to room 217, The Mutual Life Blgd. Thursday evening at 6.00 P.M.

Plan Employment of 150 Men Each Day

Employment of 150 additional homeless men daily was planned today by WERA. Approximately 100 of the men will work on the Port of Seattle, under the direction of the chief engineer, and 50 will work on the improvement of Railroad avenue for the city of Seattle. The men will each work one day a week, in return for which they will get food, clothing, medical and dental attention.
