Gentlemen:-

Herein please find October report from our Police Department on work in the liquor traffic.

Please note that \$8165.00 in liquor fines was put in our City Treasury; that 290 arrests were made, and that 47 cases are still pending. I am advised that this is the largest number of arrests and the largest total revenue from liquor cases that has been had in any one month in the City of Seattle since the prohibition laws have been in effect.

I also wish to call your attention to the fact that out of thirty-two indictments brought in by the Federal Grand Jury twenty-six were furnished them by the Police Department of the City of Seattle.

Also permit me to advise you that on Saturday last by reason of your Chief of Police having the Police Boat to work with your Police Department captured thirty-two cases of liquor that was being unloaded in the City of Seattle, and fines amounting to \$700 were imposed, which, together with the liquor, if the same were figured at its reasonable value, would total something over \$3000.

Allow me to advise you that I have an offer of \$4000 for the Police Patrol Boat; that I am advised by the present Port Warden that this boat will be of great value to him in his service as Port Warden, because of its being such a fast boat, and that it also can be used by the Police Department when occasion arises. I therefore will not sell this boat unless your Honorable Body desires that I should sell it.
