CHIEF'S MESSAGE

To a police officer, as well as those he serves, public service is more than just a concept, for when people need help it is to a police officer that they are most likely to turn. Unlike some service organizations, the officer responds immediately, not hesitating to first ascertain the status of the person in need. It does not matter whether the call for help comes from the young or the old, the rich or the poor, and the person need not meet complicated criteria to qualify as a recipient of aid.

Our priorities are often established and influenced more by the wishes of those policed than by any other single consideration. We are accountable to these people for our decisions and the consequences of those decisions, and our success depends to a great extent upon their support.

Guided by the philosophy that the police draw their authority from the will and consent of the people, that we are, in fact, drawn from their ranks, our department has redirected its law enforcement priorities in recent years. In an effort to become more sensitive to the needs of those we serve, to become more proactive, we have initiated many programs to assist in improving our communication with the public.

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Increased hiring over the past year and striving to reach a more equitable balance of minority representation are all part of that overall effort. Half of our new hires in 1978 were women or minority men and a dozen minorities were promoted to supervisory and management positions.

By effectively utilizing resources and enlisting community support, we have drawn the various neighborhoods that comprise Seattle into the fight against crime. We have broken down many of the barriers that have long existed between the police and the public.

Our Community Service Officer Program has been invaluable in that regard, taking on several responsibilities which allow our police officers to more effectively use their time. The CSO Officers have worked hard on the Commercial Burglary Reduction Program this year, and we expect that their efforts will help reduce the number of nonresidential burglaries in 1979. Because of efficient patrol work and the accomplishments of programs such as Community Crime Prevention and Block Watch, the rate of residential burglaries declined this year for the fifth year in a row.

Our newly inception Evidence Collection Project has trained officers so that we have increased both the quality of evidence and the frequency with which it is collected at burglary and rape scenes. Not incidentally, rape also decreased in 1978. Other programs such as the Anti-Fencing Project, Patrol Alarm, and the Hidden Robbery Camera, all of which require community involvement, continue to be effective.

In the latter part of the year we experienced changes in our shooting policy which resulted in much controversy. In reexamining our training in the application of deadly force, we developed an entirely new concept and the simulator now being used by our department is the only one of its kind in the nation. The interest it has generated in other departments would indicate that our initial estimate of its value as a training aid was correct.

Another technological advance which should greatly increase our efficiency is the new automated REPORT System, begun in September. When the system becomes operational in March, it will eventually eliminate the need to hand search police records for information.

The 15% increase in the Crime Index this year should not be perceived as totally bleak since many factors beyond our control, such as a 51% increase in murder, contributed to that rise. Since 1976 and 1977 witnessed respective Crime Index reductions of 13% and 4%, our crime rate today is actually no higher than it was two years ago and, as previously mentioned, the crimes of rape and burglary have declined.

I have been a police officer for more than a quarter of a century, and in that time I can truly say that I have found no department any finer than ours. I can only add to that statement that we are as good as we are because of you--the men and women of this department who make it work and make it responsive to the needs of the community it serves. Our fellow citizens can take pride in their police department and themselves for the efforts we have all made, police officer and citizen alike, to make Seattle the most livable city in the United States.



SEATTLE POLICE DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATION CHART DECEMBER 31, 1978






DISTRIBUTION OF STRENGTH BY BUREAU







INTERNAL INVESTIGATIONS SUMMARY, 1978

During 1978 the Seattle Police Department received 659,604 phone requests for service resulting in 226,136 dispatches of police units. Officers reported another 61,439 "on-view" incidents in which they initiated police action in the field without being dispatched by police radio.

The 1308 employees of the Department worked 2,280,888 hours of regular duty and 69,950 hours of overtime duty.

In addition, officers worked 22,000 hours of security work for the Seattle Art Museum during the King Tut Exhibit, 9,826 hours providing security at rock concerts and 12,266 hours providing security inside the Kingdome complex.

The Seattle Police Reserves, augmenting the sworn police force, added another 16,936 hours of voluntary service in a variety of functions.

There were 120,670 traffic citations issued, 15,093 ordinance citations written and 25,197 physical arrests made.

There were 762 complaints of employee misconduct resulting from employee/public contacts in 1978. Of these, 389 were settled by phone contact with complainant, 236 were referred to the employees' commander/supervisor and 137 complaints against 204 employees were judged serious enough to warrant a full investigation by the Internal Investigations Section.

The following disciplinary actions were taken on the 16 sustained cases:

Termination.....	1 employee allowed to retire
Forfeiture of time.....	62 days
Written reprimand.....	3 employees
Retraining.....	3 employees

The above listed disciplinary actions do not reflect the results of 31 cases which at the time of this report were still in the investigative, review or appeal process. At least 10 of these 31 cases are sustained complaints with disciplinary action or final employee appeal pending.

MISCELLANEOUS DEFINITIONS

JUVENILE - Any person 17 years of age or younger.

JUVENILE "ARREST" - The word "arrest" as it applies to juveniles is intended to mean the police handling of all juveniles who have committed a crime and are taken into custody under such circumstances that were the juvenile an adult an arrest would have been counted.

ADULT - Any person 18 years of age or older.

ADULT "ARREST" - The word "arrest" as it applies to adults is intended to mean the processing of all adults physically arrested, cited, or summoned.

DEFINITIONS - PART I OFFENSES

MURDER AND NONNEGLECTIVE MANSLAUGHTER*** - The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

*****JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE** - Certain willful killings are classified as justifiable or excusable. In Uniform Crime Reporting, justifiable homicide is defined and limited to:
1) the killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty, or
2) the killing of a felon by a private citizen.
A killing is not classified as justifiable or excusable on the basis of self-defense, action of a coroner, prosecutor, grand jury or court.

NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER - The killing of another person through gross negligence.

FORCIBLE RAPE - The carnal knowledge of a person forcibly and against his/her will.

ROBBERY - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

BURGLARY - An unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

LARCENY - THEFT - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another, without threat or force.

LARCENY BREAKDOWN

PICKPOCKET - The theft of articles from a person by stealth where the victim usually does not become immediately aware of the theft.

PURSE-SNATCHING - The grabbing or snatching of a purse or handbag from the custody of an individual.

THEFT FROM PERSON - The grabbing or snatching of an article other than a purse or handbag from the custody of an individual.

SHOPLIFTING - The theft by a person other than an employee of goods or merchandise exposed for sale.

THEFTS FROM MOTOR VEHICLES - (except theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories) - The theft of articles from a motor vehicle, whether locked or unlocked.

THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE PARTS AND ACCESSORIES - The theft of any part or accessory attached to the interior or exterior of a motor vehicle in a manner which would make the part an attachment to the vehicle or necessary for the operation of the vehicle.

THEFT OF BICYCLES - The unlawful taking of any bicycle, tandem bicycle, unicycle, etc., (except from a burglary, Robbery, Rape, or Murder).

THEFT FROM BUILDINGS - The theft from within a building which is open to the general public and where the offender has legal access.

THEFT FROM COIN-OPERATED DEVICE OR MACHINE - A theft from a device or machine which is operated or activated by the use of a coin (includes theft from parking meters).

LARCENY MISC. - All thefts which do not fit the definitions of the specific categories of larceny listed above.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Examples are automobiles, trucks, busses, motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, etc.

NON AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - Any assault, or threat to assault, which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

DEFINITIONS - PART II OFFENSES

ARSON - Any willful or malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, church, college, public building or any building, ship or other vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft; contents of buildings, personal property of another, etc.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING - The making, altering, uttering or possessing, with the intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true.

FRAUD - Fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

EMBEZZLEMENT - Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

STOLEN PROPERTY: BUYING, RECEIVING, POSSESSING - All offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

VANDALISM - The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, ETC. - This class deals with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as:
Manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons.
Carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly.
Using, manufacturing, etc., silencers.
Furnishing deadly weapons to minors.
Aliens possessing deadly weapons.
All attempts to commit any of the above.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE - This class includes sex offenses of commercialized nature, such as:
Prostitution.
Keeping bawdy house, disorderly house, or house of ill fame.
Pandering, procuring, transporting, or detaining persons for immoral purposes, etc.
All attempts to commit any of the above.

SEX OFFENSES - (Except forcible rape and prostitution and commercialized vice.) This class includes offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like such as:
Adultery.
Incest.
Indecent Exposure.
Indecent liberties.
Intercourse with an insane, epileptic, or venereally diseased person.
Seduction.
Sodomy or crime against nature.
Statutory rape (no force).
All attempts to commit any of the above.

NARCOTIC DRUG LAWS - This class includes arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

GAMBLING - All charges which relate to promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling are included in this category.

OFFENSES AGAINST THE FAMILY AND CHILDREN - This category includes all charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family and children.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE (DWI) - This class is limited to the driving or operating of any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

LIQUOR LAWS - With the exception of "driving under the influence" liquor law violation, state and local, are placed in this class.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT - In this class are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES - This class includes every other state or local offense not included in Offenses 1 through 23.

SUSPICION - While "suspicion" is not an offense, it is the ground for many arrests in this jurisdiction. Upon investigation, the person arrested is either formally charged or released. Those formally charged are entered in one of the Part I or Part II offense classes. This class is limited to "suspicion" arrests where persons arrested are investigated and released by the police.










PATROL CAR DISTRICTS

INDEX CRIMES PER 100,000 POPULATION 10 YEAR PROFILE




