To the Honorable Mayor and City Council,
Of the City of Seattle.

Gentlemen:

In compliance with Section Four of Article Seven of the City Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report for the year ending November 30th, 1910.

On assuming charge of the Police Department, March 21st, 1910, it was absolutely necessary to place into effect new measures in the interest of the public welfare. The first was to place a sergeant in charge of the "Traffic Squad", on duty at the busy street intersections; and on account of the increased traffic we were compelled to put additional men on this squad to care for same.

This was followed by establishing what is known as the "Flying Squad", being patrolmen with motorcycles stationed in different parts of the city ready to respond instantly to any call for police, which has a wholesome effect in discouraging the commission of crimes and misdemeanors. When a call for a police officer is received by the operator at Headquarters no time is lost before the message is transmitted to the station nearest the location given.
