

Persuant to RCW 29.27.060 and SNC Section 2.08.020, we have prepared the following ballot title for Initiative No. 28:

> "Should Seattle petition Congress to make more federal funds evailable to cities by eliminating expenditures for war in Contral America?"

new 29,27.060 directs the city attorney to prepare a ballot title for a city measure with no more than twenty words. It provides, in part, as follows:

"...(T)here shell...be printed on the ballot a concise statement posed as a question and not exceeding twenty words...containing the secential features thereof expressed in such a memor as to clearly identify the proposition to be voted upon..."

Accord: NOC 8 2.06,020. The ballot title above has precisely twenty words, and had been suggested by representatives of the Committee for Rescale Sentral America at a meeting with you on May 3, 1983. 

THE ISSUE

Between May 19 and June 11, volunteers in our city collected some 18,000 valid signatures on Initiative 28. The intent of the Initiative is to put the City of Seattle on record urging the Federal government to redirect to constructive domestic uses the funds currently being spent on military assistance to Central America.

The City Council now has three options with respect to Initiative 28:

- Enect Initiative 28 as an ordinance. This would require the Council to appoint
 a Citizens' Commission on Central America within 30 days. The Commission
 would monitor events in the region and suggest further actions to the Council
 and Mayor as appropriate to furthering the goals expressed in the Initiative.
- 2) Vote to put Initiative 28 on the September primary ballot.
- 3) Vote to put Initiative 28 on the general election ballot in November.

INITIATIVE 28 POSITION

The organizers of Initiative 28 request that the Council place Initiative 28 on the Movember ballot. From our point of view, a full vote of the people would have greater impact than simple enactment of the Initiative by the Council, and would generate wider discussion and awareness of the local impact of military spending in Central America.

No one who opposes Initiative 28 should take any satisfaction in keeping it off the ballot through City Council enactment. The Initiative is a strong statement on a controversial issue, and is written with some teeth in it. City residents deserve a chance to vote on it in November.

Paula Wilkinson of King County Records and Elections Divsions estimates that the cost to the City of Seattle of placing Initiative 28 on the ballot would be somewhere between \$200 and \$500, although such costs are hard to figure. As the Elections Division divides election costs among participating jurisdictions in proportion to the number of registered voters per jurisdiction, it would actually be cheaper to place Initiative 28 on the November ballot. The 1981 general election cost the City \$65,000, while the primary that year, with fewer participating jurisdictions, cost the City \$78,000. Since most election costs are fixed, the cost of adding a ballot issue would be miniscule.

MEMEFITS TO THE CITY

In the last three years, U.S. aid to El Salvador alone is almost \$1 billion, or \$4 per U.S. citizen. Calculating proportionatley, this means our aid to El Salvador has cost citizens of our city about \$2 million.

David Stackman says that the FY 82 Defense budget may have included as much as \$30 million in weste. If this manay were redirected to our cities, it would more than double all expanditures by all levels of government on public works.

In a February 1982 letter to Seneter Jackson, Mayor Royer wrote, "I do not believe the nation can afford to divert funds to the undiciplined expansion of our military. He in the nation's cities are told we must face hard choices. Let the Sefense Department face the same hard choices."

A large pre-initiative vote in November would give Mayor Royer a clearer and stranger mendate to premote a reallocation of federal revenues from military spending to programs that benefit the City of Seattle.



Schedule and Procedures for Consideration of Initiative 28

("Peace in Central America" Initiative)

Initiative 28 petitions were examined by the King County Elections Department in compliance with state law. They were found to be sufficient under the provisions of the Seattle City Charter.

The initiative was officially transmitted from the City Comptreller and received by the City Council on June 20, 1983. As discussed more fully later in this nameronder, if the Council changes to take action on the initiative it must do so within 46 days of receipt of the initiative. In this case August 4, 1983 is the last date for Council action.

If approved by the veters or the City Council, the initiative would require the the following actions from the City Council or the Physis:

- A. Convey a resolution to Congress which expresses the following:
 - 1) appealtion to the involvement of the United States in the conflict in tral America by means of military essistance to the governments of El Selvador, Guatamela and Handuras.

 - support for the settlement of conflict in the region through seguitiotions by all significant political forces in the region.
 - a request to congress that federal funds now being used to produce destruction in Contral America be redirected to services vital to the maintain of Southe.
- 8. The City Council shall converse a Citisen's Countseins on Contral America to monitor events in the region and to propose further actions to the Payer and city Council.
- The Major as President of the Noticeal League of Cities is requested to promote the substance of the resolution as the policy of the NJL.C.
- 8. The Mayor shall provide monthly reports to the public and fity Council on actions taken in support of the resolution with a special report on North 23, 1984.
