

Honorable John F. Miller,
Mayor of the City of Seattle.

Dear Sir:

On May 3rd, 1909 an ordinance passed by the City Council authorized the employment of forty additional men for service during the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, and the period for which these men can be retained expires on the twenty-sixth day of next October.

I would respectfully request that an ordinance be introduced and passed allowing me to retain these men at least two months longer. I think it is extremely unwise to dismiss them at that time, owing to the fact that at the termination of the exposition we will need them to clean the town of disorderly people; particularly on account of the fall migration of the yegg or hobo element which will flood the city at that time. Another argument that I wish to advance for the retention of these men is the fact that very few, if any, members of the department have received their annual vacation, which is allowed by the City Charter; and have also been working overtime and have been

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

under a constant strain for the whole four and one-half months. It would therefore be extremely unjust to deprive them of their vacation, which would be necessary if these additional men are removed October 26th, 1909.

I would also request that I be permitted to retain the detail of foreign detectives at least two weeks after the close of the Exposition. This last will not necessarily cause any extra expense, as from the allowance given me by the City Council for outside detectives I have been enabled to save enough to pay them for the extra two weeks. I simply desire the endorsement of the City Council in this action.
