In the early years of Seattle's history, major portions of our present park system were given as private donations to the City. In recent years, green belts have been donated, as well as major capital improvements such as the Snow Leopard Exhibit at the Woodland Park Zoo and the Pigott Memorial Corridor that connects Freeway Park to First Hill. And last year McDonald's Restaurant in Rainier Valley sponsored 100 free swim lessons for low income children. Many individuals have contributed funds to buy various small items, like park benches, or to adopt an animal at the Zoo, and others have donated hours of service.

This catalogue is designed to perpetuate the Seattle tradition of giving by identifying and publicizing potential community gifts. These gifts will help meet some of the current needs of our community. This effort is not meant to compete with others currently underway. We support them. Most important is giving to your community and making Seattle a better and more sensitive place in which to live. This catalogue presents a few ideas from the City. There are many other excellent causes, including the arts and cultural activities, health and employment services, and the food banks to which you can contribute. By contributing, your stake in the future of our community grows.



Thank you for continuing the fine tradition of giving in Seattle.



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
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**Pet License Certificates**      **\$25**  
(minimum)

Yearly licensing of pets may seem like a small part of pet ownership, but it can be a burden to our low income and low income elderly residents. Help lighten the load by purchasing pet license certificates.



**Drinking Fountains**      **\$2,000**

The original molds still exist for Seattle's traditional cast iron water fountains, so it is possible to purchase new fountains in this classic style. There are two types available: a standard model that comes with a child's step; and a pet model that comes with an animal drinking fountain in addition.

**"Help the Animal Fund"**

**\$25 (minimum)**

This fund was set up in 1977 to accept gifts and donations to promote animal welfare. Your contribution could help do a number of things. For instance, we could purchase special equipment or materials for the animal shelter, such as blankets and feeders for very young animals and animal carriers for the elderly. We could produce a video hotline for cable TV on lost animals as a supplement to our telephone hotline. Or we could produce public education material on caring and responsibilities of pet ownership. Help us reach some of these goals.


**Training Scholarships**      **\$100**  
(minimum)


**Bike Racks and Signs**




**Walls Murals \$5,000 (Minimum)**  
Commission art work for blank walls in high visibility locations downtown or in your neighborhood. Wall murals add color and spirit to our environment. Seattle wall murals are done in cooperation with and matched by funds from the Downtown Seattle Association and the Seattle Arts Commission.



**Seattle Center House Gallery \$25-30,000**  
Transform a portion of the lower level of the Center House, Seattle Center, into a Municipal Art Gallery. This exhibit will showcase art work from the City's public art collection, as well as other public and private collections.



Art makes Seattle a special place to live and work. Art adds spirit and diversity to our world. There is a great tradition of giving to the arts in Seattle. Some of our noted artworks were donated. Examples include the Sundial at Gas Works Park and the new Liberman Sculpture at Seattle Center. Please help us continue this tradition.



The Georgetown Steam Plant is in the heart of Seattle's Duwamish industrial area. From 1906 through 1977, it was operated to produce electricity during peak electric demand and during emergencies, such as when other plants broke down.

The Georgetown Steam Plant has long been nationally recognized as a significant historic landmark. With your help it can be permanently adapted for use as a living museum of industry, labor and technology.

This is an opportunity to become involved in the development of the Georgetown Steam Plant Landmark Center. People are already working on this project and need more help. An investment to preserve the Georgetown Steam Plant is an investment in Seattle's heritage.

The Seattle Public Library needs all kinds of books such as how-to books, magazine subscriptions, large print materials, popular classics, foreign language and popular fiction and non-fiction.



Reference sets such as gazettes, \$400-1,000 specialized encyclopedias, handbooks and statistical compendia, directories, indices, and multi-volumed dictionaries.



Our Library is one of the finest and most heavily used in the country. We have the highest per capita library use of any major city. People check out 4.6 million items and ask more than 1 million questions. Seattle Public Library has a strong tradition of receiving corporate and individual enrichment gifts. Help us continue this tradition.

**Library Equipment**

Help the Public Library with some of its special equipment needs.

**Enlarging Copying Machine**

**\$13,000**

The visually impaired would benefit from this type of copier which produces printed materials in large form.

**Microcomputer \$5,060**

Introduce the public to high technology. This computer will be for public use in the Library and provide an opportunity for "hands on" experience with computers.

**Northwest History and Valuable Book Room**

**\$50-75,000**

The Seattle Public Library was established in 1891 and since that time has acquired a valuable collection of Northwest books. Today, these books must be kept in storage. Funds are needed to construct and furnish a secure room at the Library for people to have easy access and enabling their enjoyment and use of this wonderful collection.

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
**Aids for Visually Impaired – “Visual Tek” \$2,500**  
Help the Library improve its ability to serve the visually impaired. Visual-Tek equipment enlarges print materials on a TV screen and makes reading easier for people with poor vision.




**Library for the Blind/  
Physically Handicapped \$3.5 million**  
We have no separate Library for the blind and physically handicapped, but the Seattle Public Library provides services to the blind, visually impaired and physically handicapped throughout the state.

**“Talking Books” Radio Service Receivers \$85**  
Provide the blind and visually impaired with FM reception of Radio Reading Service Programs. These programs, broadcast by the Washington Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, include reading books, newspapers, and magazines; and providing shopping news, information on food, medical facts, sports, television shows, etc.

**Carnegie Library Furniture Restoration \$40,000**  
Our turn-of-the-century Carnegie Libraries are part of our rich national heritage. Voters recently approved a bond issue that will help fund the restoration of seven of our handsome libraries. To complement this effort, help us replicate the original furnishings and enhance the interiors of these historic buildings.





**Project Share Contributions \$25 (minimum)**  
 Project Share is an Energy Assistance Program established by Seattle City Light and the Department of Human Resources in 1983. Project Share assists low income, high risk customers, who because of a temporary crisis are unable to pay their electric bills and are in danger of imminent termination of service. There is a great need for contributions because many more families apply than can be assisted.

Seattle's greatest resource is its people. We can boast a rich quality of life in our city because we care for each other.

Your contribution will help the City in its efforts to meet the needs of those with low incomes, single parents, the very old and the very young.

**Single Parents and Their Children**  
 Fifty percent of all the children in Seattle live with single parents. Many of these families face serious barriers to a successful livelihood, such as child care, employment and training, health and dental care, and child support. Your contribution will help us educate the public and employers about these problems and about actions they can take to help these families.

- **Educational Brochures \$250-2,000**  
 Help produce one or a series of brochures about the various barriers to a successful life for single parent families, with specific actions to correct these barriers.
- **Public Service Announcements \$1,500-3,000**  
 Produce a number of Public Service Announcements about the economic issues affecting single parents and their children.

**Produce Slide/Tape and Brochures on Selecting Child Care Services \$10,000**  
 Very limited consumer education programs exist to aid the public in selecting quality day care providers. This project will produce a public awareness program on the importance of quality child care and how to select a quality child care program. The project will consist of a slide/tape show for use at community meetings and a brochure to be widely distributed to the community.

**Video on Support Services Available to the Elderly \$20,000**  
 Many elderly, especially those with language barriers, have a hard time with day-to-day living. We have a good network of services. This project will produce a video tape explaining in simple visual form what is available and how to get it.




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**Immunization of Children \$10**

Your gift of \$10 will provide a complete set of basic immunizations for children unable to afford them due to limited resources.

**Dental Care for Children \$110**

Provide a year's worth of dental care for children who would otherwise not receive these services due to limited resources.




**Books and Toys for Health Department \$5-\$25**

There are a variety of basic health care needs that are not being met. Your contribution will help meet some of these needs.

**Senior Health Aids**

**Dentures \$1,000**  
**Hearing Aids \$ 300**

Purchase dentures or hearing aids for low income senior citizens who have no resources available for these items.



**Infant and Toddler Car Seats \$28-48**

There is a tremendous need among low income families for infant and toddler seats. Our Health Department administers a loan program which is completely privately supported to meet this need. A \$28 gift will purchase one infant seat good for children 0-1 year old; \$48 will purchase one convertible seat good for children 0-4 years old. The Health Department will also appreciate the contribution of any used infant and toddler car seats.



**Medical Aid Units \$35,000**  
 Purchase the Fire Department's next medical aid unit. These units are the backbone of our emergency medical system. They are used to provide life support services, CPR, and other types of aid in medical emergencies.




**Telecommunications Aids \$645 each**  
 The Police Department needs two telecommunication devices to aid the hearing impaired. About 82,000 persons in King County have impaired hearing or are profoundly deaf. A unit will enable the Police Department to communicate with the deaf in emergency situations. The Police Department currently has only one unit.

The safety of Seattle residents is a continuing priority. A number of educational tools and special technological devices will enhance our present efforts. Please contribute to our efforts to expand our public safety programs.

**Smoke Detectors \$10**  
 Smoke Detectors help save lives. A high percentage of our low income elderly, minority and handicapped population is not protected by smoke detectors.


Our goal is to provide 800 smoke detectors a year.



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
**"Hadrian"** \$90,000  
 Help the Police Department deal with dangerous explosive and hazardous materials situations. Hadrian is a remote-controlled robot that is used for explosive or hazardous material analysis and disposal.



**"Freddie" – Fire Prevention Robot** \$3,500  
 Fire prevention education for our children is critically important. Freddie will make a lasting impression. He is a marvel; he talks and hears, answers questions, and dispenses his own water.

Freddie will be featured in school assembly programs, at community events, parades and parks to promote fire safety.


**Prevention of Child Abduction** \$25,000  
 Produce a film for small children, starring Officer Friendly, on "situations to avoid." Child abduction is a growing problem. Our present film on this subject is 20 years old.



**Fire Hydrant Markers** \$3.50/marker (minimum 10)

Throughout many residential areas of Seattle, a small blue marker has been placed in the roadway to indicate a fire hydrant is located on the roadside. These markers are very beneficial in areas where there are few hydrants or where the hydrants are not easily visible from the roadway. Some areas need these markers, and in other areas the markers need replacing.





A legacy of the 1962 Seattle World's Fair, Seattle Center is the region's premier arts and entertainment complex. Landmarks such as the Space Needle and the monorail make the Center one of the Northwest's favorite destinations. Help us expand the Center's public service and programming potential.



**Children's Theatre \$500**



A show doesn't go by at Seattle Center that we don't receive one or more requests for temporary use of a wheelchair. Help us to better serve these needs.








**Aquarium Viewing Tanks**

**\$ 1,090 each**

**\$29,350 total**

The Seattle Aquarium is full of aquatic wonders everyone should be able to enjoy. But the "Adaptations," "Diversity," and "Fishes of Puget Sound" exhibits are shallow tanks only 30 inches in depth which reach only 41½ inches from the floor. This design prevents small children and wheelchair-bound individuals from being able to look directly into each display. We want to replace these with 42 inch deep tanks, which extend down to 29½ inches from the floor. This will help make the aquarium a wonderful recreational and educational experience for everyone.





**Gas Works Park Historic & Environmental Display \$7,500**

Gas Works Park is located on the site of a former gas plant established in 1873. A graphic display will describe the conversion of the land to a major park, highlight the historic and aesthetic features, and explain the significance of the gas plant structures which have been maintained as industrial sculptures. A graphic display will provide a great public service as well as valuable information.

**Swim Lessons/ Recreation Program \$10-\$50**

Sponsor swim lessons, recreation programs and day camperships for our low income youth. Opportunities exist to sponsor a child's participation in summer day camps, in recreation programs at community centers and in nature and wildlife programs at the Aquarium, the Zoo, Discovery Park and Camp Long.



Seattle has 234 parks, from urban wilderness to tiny treasures as big as your yard. Our parks include the Woodland Park Zoo and the Seattle Aquarium, as well as many community centers which sponsor all kinds of activities for tots to seniors.

Our wonderful Olmsted legacy of parks is entering its second century. Your donations will help us launch the second hundred years and make them as great as the first.

**Discovery Park Graphics \$2,500-5,000**

Preserving nature and emphasizing the compatibility of recreational and ecological use are the focal points of Discovery Park. The set of graphics will stress the theme of the park and the need to maintain an environment of high quality. Sites for displays include Shilshole Overlook, where the view includes the site where Captain Vancouver's party landed.



**Christmas Ship Donations**

**\$25 minimum**

Each year Seattle celebrates its seafaring heritage with a yuletide custom as colorful as it is appropriate. Thousands of residents of Seattle and nearby communities enjoy the beautiful Christmas ship during its five nights.

**\$25,000-\$75,000**


Children are not suited to playing in the rain. Covered play areas will provide safe, healthy outdoor recreational spaces for our children on those famous mild, drizzly Seattle days. They will be filled with a variety of equipment designed to keep toddlers to ten year olds active and content for hours. We envision a unique and attention keeping mix of traditional and modern toys to make first-rate facilities for our children.

In keeping with the recent 100th anniversary of the Seattle Parks and the efforts to preserve and enhance Seattle's Olmsted park system, we will design park structures in a way that sensitively recalls an architectural style that is similar to what was used in our parks years ago. Right now the City is developing new kinds of play areas that kids want and will use. We cannot give exact details of the structures or where they will be located, but this provides a contributor the opportunity to sponsor and help develop a special kids place. We are very excited about it. We hope you will join us.






### Community and Recreation Centers

**Plant Specimens** — Each of the five major exhibits (cactus-succulents, seasonal floral, orchids, bromeliads, and tropical flowering and ferns) will benefit greatly from additional specimens. Gifts starting at **\$100** will provide a significant enhancement to the collections.

The Seattle Conservatory is a true gem in our city's park system. Included in the Olmsted Brothers design for Volunteer Park and completed in 1912, this elegant and graceful conservatory provides a continuous and varied display of flowering and foliage plants from around the world. As wonderful as this gem is, it needs the polishing that the following gifts will provide.

**Seating Area** — There is no place to sit and enjoy the wonderful environment in the Conservatory. Seating can be accommodated with the appropriate furniture. A **\$1,500** donation will buy seating for the main exhibit spaces. Three hundred dollars will buy one seating area.

**Reference Materials** — Gifts of **\$10** and up will buy books for a small reference library at the Conservatory where visitors can learn more about the plants on exhibit or related topics.

**Plant Identification Tags** — The exhibit currently lacks small placards to identify the various plants. A **\$25** donation will buy five permanent placards to give basic information about the plant, its native habitat, environmental requirements, growth habits, etc.






**Big Toys**


Woodland Park Zoo is one of Seattle's best-loved public facilities.

Tremendous progress has already been made to remodel outdated exhibits and visitor services, but much remains to be done. You can help.



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


**Raptor Barn**      \$5,000-10,000



- There are many other pieces of the Asian Elephant Exhibit that individual gifts will fund such as aviaries, deer, and sun bear exhibits.





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ORDINANCE 112137

AN ORDINANCE relating to gifts to the City; establishing accounts and subaccounts in the General Donations and Gift Trust Fund to accept donations for the purposes set forth in the City's Gift Catalogue; and adding a new Chapter 5.78 to the Seattle Municipal Code.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is added a new Chapter 5.78 to the Seattle Municipal Code as follows:

Section 5.78.010. There is hereby established a "Gift Catalogue" account in the "General Donations and Gift Trust Fund" with subaccounts therein for the purposes set forth in the City's Gift Catalogue, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference; and donations shall be credited to the appropriate subaccounts. The City Treasurer is authorized and directed to accept donations for the purposes set forth in the Gift Catalogue and to give his receipt, and the City Comptroller shall keep appropriate accounts and subaccounts therefor.

Section 5.78.020. The Director of the Seattle Center is authorized to direct expenditures for the donations made to the Seattle Center programs in the City's Gift Catalogue as designated by the donor; and the City Comptroller is authorized to draw and the City Treasurer to pay warrants against the designated program account or subaccount on vouchers approved by said Director as to payee and purpose.

Section 5.78.030. The Seattle Arts Commission is authorized to direct expenditures for the donations made to

1 the Seattle Arts Commission programs in the City's Gift  
2 Catalogue as designated by the donor; and the City Comptroller  
3 is authorized to draw and the City Treasurer to pay warrants  
4 against said program accounts or subaccounts on vouchers  
5 approved by said Commission as to payee and purpose.

6 Section 5.78.040. The Director of Engineering is  
7 authorized to direct expenditures for the donations made to  
8 the Engineering Department programs in the City's Gift  
9 Catalogue as designated by the donor; and the City Comptroller

20 Section 5.78.100. The Chief of the Fire Department is  
21 authorized to direct expenditures for the donations to the  
22 Fire Department programs in the City's Gift Catalogue as  
23 designated by the donor; and the City Comptroller is  
24 authorized to draw and the City Treasurer to pay warrants  
25 against said program accounts or subaccounts on vouchers  
26 approved by said Chief as to payee and purpose.

27 Section 5.78.110. Disbursements from the Gift Catalogue  
28 account for the Georgetown Steam Plant Landmark Center program  
and other programs not provided for by this ordinance shall  
be made by separate ordinance.

1 Section 5.78.120. The Superintendent of Parks and  
2 Recreation is authorized to direct expenditures for the  
3 donations to the Department of Parks and Recreation programs  
4 in the City's Gift Catalogue as designated by the donor; and  
5 the City Comptroller is authorized to draw and the City  
6 Treasurer to pay warrants against said program accounts or  
7 subaccounts on vouchers approved by said Superintendent as  
8 to payee and purpose.

9 Section 5.78.130. The Director of Personnel is authorized  
10 to direct expenditures for the donations to the Personnel  
11 Department programs in the City's Gift Catalogue as designated  
12 by the donor; and the City Comptroller is authorized to draw  
13 and the City Treasurer to pay warrants against said program  
14 accounts or subaccounts on vouchers approved by said Director  
15 as to payee and purpose.

16 Section 5.78.140. Department heads are authorized to  
17 accept "in-kind" gifts and use the same for their respective  
18 programs as set forth in the City's Gift Catalogue as  
19 designated by the donor.

20 Section 2. Any acts taken pursuant to the authority and  
21 prior to the effective date of this ordinance is hereby  
22 ratified and confirmed.

1. A complete master-use permit application has been filed with the Director or

Section 4. Section 23.30.10 of the Seattle Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 23.30.10 Classifications for the purposes of this subtitle

All land within the city of Seattle shall be classified as follows:

1. No halfway house shall be established if it increases the number of halfway houses located on one thousand foot radius to more than five.

2. A proposed new halfway house, or the expansion of an existing halfway house, shall be permitted by the Director upon the following conditions:

a. The proposed expansion shall be consistent with the intent of the ordinance.

b. The proposed expansion shall be consistent with the intent of the ordinance.

c. Dispersal criterion for halfway houses not be counted as common recreation area.

4. Parking areas, driveways and pedestrian access for pedestrian access meeting the Washington Rules and Regulations for Barrier-Free Design shall be provided.
