ORDINANCE 111890

AN ORDINANCE declaring Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday a City holiday and amending Seattle Municipal Code (SMC) Subsection 4.20.190, (Ordinance 108481), SMC Section 3.10.010, and SMC Subsection 11.14.490, accordingly.

WHEREAS, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s life was dedicated to the promotion of social justice and racial equality for America; and

WHEREAS, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s life has come to symbolize the commitment of citizens in Seattle and throughout the country to the achievement of racial harmony, which promotes the general welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States has seen fit to commemorate the life of Martin Luther King, Jr., by declaring his birthday to be celebrated as a federal holiday; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Seattle Municipal Code Section 4.20.190 (Ordinance 108481) is amended as follows:

Employees, except ((as indicated herein and in the Salary Ordinance for the current year, and)) police officers and firefighters ((and supervisory and administrative employees)), shall be entitled to legal holidays as defined by RCW 1.16.050 and on Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday holiday which will be observed by The City of Seattle on the third Monday of January, or days off in lieu thereof occurring Monday to Friday inclusive without salary deduction ((;)). ((provided that those holidays falling on a Saturday shall be observed on the preceding Friday, and provided further that)) Employees hired for short terms of employment of thirty days or less shall not be qualified for holidays falling during their term of employment. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any employee whose compensation is set by a collective bargaining agreement unless the labor organization representing such employee agrees to be bound solely by provisions of this section with respect to the subject matter hereof. ((Fire fighters including Battalion and)) Deputy Chiefs in the Fire Department (other than those whose wages and hours are established by collective bargaining agreement) regularly scheduled for combat duty on holidays shall be granted time off in lieu of holidays at the rate of ((six eight)) four working shifts off duty with pay each ((per)) year, and, in addition, such employees working the 45.7462 hour average work week as of September 1st of any calendar year shall be credited with thirty merits for the ensuing calendar year ((.)), and such employees shall receive an additional sixty merits in lieu of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday.

(To be used for all Ordinances except Emergency.)

Section 2. SMC Section 3.102.010 is amended as follows:

All city offices shall open for transaction of business from eight a.m. to five p.m. of each day from Monday through Friday, except on days designated as holidays by RCW 1.16.050 and on Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday holiday, on the third Monday of January.

Section 3. SMC Subsection 11.14.490 amended as follows:

"Public Holiday" means Sunday, the first day of January known as New Year's Day, the third Monday of January known as Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Birthday, the third Monday of February known as Washington's Birthday, the last Monday of May known as Memorial Day, the fourth day of July known as Independence Day, the eleventh day of November known as Veteran's Day, the fourth Thursday of November known as Thanksgiving Day, the twenty-fifth day of December known as Christmas Day, and whenever any of the above-named public holidays fall upon a Sunday, the following day shall be the public holiday.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.

Subject: Costs of Martin Luther King Holiday

Earlier this week, you asked how much the new holiday honoring Dr. King would cost the City. The figure we have used is \$196,000. We developed this number by determining the difference between regular and holiday (overtime) wages for Police, firefighters, utility crews, and some DAS personnel who would be required to work. We also added the lost revenue from parking meters, and the cost to the Engineering Department overhead rate for paid absences.



Dear Mr. Rice:

I am submitting to you an Executive request for legislation to designate the third Monday in January as a City holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

As you know, the federal government decided to honor the contributions Dr. King made to this country by recognizing his birthday as a national holiday, effective in 1986. I am proposing that we, in the City of Seattle, commemorate Dr. King's birthday beginning in 1985. This approach is consistent with the action taken by the State legislature in the 1984 session, adopting Dr. King's birthday as a State school holiday.

The City has already taken one step to recognize Dr. King's contribution to social justice and racial harmony by renaming a street in his honor. While Dr. King's next birthday will not be celebrated until January, 1985, it is only fitting that the City take this opportunity to enact legislation making that date an official City holiday.

I urge your prompt attention and consideration of this proposal. I will file the legislation formally with the City Clerk's office as soon as interested parties have an opportunity to review and comment on the proposed legislation.

Section 2. SMC Section 3.102.010 is amended as follows:

All city offices shall open for transaction of business from eight a.m. to five p.m. of each day from Monday through Friday, except on days designated as holidays by RCW 1.16.030 and on Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday holiday, on the third Monday of January.

Section 3. SMC Subsection 11.14.490 amended as follows:

"Public Holiday" means Sunday, the first day of January known as New Year's Day, the third Monday of January known as Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Birthday, the third Monday of February known as Washington's Birthday, the last Monday of May known as Memorial Day, the fourth day of July known as Independence Day, the eleventh day of November known as Veteran's Day, the fourth Thursday of November known as Thanksgiving Day, the twenty-fifth day of December known as Christmas Day, and whenever any of the above-named public holidays fall upon a Sunday, the following day shall be the public holiday.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.
