The Honorable City Council,
City of Seattle.

Concerning a new name for our water front street, known as Railroad Avenue, kindly consider our protest against the naming of this street as "Cosmos Quay".

And further; will respectfully ask you to consider the name of "Marine Way", - to extend from Spokane Street to Smiths Cove, presuming, that in years to come this street will be extended from Bay Street to Smiths Cove.

Further to be considered is, that this street will be a link in the Marine High Way, extending from Olympia to Blaine, and as such the names will be symbolic. The Marine Way sounds right as English is spoken on the Pacific Coast, - in contrast - "Quay" have very little usage here. Then again, "Way" - a word of very comprehensive signification, gives one the impression of expanse and distance, it leads some place, yet it doesn't end, where man meets man, and as "Marine"-Way where West meets East, in plain English let's call it the "Marine Way".
