WHEREAS, Resolution 30020, adopted by the Seattle City Council on October 11, 1999, authorized The City of Seattle to submit a grant application to the United States Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice for financial assistance made available under the COMPASS Initiative; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Justice recently notified The City of Seattle that federal grant funds in the amount of \$625,000 had been approved for the period covering February 1, 2000 to January 31, 2001; Now, Therefore,

### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. As requested by the Director of the Strategic Planning Office, the Director or her designee is authorized to execute for and on behalf of The City of Seattle, an agreement with the United States Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice for financial assistance in the amount of Six Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$625,000) under the 2000 COMPASS Initiative to enhance public safety through mapping, planning, and analysis technologies. The funds, when received, are hereby accepted, and shall be deposited to the credit of the Supplemental Appropriations Account of Emergency Subfund to reimburse for the appropriation made in Section 2.

Section 2. To carry out the purpose of the grant agreement authorized in Section 1, and contingent upon the execution of that agreement, the following program categories in the 2000 budget of the Strategic Planning Office are increased as follows:

Section 4. The foregoing appropriations are made to meet actual necessary expenditures of the City for which no appropriation has been made due to causes which could not reasonably have been foreseen at the time of the making of the 2000 Budget; now, therefore, in accordance with RCW

Legislation Title: An ordinance relating to the 2000 COMPASS Initiative, authorizing the execution of an agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice for financial assistance in the amount of Six Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$625,000) to enhance public safety through mapping, planning, and analysis technologies; accepting the money when received; increasing the 2000 Budget of the Strategic Planning Office by making reimbursable appropriations; adding positions (of which some will be exempt from Civil Service) in the Strategic Planning Office; and ratifying and confirming prior acts; all by a three-fourths vote of the City Council.

Summary of the Legislation: This legislation increases the 2000 Budget of the Strategic Planning Office in the amount of \$625,000 and creates three new positions to carry out the activities specified in the grant agreement.

Background (Include justification for the legislation and funding history, if applicable): Resolution 30020, adopted by the City Council on October 11, 1999, authorizes the City to apply for these grant funds. This is the first year that the National Institute of Justice selected a U.S. city to be the demonstration site for the COMPASS initiative. Seattle competed with other cities to be the first site selected. This initiative is the next step in the City of Seattle's commitment to a fully integrated government services model which uses timely and accurate data to understand and respond to public safety problems.

Public Private Partnership Review Status: (Is the project referenced in the legislation subject to P4 review? If yes, identify P4 review to date.) Not applicable.

Is the legislation subject to public hearing requirements? (If yes, what public hearings have been held to date?) No.

Sustainability Issues (related to grant awards): The grant funds positions, systems, and equipment to support the Seattle site. Three positions are funded by the grant: 1) a project director (exempt) whose position will expire at the end of the grant; 2) a GIS/technical strategic advisor (exempt) whose position could be continued by the City should the new technology provide measurable results to policy makers; and 3) an



administrative support position (exempt) that is funded through the grant period. The proposal was developed with the understanding that the need for project leadership will decrease over time, and the need for technical expertise to support existing systems and people would increase as both became reliant on the COMPASS technology to enhance public safety decision making. While there is a strong possibility that the grant will be renewed for a second year, NIJ has also discussed the possibility of making this a three-to five-year project. If the project is not successful, there would be no expectation that the technical positions would be funded in the future. If the project is successful, there may be an expectation on the part of policy makers for the City to pick up the recurring program costs.

At this point in time, we have no reason to believe that this project will not be successful as NIJ has brought other Department of Justice partners (Bureau of Justice Statistics, Weed & Seed, SafeFutures, COPS Office, Bureau of Justice Assistance, etc.) in to support Seattle's COMPASS project. We believe that a successful COMPASS initiative will serve as a magnet for other federal technology money, as evidenced by our recent COPS Office technology earmark.

Dear Councilmember Compton:

We request the City Council's approval of the attached ordinance. This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Strategic Planning Office (SPO) to execute a grant agreement in the amount of \$625,000 with the U.S. Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice (NIJ), for financial assistance under the COMPASS initiative as a demonstration site to enhance public safety through mapping, planning and analysis technologies. The grant period is for one year initially, from February 1, 2000 to January 31, 2001. If the project is successful in meeting milestones during its first year, NIJ plans to renew funding.

This grant will provide funds to the Strategic Planning Office for developing technology and training tools to support the City's commitment to a fully integrated government services model which uses timely and accurate data to understand and respond to public safety problems. The grant funds will support a project director (whose position will expire at the end of the grant), a GIS/technical strategic advisor (whose position could be continued by the City should the project provide measurable benefits to policy makers) an administrative support person (funded through the grant period), a technical contractor, hardware, software, office equipment, and supplies; as well as overtime, as needed, to support crime analysis and information technology staff in the Seattle Police Department. The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) recently notified the City that our proposal had been approved for funding. Resolution 30020 (copy attached) authorized submission of this application. Also attached is a breakdown of the estimated project expenses and the award letter from the National Institute of Justice.

Total cost of the COMPASS project outlined in the attachment is \$625,000. An additional amount of \$275,000 has been awarded by NIJ to a research consortium to monitor and evaluate Seattle's demonstration project over a two-year period so that the results can be replicated in other U.S. cities. As indicated above, the attached ordinance authorizes the agreement and appropriates the grant funds.

### COMPASS PROJECT Seattle, Washington

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) has selected the City of Seattle as their first pilot site for COMPASS (Community, Mapping, Planning and Analysis for Safety Strategies), a new criminal justice initiative that utilizes advanced technology to access information. This initiative will employ data-driven technology tools and an action-based research process to further Seattle's problem-oriented approach to community government, an approach that will guide the advancement of policy-level problem solving and integration of government services.

COMPASS will generate a model for Seattle whereby City departments routinely collaborate with other City, County and community agencies to identify, understand, resolve, and monitor high-priority public safety problems. COMPASS will create an infrastructure based on identification, analysis, retrieval, report, and information sharing functions.

Key components of COMPASS will include:

- Collaborative policy groups spanning a broad array of governmental agencies and community interests;
- Partnerships with community-based block watches and Neighborhood Action Team Seattle (NATS) to identify problems and develop collaborative, community-driven responses to neighborhood public safety issues;
- A comprehensive data center that will house social indicators and other public safety data;
- Strategic analysis of data both spatially and temporally, through the use of a user-friendly information system;
- A research partner or consortium of partners from local universities or research institutes to:

   participate in the development of the data infrastructure;
   provide analytic support to the problem solving effort;
   assist in the development of intervention strategies that address the identified problems;
   document Seattle's COMPASS activities;
   assess the ongoing effectiveness of selected interventions.

Up to now, the thorough, timely, and systematic analysis of crime and public safety problems has been limited by the labor, time, and systems constraints in collecting and analyzing relevant data. The capacity for easy retrieval and presentation of data developed through COMPASS will create an internal market and resource for research and planning that will become a routine part of strategic and tactical problem solving efforts in the City.

The four main goals of the COMPASS Project will be to:

- Promote a Citywide policy level, problem solving model that is built upon analysis of accurate, timely and integrated data;
- Create an accessible and integrated state-of-the-art data infrastructure;
- Identify and address major public safety problems;
- Evaluate and document the efforts, processes, systems, and outcomes of Seattle's COMPASS Project to serve as a replication model for other jurisdictions nationwide.

- Release of Funds: The Seattle COMPASS Project will bill NIJ quarterly for grant expenses as detailed in the Cooperative Agreement's budget section.
- Evaluation Efforts: The Seattle COMPASS project agrees to participate in national and local evaluations of this effort.
- All National Institute of Justice supported research involving human subjects must comply with the "Model Policy on Human Research Subjects" (28 CFR, Part 46).

Because the project uses personally identified data of a sensitive nature that is not publicly available, and which is being obtained without the express consent of all identifiable participants, the proposed project must be reviewed and approved by an institutional Review Board (IRB) that conforms to all the requirements outlined in the Department of Justice regulations at 28 CFR, Part 46 (Protection of Human Subjects).

This condition obligates the grantee to partition research activities into two categories of tasks: (1) those which require Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval because they are covered by the Department of Justice Regulations on the Protection of Human Subjects, which are codified in 28 CFR, part 46; and (2) those which do not require IRB Subjects, which are codified in 28 CFR, part 46; and (2) those which do not require IRB approval because they do not involve human subjects as defined in 28 CRF § 46.102(f). Grantee shall not carry out any research tasks involving human subjects prior to Grantee shall not carry out any research tasks involving human subjects prior to complying with all the requirements in 28 CRF Parts 22 and 46.
