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ORDINANCE 112568

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Parks and Recreation Department; approving a schedule of fees for the use of park and recreational facilities and services, authorizing special promotional and marketing activities, experimental rates, and the waiver or reduction of fees under specified circumstances, and creating a new chapter, Chapter 18.28, in the Seattle Municipal Code.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Effective January 1, 1986, there is hereby added to the Seattle Municipal Code a new chapter 18.28, as follows:

Section 18.28.010. Fee Schedule Established.

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to charge the fees set forth in the attached fee schedule, Exhibit A, for all uses of Parks and Recreation Department facilities identified therein, and to waive or reduce such fees, establish experimental rates, and engage in special promotional and marketing activities as described in Exhibits A and B and as conditioned in Sections 18.28.010 through -.040 hereof. All prior fee schedules are superseded to the extent inconsistent therewith.

Section 18.28.020. Special Promotional and Marketing Activities.

A. The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to undertake special promotional and marketing activities for the use of departmental facilities including but not limited to the Zoo, the aquarium, swimming pools, golf facilities, community centers, ballfields and tennis center and to reduce or waive fees in connection therewith. A waiver or reduction from the established fees for special promotional or marketing purposes shall comply with the following five criteria:

NOTICE:
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1. The waiver or reduction of the fee shall accord with sound management practices for municipal facilities of like character. It shall fulfill a declared objective furthering a departmental purpose such as acquainting the public with the facility or the service provided by the department thereby establishing or broadening public usage; reaching out to people who would not otherwise make use of the facility; or securing advertising, services or other benefits from a sponsor or those attending.

2. The promotion and the fee waiver or reduction shall appear appropriate to the City's facility. It should avoid the appearance of a City endorsement or approval of a private product, service, or activity; the use of public facilities for electoral purposes prohibited by RCW 42.17.130; or the granting of special privileges to a particular portion of the populace.

3. The promotion and attendance under the waiver or lower charge shall respect the use and enjoyment of the facility by people paying the established fee. In addition, those attending under the promotion should have an opportunity to use and enjoy the facility, without overcrowding.

4. Waivers or reduced fees shall be treated as special or extraordinary occurrences. Their frequency and extent, in aggregate, shall not have the effect of subverting the established fee schedule through a multiplicity of special rates or by inducing the public to anticipate and defer usage of a facility in order to take advantage of recurrent promotions.

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5. The opportunity in sponsor an arrangement under conditions set forth in Exhibit B, shall be made available to individuals, associations, and businesses, similarly situated, on an equal basis, in accord with and subject to the Superintendent's rules.

B. The circumstances when waivers or reduced fees are available shall be defined by rules promulgated by the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation pursuant to the Administrative Code, Seattle Municipal Code Chapter 3.02.

C. The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation shall provide the Budget Director and the Chair of the Finance Committee of the City Council notice of special promotional or marketing activities at which fee will be reduced or waived under this section at least ten (10) days in advance of their occurrence.

Section 18.28.030. Waiver of Fees for Individuals or Groups.

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation may waive or reduce an entry or use fee contained in the established fee schedule for an organization, association, group of individuals, or an individual, and authorize the supervisor of a facility to do so, irrespective of any special promotion or event whenever:

A. Such a waiver vindicates a constitutional right guaranteed by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution through its Fourteenth Amendment or Article I, Section 3 of the Washington Constitution;

B. The user, including but not limited to departmental advisory councils or societies organized to assist the Woodland Park Zoo or the Aquarium, the conservatory in

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1 Volunteer Park, the Arboretum at Washington Park, or horti-
2 cultural areas provides services or assistance to the
3 department in lieu of the fee that would otherwise apply, or
4 provides in-kind services or leaves improvements to the
5 facility that offset the reduced fee revenue;

6 C. The user is poor or infirm or is a charitable
7 organization assisting the poor or infirm, and charging the
8 fee would have the effect of depriving the individual of
9 reasonable access to the facility or of opportunity to
10 participate in a public event, and would cause hardship or
11 directly reduce the assistance such organization provides to
12 the poor or infirm;

13 D. The user is an organization serving the public or the
14 community, lacks its own facility as a result of a calamity or
15 other temporary distress, and there is a perceived moral obli-
16 gation toward the organization or its members at a moment of
17 crisis;

18 E. Another government requests use of the facility for a
19 public propose; or the use is granted under a reciprocal use
20 of facilities agreement with another municipal government;

21 F. Free admission to the facility furthers a departmental
22 purpose, e.g., the person is a volunteer for a department-
23 sponsored or co-sponsored event, participates in an athletic
24 event for public spectators, or enters in connection with a
25 work assignment or to assist a concessionaire or as a parent
26 or guardian to assist the department in the instruction or
27 care of a minor or ward;

28 G. The entry is under authority of law (e.g., governmental
inspectors, law enforcement officers, officials with subpoenas
who act in the scope and course of their duties) or under a
contract right or privilege; or

1 H. In the opinion of the Superintendent, the waiver or
2 reduction is in the over-all public interest due to extra-
ordinary facts or circumstances.

3 In determining whether a fee should be waived or reduced,
4 the Superintendent shall be guided by the benefit to the
5 public and the department when granting the request, the
6 frequency and amount of usage requested, the effect on an
7 fairness to other users, its consistency with policies
8 underlying the fee schedule and this ordinance, and the
9 consequences of denying the request.

10 Section 18.28.040. Experimental Rates.

11 With the concurrence of the Budget Director, the
12 Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to adjust
13 the fee or charge contained in the established fee schedule
14 for any particular facility on a temporary basis of up to
15 sixty (60) days in order to increase public attendance or
16 usage and the resulting revenues. Temporary rates may take
17 the form of special price during a special time, e.g., a
18 half-price rate for entry to a park facility during the final
19 hour before closing, a lower rate for children when half or
20 more of the allotted time for family or children's usage has
expired, or a two-for-one entry for a handicapped individual
and a person who accompanies and assists a handicapped person.

21 The Superintendent shall report to the City Council in
22 conjunction with the presentation of the department's proposed
23 budget, the department's experience with any experimental
24 rates during the preceding twelve months.

25 Section 2. Any act consistent with the authority and
26 prior to the effective date of this Ordinance is ratified and
27 confirmed.

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Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.

NOTICE:
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DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION
FEES AND CHARGES

AUTHORITY

Fees and charges are necessary to provide financial support to the Department of Parks and Recreation for the operation and maintenance of programs, facilities and park grounds. The revenue generated by these fees constitutes only a portion of funds required for operating and maintaining the Park System. All fees collected from Park and Recreation activities and concessions are used exclusively for the Park System, as these funds are deposited in the Park and Recreation Fund, not the City General Fund.

Fees and charges are proposed each year by the Department as a part of the annual budget process. Both the Mayor and City Council review and concur by legislation the authority for the Department to collect these fees and charges.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to establish a fee for requested uses not included in this schedule, keeping the Mayor and the City Council advised thereof. The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to revise or waive any of the attached fees when it is in the public interest or where it is required to avoid infringing on the first amendment freedom guaranteed by the United States Constitution or the Washington State Constitution. The attached fees are subject to change due to revisions in state taxes, City taxes or other unforeseen events.

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to approve variances to the fee schedule for special promotional and marketing activities as they may occur to enhance departmental programs. These include but are not limited to use of 2 for 1 coupons, 50% discount coupons and free admission days for children. The above may occur at various department facilities throughout the year.

The Seattle Department of Parks and Recreation is authorized to approve the free use of Department facilities by the Associated Recreation Council and recognized recreation advisory councils, and other organizations, open to the public, that further department goals and programs, when net proceeds are applied for park and recreation services.

In addition to the fees and charges identified herein, the user may be required to pay any additional department costs resulting from the user's request.

Five percent of the total time available on a monthly basis will be allocated to public service playing time. The specific times to be determined by the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation with the objective of making the public service time at the non-peak demand times as determined by actual use and demand for the facility. During non-peak periods public service times will be free.

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Block Time

~~Block time is available in quarterly increments and allows for the use of a court at the same time each week for a predetermined number of weeks. Payment is made in advance. Fall, Winter, and Spring times are calculated at the present doubles rate. Summer times are at singles rate. Specific dates of these quarters will be determined by the Tennis Center in advance of each offering.~~

Dear Councilmember Rice:

Transmitted herewith is the proposed Ordinance of 1986 Fees and Charges of the Department of Parks and Recreation.

The Department is proposing adoption of the 1986 Fees and Charges by ordinance, rather than resolution as in prior years, due to and in response to recommendations of the State Auditor.

Furthermore, we are requesting more formal authorization of the Superintendent's authority to reduce or waive fees in such instances that a fee reduction or waiver is granted in conjunction with special marketing or promotional activities; or is required to avoid denial of individual access to recreational opportunities for financial reasons. Whenever the Superintendent intends to reduce or waive fees for marketing and promotional events he will advise the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the City Council Finance Chairperson at least ten (10) days prior to the event.

Such authority has been previously granted and exercised in the adoption of Fees and Charges by Council Resolution and has been assumed within the general administrative authority of the Superintendent. The State Auditor, however, has advised that, in their opinion, either explicit Council action must be taken on each instance of a fee modification, or that the above described authority must be granted the Superintendent by ordinance.

The specific fee exceptions cited by the State Auditor's staff were:


- 1) inclusion of The Aquarium, Zoo and other 2 for 1 admissions in the Entertainment '84 and '85 coupon books;
- 2) a joint promotion between The Aquarium and the Campfire Girl Mint Sale program which offered 2 for 1 Aquarium admission; and,
- 3) the waiver of The Aquarium, Zoo and Japanese Garden fees for children on Kids Day, April 27, 1985

The summary of significant changes proposed in 1986 Fees and Charges is as follows:

1. Golf fees for all areas of play have been increased. The attached schedule reflects the changes that have been made for each category of play.
2. Tennis Center fees for indoor court fees and ball machine rentals have been adjusted to be closer to the prevailing market prices.

These proposed changes will more adequately reflect the minimum fee structures in the Northwest and still provide these public recreational opportunities at below the average market price. For 1986 all fees and charges include required taxes; however, tax amounts are not separately detailed.

Exhibit B

Examples of Promotional and Marketing Fee Waivers and Reductions

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to waive or reduce entry or use fees from those contained in an approved fee schedule in conjunction with the promotion and marketing of park programs.

Authorized activities include, but are not limited to, the following arrangements:

- (1) Sponsored days: A sponsored day or activity under which a sponsor pays the department a fixed fee, a matching amount, or supplies advertising, a service or other benefit and the department provides free public entry or use of the facility or the department provides free or reduced entry for a segment of the public (e.g. children under 12, senior citizens, anyone donating clothing or a can of food for a drive for those in need) or for a special group of the public (e.g., military personnel, Boys or Girls Scouts, participants in a community parade) or to the first entrants up to a specified number.
- (2) Bonus and prizes: The department may distribute to users or entrants an item supplied by the sponsor, e.g., a button, a balloon, literature, or an item of apparel, or donated a prize for an achievement.
- (3) Combination Tickets: A combination ticket for use of the City's facility or participation in a City event in conjunction with entry to another facility or event in which the combined prices are less than the amount that would be paid for each entry or event singly; the combined ticket shall expire within a proximate time after its sale or first usage; and the City and the other participant shall apportion the revenue from the combined sale by a ratio or formula. A combination may also take the form of a reciprocal discount or credit. For example, presentation of ticket stub or coupon from a Zoo in another City may entitle the holder to a credit on admission to the Woodland Park Zoo or the Seattle Aquarium when a receipt for paid entry to Seattle's Zoo or Aquarium entitles the holder to like privileges in the facility of the other City.
- (4) Discount Coupons: A coupon allowing two people to enter for the price of one person, or the coupon holder to a reduced rate. Coupons may be offered through a sponsor who makes a payment to the City or who provides special advertising in return. For example, the coupon may accompany an advertisement in a widely distributed publication for tourists, which contains similar coupons for other attractions. The department may also use coupons as a way of reaching out to a group or segment of the citizenry who would not attend or use the facility at the established fee.

- (5) Prepaid Passes: During special hours or otherwise admission may be sold to a tour company, the organizer of a convention, or an association at an aggregate fee for all members and the participants may be granted entry, either as a group or individually, at the hours or on the days authorized by presenting a ticket or other indicia of pre-payment.
- (6) Departmental Free or Half-Price Days: "Senior citizen's days" may be offered during which people over a minimum age are admitted free; a free day may be provided for the public to see and enjoy an exhibit financed through a bond issue or by a public fund-raising drive; or, on a "kid's day," admission may be free for children and when accomplished by the children, their parents.

The Superintendent shall include in or with the department's annual report a summary of the special promotions and marketing activities that were conducted during the year using a waiver or reduced fee.

Exhibit C

Examples of Circumstances for Individual or Group Waivers or Reductions

Waiver of Fees for Individuals or Groups. The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation may waive or reduce an entry or use fee or participation charge for an individual, and authorize a facility supervisor or attendant to do so, irrespective of any special promotion or event, whenever:

- (1) The individual is poor or infirm and/or fees have the effect of depriving the individual of reasonable access to the facility or of participating in a public event;
- (2) The individual provides services or assistance to the department equal in value to his or her admission or use or participation in the departmental activity;
- (3) Entry of the individual furthers a departmental purpose, e.g., the person is a volunteer at the event or facility, participates in an athletic event at which the public are spectators, or enters in connection with a work assignment or to assist a concessionaire, or as a parent or guardian to assist the department in instructing a minor or ward;
- (4) The entry is under authority of law (e.g. government inspectors, law enforcement officers, or officials with subpoenas who act in the scope and course of their duties) or is under a contract right or privilege, and/or
- (5) In the opinion of the Superintendent, the waiver is in the over-all public interest due to other extraordinary facts and circumstances.

ORDINANCE 112568

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Parks and Recreation Department; approving a schedule of fees for the use of park and recreational facilities and services, authorizing special promotional and marketing activities, experimental rates, and the waiver or reduction of fees under specified circumstances, and creating a new chapter, Chapter 18.28, in the Seattle Municipal Code.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Effective January 1, 1986, there is hereby added to the Seattle Municipal Code a new chapter 18.28, as follows:

Section 18.28.010. Fee Schedule Established.

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to charge the fees set forth in the attached fee schedule, Exhibit A, for all uses of Parks and Recreation Department facilities identified therein, and to waive or reduce such fees, establish experimental rates, and engage in special promotional and marketing activities as described in Exhibits A and B and

as conditioned in Sections 18.28.010 through .040 hereof. All prior fee schedules are superseded to the extent inconsistent therewith.

Section 18.28.020. Special Promotional and Marketing Activities.

A. The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to undertake special promotional and marketing activities for the use of departmental facilities including but not limited to the zoo, the aquarium, swimming pools, golf facilities, community centers, ballfields and tennis center and to reduce or waive fees in connection therewith. A waiver or reduction from the established fees for special promotional or marketing purposes shall comply with the following five criteria:

1. The waiver or reduction of the fee shall accord with sound management practices for municipal facilities of like character. It shall fulfill a declared objective furthering a departmental purpose such as acquainting the public with the facility or the service provided by the department thereby establishing or broadening public usage; reaching out to people who would not otherwise make use of the facility; or securing advertising, services or other benefits from a sponsor or those attending.

2. The promotion and the fee waiver or reduction shall appear appropriate to the City's facility. It should avoid the appearance of a City endorsement or approval of a private product, service, or activity; the use of public facilities for electoral purposes prohibited by RCW 42.17.130; or the granting of special privileges to a particular portion of the populace.

3. The promotion and attendance under the waiver or lower charge shall respect the use and enjoyment of the facility by people paying the established fee. In addition, those attending under the promotion should have an opportunity to use and enjoy the facility, without overcrowding.

4. Waivers or reduced fees shall be treated as special or extraordinary occurrences. Their frequency and extent, in aggregate, shall not have the effect of subverting the established fee schedule through a multiplicity of special rates or by inducing the public to anticipate and defer usage of a facility in order to take advantage of recurrent promotions.

5. The opportunity to sponsor an arrangement under conditions set forth in Exhibit B, shall be made available to individuals, associations, and businesses, similarly situated, on an equal basis, in accord with and subject to the Superintendent's rules.

B. The circumstances when waivers or reduced fees are available shall be defined by rules promulgated by the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation pursuant to the Administrative Code, Seattle Municipal Code Chapter 3.02.

C. The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation shall

provide the Budget Director and the Chair of the Finance Committee of the City Council notice of special promotional or marketing activities at which fee will be reduced or waived under this section at least ten (10) days in advance of their occurrence.

Section 18.28.030. Waiver of Fees for Individuals or Groups.

The Superintendent of Parks and Recreation may waive or reduce an entry or use fee contained in the established fee schedule for an organization, association, group of individuals, or an individual, and authorize the supervisor of a facility to do so, irrespective of any special promotion or event whenever:

A. Such a waiver vindicates a constitutional right guaranteed by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution through its Fourteenth Amendment or Article I, Section 3 of the Washington Constitution;

B. The user, including but not limited to departmental advisory councils or societies organized to assist the Woodland Park Zoo or the Aquarium, the conservatory in Volunteer Park, the Arboretum at Washington Park, or horticultural areas provides services or assistance to the department in lieu of the fee that would otherwise apply, or provides in-kind services or leaves improvements to the facility that offset the reduced fee revenue;

C. The user is poor or infirm or is a charitable organization assisting the poor or infirm, and charging the fee would have the effect of depriving the individual of reasonable access to the facility or of opportunity to participate in a public event, and would cause hardship or directly reduce the assistance such organization provides to the poor or infirm;

D. The user is an organization serving the public or the community, lacks its own facility as a result of a calamity or other temporary distress, and there is a perceived moral obligation toward the organization or its members at a moment of crisis;

E. Another government requests use of the facility for a public purpose; or the use is granted under a reciprocal use of facilities agreement with another municipal government;

F. Free admission to the facility furthers a departmental purpose, e.g., the person is a volunteer for a department-sponsored or co-sponsored event, participates in an athletic event for public spectators, or enters in connection with a work assignment or to assist a concessionaire or as a parent or guardian to assist the department in the instruction or care of a minor or ward;

G. The entry is under authority of law (e.g., governmental inspectors, law enforcement officers, officials with subpoenas who act in the scope and course of their duties) or under a contract right or privilege; or

H. In the opinion of the Superintendent, the waiver or reduction is in the over-all public interest due to extraordinary facts or circumstances.

In determining whether a fee should be waived or reduced, the Superintendent shall be guided by the benefit to the public and the department when granting the request, the frequency and amount of usage requested, the effect on a fairness to other users, its consistency with policies underlying the fee schedule and this ordinance, and the

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consequences of denying the request.

Section 18.28.040. Experimental Rates.

With the concurrence of the Budget Director, the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation is authorized to adjust the fee or charge contained in the established fee schedule for any particular facility on a temporary basis of up to sixty (60) days in order to increase public attendance or usage and the resulting revenues. Temporary rates may take the form of special price during a special time, e.g., a half-price rate for entry to a park facility during the final hour before closing, a lower rate for children when half or more of the allotted time for family or children's usage has expired, or a two-for-one entry for a handicapped individual and a person who accompanies and assists a handicapped person.

The Superintendent shall report to the City Council in conjunction with the presentation of the department's proposed budget, the department's experience with any experimental rates during the preceding twelve months.

Section 2. Any act consistent with the authority and prior to the effective date of this Ordinance is ratified and confirmed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.
