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ORDINANCE 111141

AN ORDINANCE authorizing amendments to the agreement authorized by Ordinance 78355 between the City and the Seattle Historical Society, now known as the Historical Society of Seattle and King County, to allow the charging of fees for admission to the Museum of History and Industry.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. As requested by the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation and recommended by the Mayor in the materials attached hereto, the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is hereby authorized to execute, and the City Comptroller to affect, for and on behalf of The City of Seattle, an agreement with the Historical Society of Seattle and King County, substantially in the form of agreement attached hereto and designated Exhibit "A", which amends the agreement authorized by Ordinance 78355 and dated January 18, 1950, with the Seattle Historical Society, and allows the charging of fees for admission six days per week to the Museum of History and Industry.

Section 2. Execution of the amendatory agreement authorized in Section 1, hereof, and any other act pursuant to the authority and prior to the effective date of this ordinance are hereby ratified and confirmed.

AMENDATORY AGREEMENT

This amendatory agreement is entered into by and between The City of Seattle, a municipal corporation (hereinafter called the "City") and the Historical Society of Seattle and King County, a non-profit corporation authorized to do business in the State of Washington (hereinafter referred to as the "Historical Society").

WHEREAS, the City and the Seattle Historical Society entered into an agreement dated January 18, 1950, pursuant to Ordinance 78355 of The City of Seattle, to provide for the construction and erection of the Museum of History and Industry (hereinafter referred to as the "Museum"); and

WHEREAS, the Corporate name of the Historical Society is now the Historical Society of Seattle and King County; and

WHEREAS, the Historical Society has requested authority to charge fees for admissions six days per week to the Museum to pay for a portion of its operating costs;

WHEREAS, the City is concerned about the impact of traffic generated by the Museum on the surrounding neighborhood, and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein set forth, the parties hereto agree to amend that certain agreement dated January 18, 1950, between the City and the Seattle Historical Society as follows:

Section 1. Section THREE of said agreement is amended to read as follows:

THREE: The exhibition halls of said building shall be kept open and accessible to the public, at a minimum, from 12:00 P.M. until 5:00 P.M. on Sundays and legal holidays, and from 10:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. on all other days, and may be kept open and accessible to the public during such additional periods as may be established under such rules and regulations as the Historical Society, from time to time, shall prescribe.

Section 2. The second paragraph of Section TWELVE of the agreement is amended to read as follows:

In the event the Comparative Feasibility Study concludes that the Museum cannot be relocated or does not recommend such relocation, then the City will designate and provide on a non-exclusive basis on land adjacent to the present site of the Museum off-street parking consistent with the conclusions of the Museum Development Master Plan to be prepared pursuant to Section SIXTEEN of this Agreement, together with reasonable access between said parking area and the Museum, as well as Lake Washington Boulevard East.

Section 3. A new section, Section THIRTEEN, is added to the aforementioned agreement, as follows:

THIRTEEN: The Historical Society is authorized to charge fees for admission to the Museum every day such facility is open to the public except one day each week, which day shall be selected by the Historical Society; Provided, that:

a. Notice of such free admission day shall be conspicuously displayed by the Historical Society at or near the entrance to the Museum for at least one week preceding each such day;

b. Except as is otherwise provided herein, fees shall not exceed \$1.50 per person unless the admission is for a special exhibit not primarily drawn from the Historical Society's own collection and prior written approval of the imposition of an additional charge is obtained from the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation, in which event the total fees charged shall not exceed \$3.00 per person;

c. Children, ages 6 through 12 years of age, persons 65 years of age or older, and handicapped persons, shall be admitted for no more than 50¢, and for no more than \$1.50 for special exhibits, as identified above;

d. Children, 0 through 5 years of age, shall be admitted free of charge;

e. Members of the Historical Society may be admitted free of charge so long as the Historical Society extends membership without reservation to any person offering to pay the Historical Society's annual membership fee and conspicuously displays at or near the entrance to the Museum notice of such membership policy and the amount or amounts of such annual membership;

f. Organized groups of up to 40 students and their adult chaperones, teachers and guides, if any, shall be admitted for a special group fee of no more than \$10.00; Provided, that the Historical Society may adopt reasonable regulations regarding such group admissions, including daily limits, advance scheduling requirements and other regulatory matters.

g. The Historical Society, in accordance with rules, regulations or policies prescribed, from time to time, by the Historical Society and approved by the City Council by resolution, may license organizations of only a charitable or civic nature to use all or any portion of the Museum for a fee established by the Historical Society, provided that such licensure shall not extend on any occasion over a period of more than ten (10) days.

Provided, further, that the Historical Society's establishment of and/or variation of the fees authorized in this section, including decreases from or increases to the maximum amounts indicated, shall be preceded by written notice of such intended fee change to the City's Superintendent of Parks and Recreation at least two weeks prior to the effective date thereof, and the conspicuous display of a written notice

to the public at or near the entrance to the Museum regarding such intended fee changes, for at least one week prior to the effective date of such change.

The parties hereto reserve the right to change the maximum admission charges herein authorized, provided, however, that such change may be effected only after passage of a resolution by the Seattle City Council authorizing the same.

Section 4. A new section, Section FOURTEEN, is added to the aforementioned agreement, as follows:

FOURTEEN: The Historical Society shall comply with all applicable provisions of Ordinance 101432, as now or hereafter amended, as well as all other state and national laws prohibiting discrimination in employment with regard to race, color, ancestry, national origin, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, age, political ideology, or the presence of any sensory, mental or physical handicap. The Historical Society also shall not discriminate by segregation or otherwise against any person or persons because of age, sex, race, color, creed or national origin in furnishing or by refusing to furnish to such person or persons the use and accommodations, services, privileges and activities of the Museum; Provided, that nothing herein shall be construed to preclude the promulgation and application of reasonable rules and regulations of the City's Superintendent of Parks and Recreation regarding access to, and use of, the premises and facilities of the Museum. The Historical Society may recommend for approval and promulgation by the City's Superintendent of Parks and Recreation, under the City's Administrative Code (Ordinance 102258, as amended), such reasonable rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary for the operation of the Museum; and concurrently with the submission of such recommendation(s) to the Superintendent,

Administrative Code (Ordinance 102258, as amended), such reasonable rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary for the operation of the Museum; and concurrently with the submission of such recommendation(s) to the Superintendent, the Historical Society shall provide a copy of such recommendation(s) to the residents of the property within the blocks generally bounded by East Park Drive East and 24th Avenue East, SR 520, Montlake Boulevard East, and the Lake Washington Ship Canal, and marked with the letter "A" and outlined in red on the attached Exhibit "I", which is attached hereto and, by this reference, is incorporated herein.

Section 5. A new section, Section FIFTEEN, is added to the aforementioned agreement, as follows:

FIFTEEN: The Historical Society shall not cause to be used for Museum purposes any property within the blocks generally bounded by East Park Drive East and 24th Avenue East, SR 520, Montlake Boulevard East, and the Lake Washington Ship Canal, and marked with the letter "A" and outlined in red on Exhibit "I", which is attached hereto and, by this reference, is incorporated herein.

Section 6. A new section, Section SIXTEEN, is added to the aforementioned agreement, as follows:

SIXTEEN: No construction for any Museum building addition or other structural development or motor vehicle surface parking area for Museum purposes shall be undertaken by or on behalf of the Museum until after (a) the completion by the City of a Comparative Feasibility Study and (b) the approval by the Seattle City Council, by resolution and otherwise consistent with the provisions of Section TEN, hereof, of a Museum Development Master Plan. Said Comparative Feasibility Study shall address the issue of whether the Historical Society's Museum operations should be continued at their

development of motor vehicle surface parking area for Museum purposes shall conform with the approved Museum Development Master Plan.

Section 7. A new section, Section SEVENTEEN, is added to the aforementioned agreement, as follows:

SEVENTEEN: The Historical Society shall implement a Transportation Plan for each event that is estimated to attract 1,000 or more persons to the Museum in any one day, which Transportation Plan shall be developed in concert with the City Engineering Department, Traffic Engineering Division and after consultation with representatives of the residents of the area identified in the attached Exhibit "I" with the letter "A" and the City's Superintendent of Parks and Recreation, and thereafter updated, as may be reasonably required, from time to time.



THIRTEEN: The Historical Society is authorized to charge fees for admission to the Museum every day such facility is open to the public except one day each week, which day shall be selected by the Historical Society; Provided, that:

a. Notice of such free admission day shall be conspicuously displayed by the Historical Society at or near the entrance to the Museum for at least one week preceding each such day;

b. Except as is otherwise provided herein, fees shall not exceed \$1.50 per person unless the admission is for a special exhibit not primarily drawn from the Historical Society's own collection and prior written approval of the imposition of an additional charge is obtained from the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation, in which event the total fees charged shall not exceed \$3.00 per person;

c. Children, ages 6 through 12 years of age, persons 65 years of age or older, and handicapped persons, shall be admitted for no more than 50¢, and for no more than \$1.50 for special exhibits, as identified above;

d. Children, 0 through 5 years of age, shall be admitted free of charge;

e. Members of the Historical Society may be admitted free of charge so long as the Historical Society extends membership without reservation to any person offering to pay the Historical Society's annual membership fee and conspicuously displays at or near the entrance to the Museum notice of such membership policy and the amount or amounts of such annual membership;

f. Organized groups of up to 40 students and their adult chaperones, teachers and guides, if any, shall be admitted for a special group fee of no more than \$10.00; Provided, that the Historical Society may adopt reasonable regulations regarding such group admissions, including daily limits, advance scheduling requirements and other regulatory matters.

g. The Historical Society, in accordance with rules, regulations or policies prescribed, from time to time, by the Historical Society, may license organizations of a charitable or civic nature to use all or any portion of the Museum for a fee established by the Historical Society, provided that such licensure shall not extend on any occasion over a period of more than ten (10) days.

Dear Mrs. Williams:

The attached legislation amends the City's contract with the Historical Society of Seattle and King County to permit the Society to charge admission fees at the Museum of History and Industry.

The City's current agreement with the Historical Society was signed prior to the Museum's construction in 1950. The agreement permits the Museum to charge admission fees only three days a week. They have never instituted a regular admissions charge.

The Historical Society has requested that the City amend the agreement to permit fees to be charged six days a week.

The Historical Society has begun a program to upgrade the quality of the Museum. They are proposing a major increase in their operating budget to accomplish these improvements. The Museum's 1983 operating budget is \$543,526 compared to a 1982 budget of \$288,900. They have budgeted \$175,000 in revenues from admissions fees. In addition to obtaining revenue from fees, they have embarked on a major private fundraising campaign. They propose increasing membership and annual giving revenues from \$43,000 in 1982 to \$127,526 in 1983.

According to the City's agreement with the Historical Society, revenues from fees can be used only for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Museum. The Museum plans several activities to enhance the quality of its exhibits and educational programs. Additional funds from 1983 are budgeted primarily for staff. It is particularly important to the future of the Museum that we permit this fee to be charged this year. The Museum will be displaying a nationally renowned puppet show this summer, which will cost over \$80,000 to obtain.


I am proposing that we grant the Museum authority to charge \$1.50 for adults and 50¢ for children and senior citizens as a regular admission fee, to be increased to \$3.00 for adults and \$1.50 for children and senior citizens for special events. The proposed fees are in the middle range of admissions charges for similar facilities in other cities, as shown in Attachment A. The Museum projects total 1983 attendance at 166,666 compared to an actual attendance of 155,681 in 1982. In 1983, we project that these fees, plus donations from the first five months of the year, will raise \$197,500. This figure is based on a projected average monthly attendance of 6,667 adults and 6,667 children, with an increased average monthly attendance of 7,500 adults and 7,500 children for the puppet show.

The Montlake community has several concerns related to expansion by the Museum and the impact of large events on traffic in the neighborhood. The proposed agreement calls for a comparative feasibility study as well as a development Master Plan for the Museum to address the issue of whether the Historical Society Museum operation should be continued at their current or another site.

While I fully support the efforts of the Historical Society to improve the quality of the Museum, I would want the City to carefully review any expansion plans to make sure they do not have a negative effect on the park or surrounding neighborhood. MOHI has agreed to consider alternative sites for the Museum, based on a feasibility study to be carried out by the City. Among other sites we want to look at the possibility of housing MOHI at Seattle Center. MOHI has also agreed to prepare a transportation plan for any event anticipating over 1,000 people per day. Both the Montlake community and the Historical Society have indicated support for these proposed amendments to the agreement.

I request that the City Council consider and act favorably on this request at its earliest possible convenience.

ORDINANCE 111141

AN ORDINANCE authorizing amendments to the agreement authorized by Ordinance 78355 between the City and the Seattle Historical Society, now known as the Historical Society of Seattle and King County, to allow the charging of fees for admission to the Museum of History and Industry.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. As requested by the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation and recommended by the Mayor in the materials attached hereto, the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is hereby authorized to execute, and the City Comptroller to affix, for and on behalf of the City of Seattle, agreement with the Historical Society of Seattle and King County, substantially in the form of agreement attached hereto and designated Exhibit "A", which amends the agreement authorized by Ordinance 78355 and dated January 18, 1939, with the Seattle Historical Society, and allows the charging of fees for admission six days per week to the Museum of History and Industry.

Section 2. Execution of the mandatory agreement authorized in Section 1, heretofore, and any other act pursuant to the authority and prior to the effective date of this ordinance are hereby ratified and confirmed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor, and shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.
