Dear Councilman Massart:

This will reply to your request for a report and recommendations on a matter referred to in Council File No. 221809 regarding the keeping of bees in the City of Seattle.

It is noted from attached correspondence that Mr. R. W. Hinea, Manager of the King County Humane Society, has investigated the situation complained of by Mr. Robert H. Chase, 938 West 51st Street, regarding the keeping of five hives of bees by his neighbor. Mr. Hinea recommends that legislation be adopted requiring a permit and limiting the number of hee hives which could be maintained on a single lot to one hive. He further suggests that the permit be subject to revocation at the will of the Pound Master. In our opinion, the advisability of such legislation is seriously questioned. Although the suggestion to cut down on the number of hives has some merit, it is felt that in some areas several hives might be kept on one lot without creating a problem while on other lots one hive might be too many. The determining factor as to whether or not the bees become a nuisance to their neighbor seems to be the distance the hive is located from the adjoining lot.

We have discussed this matter with the Washington State Department of Agriculture Bee Inspector and it is his feeling that any reduction in the number of bees would further interfere with proper pollinization of fruit trees. He further stated that the keeping of bees is quite wide-spread throughout the city and any legislation adversely affecting bee owners would meet with considerable opposition. At the present time, the State Department of Agriculture requires a permit for the keeping of bees within this state.

Inasmuch as we have had so few complaints regarding honey bees and have been able to work out agreeable settlements in most instances, it is suggested that no action be taken toward the passage of controlling ordinances at this time. The State Bee Inspector has agreed to work with us in keeping the bee problems under control.

It is suggested that Mr. Chase be advised to contact our Division of Sanitation if he is troubled in the future and we will endeavor to aid him. Mrs. Chase has informed us that lately they have had no problem which is probably due to the bees becoming less active during this season of the year.

Dear Mr. Massart:

Upon receipt of your letter August 10, 1953, concerning the nuisance of "Bees" as reported by Mr. Rebert H. Chase of 938 W. 51, we checked the complaint in person.

Mrs. Chase pointed out where 5 hives of Bees were located on the corner property, owned by Mr. L. R. Lewis, 942 W. 51 and located on the Northeast corner of 11 Avenue and W. 51. Was unable to contact anyone at the home of Mr. Lewis. I left a card for him to call us regarding same.

It is my opinion that 5 hives of Bees, located on a lot 40' x 100', constitutes a definite hazzard to the children and the neighborhood. One single hive on this particular lot would be 80mm what of a nuisance.

It is also our opinion that 5 hives of Bees would produce around 150 to 200 pounds of honey per year. If so it would seem Mr. Lewis is making a profit by selling some of the honey and also creating an unfavorable feeling among the neighbors.

Referring again to File 221026 on the Bee question, you will note in the second paragraph a suggestion is made, if it is the wishes of the Council that an ordinance be passed to limit the number of hives on any one lot, giving the Poundmaster authorization to have such nuisance abated, please permit us to suggest that an ordinance be passed, placing the Bee question in the same category, as all animals or fowl, be by permit (section 7-8 of ordinance No. 81599, limiting the permit for one hive per lot, subject to revocation at the will of the Poundmaster.

We shall endeavor to sell Mr. Lewis on the idea of moving all but one hive of his bees, for the building of a better feeling of good will among his neighbors. Respectfully submitted,
