The figures in Charlie and David sectors are correct; however, the shading on the graph does not accurately represent them.

Page 53 - "Traffic Enforcement by Division"

Under the column heading designated for "Patrol Bureau, South Precinct, 2nd Watch", the figure for "No Operators License" should read 870 instead of 970.

CHIEF'S MESSAGE
ANNUAL REPORT



This past year was highlighted by the stabilization of the crime index for the first time since 1972. Major crime in Seattle was unchanged in 1975, compared to 1974, while nationally the same crimes rose nine percent. This leveling off of the crime index reflects increased public awareness of crime prevention techniques, and also increased productivity by police officers. Seattle's crime prevention activities make us one of the most progressive cities in the United States, an observation that is borne out by the latest statistics. The most promising benefits can be seen in the fight against burglary. Seattle experienced a nine percent decrease in this crime compared to a national increase of seven percent. Auto theft also showed a marked decrease of seven percent. With the unified cooperation

of the criminal justice system, these trends in crime reduction will continue.

As Chief Justice Warren Burger of the United States Supreme Court has stated, the criminal justice system is similar to a tripod, with each of the legs representing a branch of the justice system; the police, courts and prosecution. I believe the criminal justice system can be better likened to a chair with four legs, with the corrections system represented by the fourth leg. Unfortunately, one often wonders whether the other legs are meeting their obligations to uphold the system. When one takes note of the sentences that are often imposed by our courts on violent, career offenders, it's difficult to maintain a respectful attitude. The recent finding of a Superior Court judge that a man who had fired a weapon at a police officer was really not attempting to wound the officer, but was attempting suicide believing the officer would shoot him, is illogical. As is the sentence given a man who attempted to fire a gun at point-blank range at another officer; a sentence which called for the man to serve 150 days in jail and participation in a half-way house probation program. These judicial actions are a mockery of the entire institution of law. Nevertheless, there is a growing realization that kid-glove treatment of violent offenders is not working. Many criminologists now accept the belief that certain punishment must follow criminal behavior.

On a positive note, the department accomplished some great things during this past year. We completed our conversion of our entire motor vehicle fleet from full-size to compact cars, a change that resulted in a saving of nearly \$260,000 in fuel, maintenance and operational costs without a reduction in either safety or performance capability.

We continued to see a steady decrease in the number of citizen complaints logged with the Internal Investigations Section. This trend began in 1973 when 326 complaints were filed, and continued in 1974 with 204 complaints made, and last year when only 187 complaints were filed. When one compares these figures to the total number of citizen contacts our officers have throughout the year it is appropriate to observe that policing in Seattle is performed on a highly professional level, second to none.

Internal

During 1975, 283 complaints alleging misconduct by employees of the Seattle Police Department were logged by the Internal Investigations Section. 92 of these complaints were civil claims and are being held inactive pending the completion of the claims process. One complaint involved an employee of another City Department and will be excluded from the balance of this report.

In addition to the logged complaints, 217 contacts with citizens were investigated by the Internal Investigations Section on a preliminary basis, resulting in either no indication of misconduct or were referred to line command for disposition. The Internal Investigations Section handled a total of 500 complaints and contacts during 1975.

Regarding the 283 logged complaints, 18 were received through the Ombudsman; 1 from the News Media; 5 from City Agencies such as the Mayor's Office, City Council and Citizen's Service Bureau; and 14 from outside agencies and citizen's groups.

A total of 33 complaints were received from the Black Community; 5 from the Indian population; 1 from the Oriental population; and 3 from other minority ethnic groups.

92 complaints involved civil claims for damages; 44 arose from traffic arrests; 58 from arrests other than traffic; and 15 involved employees off-duty.

Many of the complaints were composed of more than one allegation and were alleging misconduct by more than one employee. Therefore, the 190 complaints resulted in a total of 289 allegations against 453 employees of the Department.

Upon completion of the investigation, each allegation was classified into one of the following categories:

- a. UNFOUNDED - The preponderance of evidence indicates that the event described simply did not occur.
- b. EXONERATED - The preponderance of evidence indicates that the event described did occur, but the actions were lawful and proper.

VEHICLE FLEET

In 1975, the Seattle Police Department received national recognition for their operational knowledge on the "Compact Enforcement Vehicles". During the year, over 100 inquiries were received requesting information on the department's evaluation of the compact in enforcement operation.

In January 1975, a complete evaluation of the Compact Enforcement Vehicle program was undertaken by the Fleet Control Unit. It was determined that the original predictions, by going compact, of reducing fuel consumption by 50%, maintenance by 30% and accidents by 25%, were near accurate.

Prior to the transition to compacts, the fuel consumption for enforcement vehicles totaled approximately 624,000 gallons per year. The present consumption rate with compact enforcement vehicles is approximately 420,000 gallons. At the present price of gasoline this represents an annual savings of \$124,400.

All department vehicles are leased through the City General Services Department on a monthly rate per vehicle utilization. The compact over the full size sedan is leased at a lower rate due to a lower maintenance cost. With a 13% increase in parts and labor over the year, this still resulted in an annual savings of \$134,700.

The accident picture for this department since utilizing compacts has changed considerably. The average number of vehicular accidents per year prior to 1974 was 274. For 1975, the total number of accidents was 180 with total conversion to compacts not completed until August. The utilization of compacts was only one factor credited for this decrease.













1975 Fatality Facts

There were 46 persons killed in 46 fatal traffic collisions in Seattle during 1975. Of the 46 fatalities, 18 persons were killed in collisions of two or more motor vehicles; 13 in ran-off-roadway or hit-fixed-object type of collisions, and 15 were pedestrians.

Twenty-four (24) fatal collisions (52%) occurred during hours of darkness. Normally about two-thirds occur at night.

Ten of the 15 pedestrians killed were female. Six of the pedestrians were killed crossing at intersections; four in marked crosswalks.

Six persons killed were riding motorcycles. It is interesting to note, however, that there have been no fatal bicycle collisions in Seattle since 1972.

The two months with the largest number of traffic fatalities were April and November with six each. February was the only month in which there were no fatal accidents.

DEFINITIONS - PART I OFFENSES

(ALL DEFINITIONS AND CLASSIFICATIONS OF OFFENSES OR ARRESTS ARE BASED ON UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING STANDARDS NOT R.C.W. STANDARDS)

- 01.a MURDER AND NONNEGIGENT MANSLAUGHTER*** - The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

***JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE - Certain willful killings are classified as justifiable or excusable. In Uniform Crime Reporting, justifiable homicide is defined and limited to:
1) the killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty, or
2) the killing of a felon by a private citizen
A killing is not classified as justifiable or excusable on the basis of self-defense, action of a coroner, prosecutor, grand jury, or court.
- 01.b NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER - The killing of another person through gross negligence.
02. FORCIBLE RAPE - The carnal knowledge of a female forcible and against her will.
03. ROBBERY - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
04. AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.
05. BURGLARY - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.
06. LARCENY - THEFT - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another, without threat or force.

LARCENY BREAKDOWN

POCKET PICKING - The theft of articles from a person by stealth where the victim usually does not become immediately aware of the theft.

PURSE SNATCHING - The grabbing or snatching of a purse or handbag from the custody of an individual.

THEFT FROM PERSON - The grabbing or snatching of an article other than a purse or handbag from the custody of an individual.

SHOPLIFTING - The theft by a person other than an employee of goods or merchandise exposed for sale.

THEFTS FROM MOTOR VEHICLES - (except theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories) - The theft of articles from a motor vehicle, whether locked or unlocked.

THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE PARTS AND ACCESSORIES - The theft of any part or accessory attached to the interior or exterior of a motor vehicle in a manner which would make the part an attachment to the vehicle or necessary for the operation of the vehicle.

THEFT OF BICYCLES - The unlawful taking of any bicycle, tandem bicycle, unicycle, etc. (except from a Burglary, Robbery, Rape or Murder).

THEFT FROM BUILDINGS - The theft from within a building which is open to the general public and where the offender has legal access.

THEFT FROM COIN-OPERATED DEVICE OR MACHINE - A theft from a device or machine which is operated or activated by the use of a coin. (Includes theft from parking meters).

LARCENY MISC. - All thefts which do not fit the definitions of the specific categories of larceny listed above.

07. MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Examples are automobiles, trucks, busses, motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, etc.

DEFINITIONS - PART II OFFENSES

8. NON-AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - Any assault, or threat to assault, which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.
9. ARSON - Any willful or malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, church, college, public building or any building, ship or other vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft; contents of buildings, personal property of another, etc.
10. FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING - The making, altering, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true.
11. FRAUD - Fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
12. EMBEZZLEMENT - Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
13. STOLEN PROPERTY; BUYING, RECEIVING, POSSESSING - All offenses of buying, receiving and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.
14. VANDALISM - The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.
15. WEAPONS; CARRYING, POSSESSING, ETC. - This class deals with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as:
 - Manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons.
 - Carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly.
 - Using, manufacturing, etc., silencers.
 - Furnishing deadly weapons to minors.
 - Aliens possessing deadly weapons.
 - All attempts to commit any of the above.
16. PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE - This class includes sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as:
 - Prostitution.
 - Keeping bawdy house, disorderly house, or house of ill fame.
 - Pandering, procuring, transporting, or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc.
 - All attempts to commit any of the above.
17. SEX OFFENSES - (Except forcible rape and prostitution and commercialized vice.) This class includes offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like such as:
 - Adultery.
 - Incest.
 - Indecent exposure.
 - Indecent liberties.
 - Intercourse with an insane, epileptic, or venerably diseased person.
 - Seduction.
 - Sodomy or crime against nature.
 - Statutory rape (no force).
 - All attempts to commit any of the above.
18. NARCOTIC DRUG LAWS - This class includes arrests for violations of State and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.
19. GAMBLING - All charges which relate to promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling are included in this category.

DEFINITIONS - PART II OFFENSES (CONT.)

20. OFFENSES AGAINST THE FAMILY AND CHILDREN - This category includes all charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family and children.
21. DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE - This class is limited to the driving or operating of any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.
22. LIQUOR LAWS - With the exception of "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence", liquor law violations, State or local, are placed in this class.
23. DRUNKENNESS - Drunkenness was decriminalized according to the Revised Seattle Criminal Code effective December 3, 1974 and on a statewide level on January 1, 1975 per R.C.W. Chapter 70.96 A.
24. DISORDERLY CONDUCT - In this class are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace.
25. VAGRANCY - Persons prosecuted on the charge of being a "suspicious character or person, etc." are included in this class.
26. ALL OTHER OFFENSES - This class includes every other State or local offense not included in offenses 1 thru 25.
27. SUSPICION - While "suspicion" is not an offense, it is the ground for many arrests in this jurisdiction. Upon investigation, the person arrested is either formally charged or released. Those formally charged are entered in one of the Part I or Part II offense classes. This class is limited to "suspicion" arrests where persons arrested are investigated and released by the police.
28. CURFEW AND LOITERING LAWS (JUVENILES) - Included here are all arrests for violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such law exists.
29. RUNAWAY (JUVENILES) - This category includes apprehensions for protective custody as defined by local statute. Arrests made by other jurisdictions of runaways from our jurisdiction are included. Not included here are protective custody actions with respect to runaways we take for other jurisdictions.

MISCELLANEOUS DEFINITIONS

PRIMARY CHARGE

The most serious offense for which a person was detained or cited.

AUXILIARY CHARGES

Additional offenses for which a person was detained or cited.

INVESTIGATED AND RELEASED

Refers to those persons arrested wherein no formal charges are filed.

ADULT

Any person 18 years of age or older.

JUVENILE

Any person 17 years of age or younger.

REMANDED OR DECLINED JUVENILES

Applies to those juveniles referred to Juvenile Court wherein the court refuses jurisdiction.
