Honorable Mayor and City Council
City of Seattle, Washington.

Gentlemen:

In conformity with Section 5, Article VII of the City Charter, I herewith submit statistical report of the business transacted by the Seattle Police Department for the year ending December 31st, 1930.

During the year of 1930 many new and modern devices have been added to the equipment of the department which were absolutely necessary to more efficiently cope with the modern law violator.

Owing to the recent change made in the matter of handling hospital emergency cases, the Police Department will be allotted more room in the Police Headquarters Building. This will be of great benefit to the department in that some of the more important divisions will be given larger quarters, and this will make it possible to place these divisions on a more efficient and up-to-date basis. We will also have room to establish a modern police school in the department which is a valuable and much needed improvement. This change also gives us more room for garage purposes, this being an urgent need to meet present requirements.

Due to the economic condition prevailing throughout the country, a much greater burden has been thrown upon police departments during the past few months; but I am pleased to report that Seattle has been kept practically free of crime of any magnitude. There has been, of course, some crime of a minor nature, but these violators, in the great majority of cases, have been apprehended and prosecuted.

The moral conditions in the city have received a great deal of attention, and I am satisfied that Seattle ranks foremost in comparison with other cities of the country in this respect.

Mayor and City Council - #2

(During the year of 1928 the Junior Safety Patrol was established throughout the school system of this City. This organization is functioning very efficiently. It has not only been the means of reducing traffic accidents among the juvenile population of the city to a very small minimum, but it has also had a very gratifying influence upon our younger generation in checking the tendency toward juvenile crime.) This is due a great deal to the younger generation's having accepted the responsibility of law observance.

The general conduct of the department during the year 1930 has been good. There have been instances when some members of the department have broken the rules and regulations, but where this has occurred, they have met with prompt disciplinary action. The general health condition of the department during the year 1930 has been the best recorded by this department for a great number of years. The time lost on account of sickness has been much less than any year previous.

(The traffic problem throughout the country has become one of the leading problems that every police department must face. In a compilation of traffic fatalities for various larger cities throughout the country during the year of 1930, we find that in only five other cities were there fewer fatalities than in the City of Seattle, which places us sixth in rank. The traffic system in the Police Department must be greatly enlarged as there appears to be a growing tendency among the people in general to disregard the rights and privileges of their fellow-man in the observance of the traffic code,) and, I believe, in order to overcome this situation it will be necessary to greatly increase the police traffic system in the near future.

Under new methods of instruction at the beginning of school in September, the number of reports, on drivers' failing to obey the Patrol, has been reduced.

(1000 Copies of Rules and Regulations for Members of the Patrol were printed (by compliments of the Northwestern Mutual Fire Association), and each Patrol Captain is required to hold a Patrol meeting at least once every two weeks at which time he must read these rules to his Patrol.)

May 15, 1930 the Lloyd T. Cochran Post and Auxilliary of the American Legion presented the Patrol with a standard silk United States flag.

Memorial Day 1000 members took part in the parade as a unit of the Police Department.

May 31, 1930 a picnic was held at Woodland Park for the Patrol, which was attended by 1200 members, and City, School and Automobile Club officials.
