The year 1967 was unique in the sense that more public attention was directed towards crime and police than in any year of our nation's history. Numerous commissions, committees and organizations studied the crime problem in the United States and in local areas and published voluminous reports. In many respects this is in the best interest of the public, but a natural result has been some improper conclusions about the volume, extent and type of crime in Seattle.

The statistical portion of this report reflects a 44% increase in total Part I Offenses in Seattle. This statistic is accurate, but it is deserving of considerable analysis before conclusions are drawn. Part I Offenses are eight offenses which more than five thousand police agencies report theoretically on the same standards to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for Publication. These offenses were selected not because of their seriousness, but only because in theory they are the ones most completely reported to the police and occurring in sufficient number to have statistical value.

An examination of the actual figures as opposed to percentage shows that in 1967 there were 36,977 Part I Offenses reported to the Seattle Police Department; in 1966 there were 25,643. This is an increase of 11,334 offenses. An examination of this increase shows, however, that although the crimes against property (burglary, larceny and auto theft) shows a total increase, numerically, of 10,439, 7,178 of these offenses were larcenies. A further significant detail is that in 5,885 of these larcenies, the amount stolen was less than \$50.00.

In the crimes against person, there was an increase of only 895 offenses. The greatest numerical increase in these was in the field of robbery. Four hundred fifty additional robberies, including both armed and strong arm, were reported to the Seattle Police in 1967. This particular crime increase is of major concern because each armed robbery is a quarter of an inch away from murder. The figures not publicized in the F.B.I. report, however, reflect that in the crime of robbery, and indeed in all other crime, Seattle equals or exceeds the national average in the settlement of crime by arrest and charging.

Robbery is a unique offense in that it is a crime of number and percentage. The threat of these incidents is real.

It is apparent from a comparison of the 1967 figures with the population increase.

In spite of a 10% increase in population, the City of Seattle is deservedly safe. The population in 1967 were 19,419. Regrettably, the number of automobiles increased by 27%.

Mayor J.D. Braman and the members of the Seattle Police Department and the Seattle Police Commission have been that Seattle police department by retirement, migration and other factors. The present statistics show that the finest caliber of young men are still available.

A problem of continuing concern is the increasing number of relatively new community workers necessary to eliminate the threat to our young people.

The people of Seattle are becoming increasingly concerned with calls logged by the Police Department. This is an increasing problem, but there is an increasing patrol time available for the Seattle Police Department.

Robbery is a unique offense in that as happened in Seattle in 1967, a numerically small group of persons can account for a substantial number and percentage of offenses. A series of arrests will not only settle a large number of robberies, but more importantly will alleviate the threat of these individuals continuing their criminal careers in this community.

It is apparent from a detailed examination of the crime statistics that crime in Seattle, while it increased substantially, did not keep pace with the population increase. We still have too much crime in Seattle, but we are not in any sense involved in a "crime wave."

In spite of a 10% increase in the number of automobiles registered in Seattle and greatly increased population, the driving public in the City of Seattle is deserving of great commendation. In 1966 there were 21,139 traffic collisions reported to the police; in 1967, there were 19,419. Regrettably, there were two more persons killed in 1967 than in 1966. Seventy-nine persons were killed in 1967 and seventy-seven in 1966. Also the injury rate shows a slight increase from 6,894 in 1966 to 8,617 in 1967. When the vastly increased number of automobiles and miles driven on city streets are considered, this slight increase is amazing.

Mayor J.D. Braman and the City Council took unprecedented action in the calendar year 1966 by the creation of additional positions in the department and authorizing the greatest single salary increase ever given to members of this department. The result of these actions has been that Seattle police recruiting problems seem to have disappeared. In 1967 eighty-five members left the Seattle Police Department by retirement, military leave or other separations. A total of one hundred twenty uniformed personnel were added to the department. The present status of the police officer appointing list would indicate that those positions created in 1968 will be filled with the finest caliber of young men and women in this department's history.

A problem of continuing concern which carries over from 1966 is the involvement of juveniles with narcotics and dangerous drugs. There has been a great deal of effort at all levels (homes, schools, courts and the police) to determine the extent and the volume of this relatively new community problem. The Police Department has and will continue its full time assignment of the number of men and women necessary to either eliminate this dangerous problem or bring it to an irreducible minimum. It is heartening to see the community concern demonstrated by the involvement of many public, quasi-public and private agencies in attempting to cope with this threat to our young people.


The people of Seattle are turning increasingly to their Police Department for services and assistance. This is reflected in the number of calls logged by the Police Service and Communications Bureau. In 1966 there were 180,927 such calls, but in 1967, there were 216,548 calls. This is an increase of 20%. While it is true that the growing volume of calls from the public decreased in direct ratio the amount of patrol time available for police officers, it does indicate that citizens are actively aware of the closeness, the capabilities and the desires of the Seattle Police Department to serve the people of this community.

In 1967 it is vitally necessary that police efforts in community protection be directed sharply at areas most inimical to the public interest. For example, although the number of physical arrests in the City of Seattle did not increase in proportion to the number of offenses, the quality of arrests increased a great deal. There were no more arrests for public drunkenness in 1967 than there were in 1966, but there was an increase of 17% in arrests of persons subsequently charged with more serious offenses. The number of traffic arrests, both physical and by means of citation, remained almost constant or slightly below that of 1966. Officers assigned primarily to traffic patrol figured substantially in on-the-scene arrests for bank robbers, burglaries, assaults and other serious crimes.



As mentioned in an earlier report, the technique of using citations for non-traffic offenses for the convenience of the public and, of course, of the police show and increase. It is to be expected that this technique will be expanded in future years.

The Community Relations Unit of the Seattle Police Department has greatly expanded its scope of activities. While it is extraordinarily difficult to measure success or lack of it in the area of police-community relations, it is unquestioned that the channels of communication between all segments of our population and the Police Department remain open and are increasing in number. Objective surveys by a committee of the National Bar Association would indicate that every known technique and method of improving police-community relations is being utilized in Seattle.






**• ASSISTANT CHIEF ALSO SERVES AS COMMANDER OF PATROL**

The Police Department is responsible for the prevention of crime, detection and apprehension of criminals, and the safe movement of pedestrians and vehicles on city streets. The police force is distributed among three precincts with a total police personnel of 984 men and women with the power of arrest. It provides emergency ambulance service through the Complaint and Communications Bureau to anyone within the city, as well as radio facilities for effective police operation.
