WHEREAS, the Seattle Landmarks Preservation Board has recommended the establishment of the Fort Lawton Landmark District; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Purposes.

FINDINGS

- A. The original military establishment known as Fort Lawton is unique to the City of Seattle;
- B. Discovery Park, for which the City of Seattle, on August 26, 1974, adopted a revised Master Plan of development (Seattle City Council Resolution #24675), includes parts of old Fort Lawton. These portions, located near and surrounding the Parade Grounds, retain an individual identity in terms of historical character and architectural unity representing turn of the century architecture of the Army Quartermaster Corps;
- C. The Secretary of Interior has placed the Fort Lawton Historic District on the National Register of Historic Places;
- D. The Seattle Landmarks Preservation Board (The Board) at a Public Hearing held on January 5, 1977, voted that the area shown in the attached map, which includes several buildings and the Parade Grounds at

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Fort Lawton, should be designated a City Landmark District based on the districts meeting criteria (1), (3), (4), (5), (8), and (9) of Ordinance 102229. On May 15, 1985, The Board voted to impose controls over certain buildings in the proposed Landmark District.

E. The Seattle City Council considered all proposals and alternatives relating to the Fort Lawton Historic District and Discovery Park and adopted Resolution 27329 on December 5, 1985, that approves a plan for the Fort Lawton Historic District in Discovery Park.

PURPOSE

The purposes for creation of a Fort Lawton Landmark District are to:

- A. identify and protect significant components of Seattle's history;
- B. assure compatibility between the Landmark District and the Discovery Park Revised Master Plan;
- C. develop review procedures for possible retention, relocation, alteration, demolition, or addition of structures within the District which may affect the historical or architectural integrity of the District;

Section 2. Boundaries and Description of the Fort Lawton Landmark District. There is hereby established the Fort Lawton Landmark District whose boundaries are particularly described as follows:

The Fort Lawton Landmark District shall be comprised of the structures and area outlined on the attached map which include the Parade Grounds and the Group 1 buildings, referred

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1 to on pp. 8, 11, of Fort Lawton Buildings, Mann, Millegan,
2 Morse & Ramsey, August 15, 1975, as an integrated historical
3 and architectural unit. The boundaries as delineated on the
4 map are not intended to imply a rigid division between the
5 landmark district and the balance of Discovery Park; rather,
6 they only establish a zone within which certain properties can
7 be protected with adequate buffer. Around and between those
8 properties the intended characteristics and open spaces of the
9 park should prevail.

10 Section 3. Powers and Responsibilities of Agencies

11 As they pertain to the administration of the Fort Lawton
12 Landmark District, the following shall be the powers, duties
13 and responsibilities of the named agencies:

- 14 A. The Superintendent of Parks. The Superintendent of
15 Parks is the principal authority in matters relating
16 to implementation of the Discovery Park Revised
17 Master Plan with the advice of the Seattle Board of
18 Park Commissioners on policy decisions relating to
19 fiscal budget priorities within the Park including
20 those within the Landmark District. The Superinten-
21 dent of Parks, with the advice of the Board of Park
22 Commissioners, shall have the primary responsibility
23 for managing and maintaining city-owned properties
24 within the District, for negotiating leases for oper-
25 ators of such properties where appropriate, and for
26 seeking uses where appropriate to occupy properties
27 within the District in conformance with adopted
28 guidelines. The Superintendent may seek the advice
and assistance of the Landmarks Board and staff in
the pursuit of any of those responsibilities.

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1 B. The Landmarks Preservation Board (The Board).

2 The Board shall review and grant, grant with
3 conditions, or deny, Certificate of Approval applica-
4 tions for structures subject to Landmark procedures
5 identified in Section 4 of this Ordinance.

6 C. Review Committee. A review Committee shall be estab-
7 lished to prepare a recommendation to the Mayor and
8 City Council for the disposition of Buildings 640,
9 642, 644, 670, 672, 676, 678, 903, 905, 907, and 909
10 and Montana Circle should the federal government
11 transfer the buildings and land to the City. The
12 Review Committee shall be composed of three members:
13 one member of the Landmarks Preservation Board, one
14 member of the Board of Park Commissioners and one
15 member to be appointed jointly by the Landmarks
16 Preservation Board and the Board of Park
17 Commissioners. Should those two bodies fail to agree
18 on the third member, that person shall be appointed
19 by the Mayor.

18 Section 4. Approval of Changes within the District

19 To carry out the intent and purposes for the establishment
20 of the Fort Lawton Landmark District;

- 21 A. All matters affecting the use and operation of City-
22 owned property within the District shall be approved
23 by the Superintendent of Parks with advice from the
24 Board of Park Commissioners.
- 25 B. Within the District, a Certificate of Approval shall
26 be required for:
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1. demolitions, alterations, additions, major repairs or any other proposed physical changes which may affect the exterior appearance of the following structures within the District:
 - a. the Administration Building (Bldg. No. 417); and,
 - b. the Post Exchange and Gymnasium Building (Bldg. No. 733)
 - c. the Band and Barracks (Bldg. No. 734)
 - d. the Civil Employee's Quarters (Bldg. No. 755)
 - e. the Guard House (Bldg. No. 759); and,
 - f. the Quartermasters Stables, (Bldg. No. 917).
 2. Any physical changes to the Parade Grounds that may affect the historical or architectural integrity of the District including but not limited to signing, landscaping, roads and parking lots.
 3. Certificates of Approval shall not be required for in-kind maintenance or repairs.
- D. If the remainder of the Fort Lawton property is transferred to the City of Seattle for development as part of Discovery Park:
1. A Certificate of Approval shall be required for: the demolition, alterations, additions, major repairs or any other proposed physical changes which may affect the exterior appearance of: the Officers Quarters Building (Bldgs. Nos. 640, 642, 644, 670, 672, 676, 678).
 2. Certificates of Approval shall not be required for in-kind maintenance or repairs.

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
3. A Review Committee shall be established to prepare a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council for the final disposition of the following should the property be transferred from the federal government:



Dear Councilmember Smith:

The Landmarks Preservation Board voted at its March 2 meeting to transmit to the City Council an ordinance creating the Fort Lawton Landmark District. The proposed ordinance establishes boundaries for the district, establishes a procedure for the preservation of physical elements within the district and provides for the administration and enforcement of the ordinance.

The Seattle Landmarks Preservation Ordinance (SMC 25.12) authorizes the board to transmit ordinances to the City Council for consideration. It is the board's understanding that the Law Department has also submitted an ordinance on this subject to the Parks and Public Grounds Committee for consideration and that an ordinance proposed by the board in 1978 (C.F. 287451) has not yet been acted on. The board requests that the enclosed ordinance also be forwarded to the Parks and Public Grounds Committee to be considered with the other proposed ordinances.

This ordinance would preserve seven buildings: the Administration Building (No. 417), the Post Exchange and Gymnasium Building (No. 733), the Band and Barracks Building (No. 734), the Civil Employee's Quarters (No. 755), the Guard House (No. 759) and the Quartermasters Stables (No. 916 and 917). The ordinance also establishes a Review Committee to decide upon the final disposition of the NCO Quarters Buildings and that portion of Montana Circle surrounding those buildings should the property be transferred from the federal government.

3. A Review Committee shall be established to prepare a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council for the final disposition of the following should the property be transferred from the federal government:

a. the NCO Quarters Buildings (Bldgs. Nos. 640, 642, 644, 670, 672, 676, 678, 903, 905, 907 and 909); and,

b. that portion of Montana Circle surrounding Bldg. Nos. 903, 905, 907 and 909.



- D. The Seattle Landmarks Preservation Board (The Board) at a Public Hearing held on January 5, 1977, voted that the area shown in the attached map, which includes several buildings and the Parade Grounds at

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Fort Lawton, should be designated a City Landmark District based on the districts meeting criteria (1), (3), (4), (5), (8), and (9) of Ordinance 102229. On May 15, 1985, The Board voted to impose controls over certain buildings in the proposed Landmark District.

E. The Seattle City Council considered all proposals and alternatives relating to the Fort Lawton Historic District and Discovery Park and adopted Resolution 27329 on December 5, 1985, that approves a plan for the Fort Lawton Historic District in Discovery Park.

PURPOSE

The purposes for creation of a Fort Lawton Landmark District are to:

- A. identify and protect significant components of Seattle's history;
- B. assure compatibility between the Landmark District and the Discovery Park Revised Master Plan;
- C. develop review procedures for possible retention, relocation, alteration, demolition, or addition of structures within the District which may affect the historical or architectural integrity of the District;

Section 2. Boundaries and Description of the Fort Lawton Landmark District. There is hereby established the Fort Lawton Landmark District whose boundaries are particularly described as follows:

The Fort Lawton Landmark District shall be comprised of the structures and area outlined on the attached map which include the Parade Grounds and the Group 1 buildings, referred

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to on pp. 8, 11, of Fort Lawton Buildings, Mann, Millegan, Morse & Ramsey, August 15, 1975, as an integrated historical and architectural unit. The boundaries as delineated on the map are not intended to imply a rigid division between the landmark district and the balance of Discovery Park; rather, they only establish a zone within which certain properties can be protected with adequate buffer. Around and between those properties the intended characteristics and open spaces of the park should prevail.

Section 3. Powers and Responsibilities of Agencies

As they pertain to the administration of the Fort Lawton Landmark District, the following shall be the powers, duties and responsibilities of the named agencies:

- A. The Superintendent of Parks. The Superintendent of Parks is the principal authority in matters relating to implementation of the Discovery Park Revised Master Plan with the advice of the Seattle Board of Park Commissioners on policy decisions relating to fiscal budget priorities within the Park including those within the Landmark District. The Superintendent of Parks, with the advice of the Board of Park Commissioners, shall have the primary responsibility for managing and maintaining city-owned properties within the District, for negotiating leases for operators of such properties where appropriate, and for seeking uses where appropriate to occupy properties within the District in conformance with adopted guidelines. The Superintendent may seek the advice and assistance of the Landmarks Board and staff in the pursuit of any of those responsibilities.

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B. The Landmarks Preservation Board (The Board).
The Board shall review and grant, grant with conditions, or deny, Certificate of Approval applications for structures subject to Landmark procedures identified in Section 4 of this Ordinance.

C. Review Committee. A review Committee shall be established to prepare a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council for the disposition of Buildings 640, 642, 644, 670, 672, 676, 678, 903, 905, 907, and 909 and Montana Circle should the federal government transfer the buildings and land to the City. The Review Committee shall be composed of three members: one member of the Landmarks Preservation Board, one member of the Board of Park Commissioners and one member to be appointed jointly by the Landmarks Preservation Board and the Board of Park Commissioners. Should those two bodies fail to agree on the third member, that person shall be appointed by the Mayor.

Section 4. Approval of Changes within the District
To carry out the intent and purposes for the establishment of the Fort Lawton Landmark District;

- A. All matters affecting the use and operation of City-owned property within the District shall be approved by the Superintendent of Parks with advice from the Board of Park Commissioners.
- B. Within the District, a Certificate of Approval shall be required for:

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1. demolitions, alterations, additions, major repairs or any other proposed physical changes which may affect the exterior appearance of the following structures within the District:
 - a. the Administration Building (Bldg. No. 417); and,
 - b. the Post Exchange and Gymnasium Building (Bldg. No. 733)
 - c. the Band and Barracks (Bldg. No. 734)
 - d. the Civil Employee's Quarters (Bldg. No. 755)
 - e. the Guard House (Bldg. No. 759); and.
 - f. the Quartermasters Stables, (Bldg. No. 917).
2. Any physical changes to the Parade Grounds that may affect the historical or architectural integrity of the District including but not limited to signing, landscaping, roads and parking lots.
3. Certificates of Approval shall not be required for in-kind maintenance or repairs.
- D. If the remainder of the Fort Lawton property is transferred to the City of Seattle for development as part of Discovery Park:
 1. A Certificate of Approval shall be required for: the demolition, alterations, additions, major repairs or any other proposed physical changes which may affect the exterior appearance of: the Officers Quarters Building (Bldgs. Nos. 640, 642, 644, 670, 672, 676, 678).
 2. Certificater of Approval shall not be required for in-kind maintenance or repairs.

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3. A Review Committee shall be established to prepare a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council for the final disposition of the following should the property be transferred from the federal government:

- a. the NCO Quarters Buildings (Bldgs. Nos. 640, 642, 644, 670, 672, 676, 678, 903, 905, 907 and 909); and,
- b. that portion of Montana Circle surrounding Bldg. Nos. 903, 905, 907 and 909.
