AN ORDINANCE adopting the compilation and codification of City ordinances of general application as the Official Code of The City I Seattle; repealing Sections 3.20.150, 3.20.160, 3.20.170, 3.20.180, 3.14.520, 3.14.550, 6.22.010, 5.78.010 5.78.070, 6.78.090, and 12A.28.080 of the Code, and amending Sections 12A.06.030, 25.04.500, 25.04.550 to correct errors, recodifying Sections 3.22.130 and 3.22.140 as Sections 3.20.090 and 3.20.100; and adopting a new Section 1.04.010 (Severability Clause) for the Code.

WHEREAS, the City Attorney has prepared a compilation and codification of City ordinances of general application and has recommended adoption thereof as the Official Code of The City of Seattle; and

WHEREAS, a copy of the proposed Official Code of the City has been on file in the Office of the City Clerk since September 19, 1980, as C.F. 289990; and

WHEREAS, on lecentro to the city Council held a public hearing after notice of such hearing had been published at least once in the official newspaper of the City not more than fifteen (15) nor less than ten (10) days prior to such hearing indicating that City ordinances of general application had been compiled and codified and that a copy thereof is on file with the City Clerk; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The compilation and codification of City ordinances of general application, passed and approved on or before November 19, 1979, through Ordinance 108635, filed with the City Clerk by the City Attorney on September 19, 1980, is hereby adopted as the Official Code of The City of Seattle to be known hereafter as "Seattle Municipal Code." Ordinances of general application passed and approved after November 19, 1979, and numbered from Ordinance 108635, are valid and subsisting law of the City. Such ordinances shall later be made part of the Seattle Municipal Code in the manner provided in Section 3 of this ordinance.

Section 2. In accordance with RCW 35.21.550 (Chapter 7, § 35.21.550, Laws of Washington 1965), copies of the Seattle Municipal Code shall be received in all courts and

Section 3. In accordance with RCW 35.21.560 (Chapter 7, § 36.21.560, Laws of Washington 1965), new, amendatory or other materials altering the Seattle Municipal Code shall be adopted by the City's legislative authority as separate ordinances, as provided by Article IV of the City Charter, prior to inclusion in the Seattle Municipal Code. After adoption of the Code, any ordinance amending the codification shall set forth in full the section or sections, or subsection or subsections of the codification being amended, as the case may be, and the same shall constitute a sufficient compliance with that provision of Article IV of the City Charter requiring sections to be amended to be set forth in full in the text of the amending ordinance.

Section 4. In accordance with the provisions of RCW 35.21.570 (Chapter 7, § 35.21.570, Laws of Washington 1965), adoption of the Seattle Municipal Code by this ordinance constitutes sufficient compliance with that provision of Article IV of the City Charter requiring that no ordinance shall contain more than one subject to be clearly expressed in its title.

Section 6. Code Section 12A.28.080, regarding false applications for City benefits, is inconsistent with later Ordinance 198814 regarding false applications for any governmental benefit. Section 12A.28.080 is therefore repealed.

Section 7. Code Section 12A.06.030 is amended to correct a cross-meference as follows:

12A.06.030 MENACING.

- A. A person is guilty of menacing when:
- By physical action he intentionally causes or attempts to cause another person reasonably to fear imminent serious bodily injury or death; or
- 2. By a present threat to another person subsequent to a history of threats or violence between himself and such other person, he intentionally causes or attempts to cause such other person reasonably to fear serious bodily injury or death.

- Section 8. Code Section 25.04.500 is amended by adding Appendix A thereto, as follows:

25.04.500 OVERVIEW.

Ġ

A. Policy Intent. It is the intent of the city that the SEPA environmental review process be implemented by integrating the consideration of environmental impacts with existing planning and decisionmaking processes. To the greatest extent possible, the mechanism for mitigating or preventing adverse impacts to the environment will be incorporated into present and future City ordinances relating to the affected element of the environment. The SEPA review process and the measures necessary to minimize or prevent adverse impacts are, therefore, not to be treated as a separate review or permitting process, but rather are to be employed as an integral element of the existing decisionmaking process.

B. Policies. In assessing the environmental impacts of a proposal and in determining the need for conditioning or denial pursuant to Section 25.04.190, the city official or authorizing agency shall utilize SEPA, all policies, guidelines and regulations adopted pursuant to SEPA, and shall use other environmentally related policies adopted by the City Council in the form of resolutions, codes, ordinances, regulations or plans identified in Appendix A and on file in the SEPA Public Information Center, and federal, state, and regional environmental quality standards.

Section 9. Code Section 25.04.550 is amended by adding there to Appendix B as follows: 25.04.550 VIEW PROTECTION.

- A. Policy Intent. Recognizing that:
- l. Part of what makes Seattle a unique city is its magnificent natural setting which combines greener, mountains, and water; and
- 2. Visual amenities and opportunities are an integral part of the city's environmental quality and contribute to community pride and prestige; and
- 3. The city is committed to preserving sites, improvements and objects which reflect significant elements of the city's cultural, aesthetic, social, economic, political, architectural, engineering, historical or other heritage and has designated such sites, improvements and objects as historic landmarks; and
- 4. It is the city's policy to encourage concentration of high density of high-rise development in the Central Business District (Western Avenue on the west, Yesler Way on the south, I-5 on the east and Lenora Street on the north), and that such development may obstruct views in many instances; and
- 5. The city has developed particular sites for the public's enjoyment of views of mountains, water and skyline and has many other public places where such views enhance one's experience; it is the policy of the city to:
- $\hbox{a. Reasonably protect views from such public} \\$  places; and
- b. Reasonably protect the view of certain designated historic landmarks.

B. Policies. Until such time , specific view protection policies are enacted by the city, it is the policy of the city that:

- 1. The city official or authorizing agency shall assess the extent of obstruction of views of mountains, water, skyline, and greenery by a proposed project from public places identified in Appendix B.
- 2. The city official or authorizing agency shall assess the extent of obstruction of views of historic landmarks designated by the Landmarks Preservation Board as having significance which, because of their prominence of location or contrasts of siting, age or scale, are easily identifiable visual features of their neighborhood or the city and contribute to the distinctive quality or identity of such neighborhood or the city; or they embody the distinctive visible characteristics of an architectural style, or period, or of a method of construction.
- 3. The city official or authorizing agency may mitigate such adverse impacts by measures including, but not limited to:
- a. Requiring a change in the height of the development;
- b. Requiring a change in the bulk of the development;
- $\mbox{ c. } \mbox{ Requiring a redesign of the profile of } \\ \mbox{the development;}$ 
  - d. Requiring view corridors;
- e. Requiring a reduction or rearrangement of walls, fences, or plant material;
- f. Requiring a reduction or rearrangement of accessory structures, i.e., towers, railings, antennae.

SUBCHAPTER ((##)) IV POVERTY PROGRAMS ((3-22-130)) 3.20.090 MAYORAL AUTHORITY.

The Mayor is authorized to prepare a comprehensive community action program for the mobilization and utilization of public and private assurces to provide services, assistance and other activities or sufficient scope and size to give promise of progress toward elimination of poverty or a cause or causes of poverty through developing employment opportunities, improving human performance, motivation and productivity, or bettering the conditions under which people live, learn and work and which will be developed, conducted and administered with the maximum feasible participation of residents of the city and members of the groups served; to conduct research and studies for the preparation of such community action program and for the continued evaluation of that program and component parts thereof while in operation, and to enter into contracts for such research and studies with funds available therefor; to receive, approve and review from time to time proposals from others for component parts of the community  $a_{k\ell} \epsilon \log_4 program and such other proposals as may be$ submitted pursuant to the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 (Public Law 88-452) or the regulations adopted thereunder or contracts made pursuant thereto, and to submit such proposals to the federal Office of Economic Opportunity or such other agency as may be required; to enter into such contracts on behalf of the city as may be authorized by ordinance with the United States or any of its agencies, the state or any of its agencies, any local governmental unit, or any private non-profit group, organization or corporation to receive and disburse moneys for the purpose of coordinating and carrying

out the community action program or component parts thereof; and, to conduct, administer or operate or contract to conduct, administer or operate such component parts of the community action program or other programs under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 as may be authorized by ordinance.

B. The full joint participation by King County is necessary and desirable to accomplish the objectives of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 and the Mayor is further authorized to take such action as he may deem necessary to assure such participation.

((3-22-130)) 3.20.100 ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY BOARD - MEMBERSHIP.

To assist the Mayor in carrying out the duties contemplated by Section ((3-22-130)) 3.20.090, there is established the Seattle-King County Economic Opportunity Board composed of twenty-four members, including the Mayor of Seattle, Chairman of the Board of King County Commissioners, Chairman of the Seattle-King County Youth Commission, President of the King County Labor Council, President of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, President of the Seattle-King County United Good Neighbors, and Superintendent of Seattle School District No. 1. The remaining seventeen members shall be appointed for two-year terms jointly by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board of King County Commissioners as provided in King County Resolution 28973, shall include a Seattle City Councilman, an elected official of a city or town in King County other than Seattle, a member of a rural or agricultural organization located in King County, the president of one of the institutions of higher learning located in King County, a superintendent of another school district in King County, and twelve other members representative of geographical areas and/or population groups directly knowledgeable and concerned with the social,

economic and institutional causes and consequences of poverty.

The Board shall elect a chairman and other officers and adopt such rules of procedure as are necessary to accomplish its purposes.

Section 11. There is added to the Seattle Municipal Code a new Section 1.04.010 as follows:

Section 1.04.010. The provisions of this Code are declared to be separate and severable. The invalidity of any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, chapter, title or other portion of this code, or the invalidity of the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Code, or the validity of its application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 12. The adoption of the Seattle Municipal Code is without prejudice to the rights of persons who have made permit, license, and similar applications and such other rights established by timely filing under ordinances in existence at the time of application and the rights and obligations of all other persons fixed under ordinances valid at the time are hereby preserved.

Section 13. The adoption of the Seattle Municipal Code is without prejudice to criminal charges pending at the time of adoption as to charges alleged under ordinances of the City valid at the time the acts or courses of conduct alleged took place.

Dear Mayor Royer and Honorable Members of the City Council:

The City Attorney requests passage of legislation, enclosed, adopting the 1979 Book Publishing Company compilation of general ordinances of the City (through those passed on November 19, 1979), as the official Code of Laws of The City of Seattle. General ordinances of the City reason and adopted after November 19th, although valid and subsisting the from such passage and adoption, will be added to the Code by periodic supplementation. The compilation has haratofore been placed on file with the City Clerk, and has been circulated to heads of City offices and departments for comment prior to adoption. Some comments have been incorporated into the adopting legislation as editorial corrections to the Code.

After adoption, corrections, deletions and additions to the general laws of the City Flould be made as amendments to the Code. It is contemplated that the Code will be supplemented at least quarterly.

We view the adoption of the Code as a substantial service to citizens, whose right it is to have a correct statement of the laws of their City readily accessable.
