

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ORDINANCE 120890

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4 AN ORDINANCE establishing joint Council-Mayor policy priority areas for the Office of
5 Policy and Management for the remainder of 2002 and for 2003, and amending
6 Chapter 3.14 of the Seattle Municipal Code.
7

8 WHEREAS, the City legislative authority, by Ordinance 120733, established in the
9 Executive Department an Office of Policy and Management ("OPM"). One of
10 OPM's functions is to assist the Mayor and City Council in the development and
11 analysis of high-level Citywide policy on major issues confronting the City,
12 including, but not limited to, public safety, transportation alternatives and mobility,
13 urban development, urban sustainability and the natural environment, social equity,
14 community health and human needs; and

16 WHEREAS, an additional function of OPM is to facilitate the process of developing City
17 policy between the Mayor and City Council by identifying joint priorities and
18 helping to resolve differences; and

20 WHEREAS, the Seattle Municipal Code, Section 3.14.521B, as amended by Ordinance No.
21 120733, requires the Director of the OPM by June 30, 2002 to submit for City
22 Council consideration a proposed joint City Council-Mayor Annual Citywide Policy
23 Priorities Resolution;

26 **NOW THEREFORE,**

27
28 **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:**

30 Section 1. Section 3.14.521 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as follow:

31 **3.14.521 Director -- Duties.**

32 Under the direction of the Mayor, the duties of the Director of the Office of Policy
33 and Management are as follows:

34 A. Oversee and manage the functions of the Office of Policy and Management as set
35 forth in Section 3.14.502; and

36 B. Develop an annual work plan that is based on a joint City Council-Mayor Annual
37 Citywide Policy Priorities Resolution or ordinance. The target date for the completion of
38 such resolution or ordinance will be by the end of the first quarter of each calendar year



1 beginning in 2004. ((Provided, however, that, for)) The 2002 and 2003 workplans shall be
2 based on Section 2 of this ordinance. ((only, the Director of the Office of Policy and
3 Management shall, no later than June 30, 2002, submit a proposed Policy Priorities
4 Resolution for consideration by Council. This)) The annual resolution or ordinance will
5 reflect the major issues and priorities the City Council and Mayor want to address during the
6 coming year and will provide the basis for the Office of Policy and Management work
7 program as it relates to policy development. Furthermore, the Director of the Office of
8 Policy and Management will confer with the City Council President and Committee Chairs
9 on the approach to the work undertaken by the Office of Policy and Management.

10 Section 2. The City Council and Mayor establish the following as the joint City
11 Council-Mayor citywide policy priorities agenda for the remainder of 2002 and for 2003.
12 OPM shall assist the City Council and the Mayor in development and analysis of high-level
13 citywide policies and OPM shall work closely with the Chairs of Council committees
14 addressing these areas.

17 Citywide Policy Priorities Agenda (not in order of priority)

18 1. Transportation

19 a. Develop new approaches to financing transportation infrastructure with the goal of
20 improving mobility for people and freight, improving the pedestrian nature of
21 neighborhoods, and increasing mass transit ridership.

22
23 2. Public Safety

24 a. Analyze and develop policies related to enhancing emergency preparedness.

- 1 b. Research and provide information on best practices and science-based, cost-effective
2 approaches to selected public safety issues including policing methods, police training
3 and accountability, and leadership development in both the police and fire services.
4 c. Research and identify effective models of delivering public safety services based upon
5 recognized best practices and successful models from other jurisdictions.
6 d. Identify linkages between human services and public safety programs and recommend
7 policies and/or programs that show promise for improved outcomes
8

9 3. Housing.

- 10 a. In conjunction with the Office of Housing, identify and recommend policies and
11 programs that may increase overall housing supply, contribute to improving housing
12 affordability, and improve home ownership rates. Specific research shall be done regarding
13 rent or lease to own homeownership programs.
14

15 4. Race Relations.

- 16 a. Develop and propose methods to improve race relations in Seattle with the goal of
17 reducing disproportionality in health, education, economic and justice system outcomes.
18

19 5. Human Services

- 20 a. In collaboration with Council Central Staff and the Department of Finance budget analyst
21 develop an outcome-based strategic plan that will guide the City's investments in human
22 services. This plan should include:

- 23 i). A statement affirming the City's commitment to investing in human services;

1 ii). A programmatic and financial compilation of the City's current investments in
2 human services;

3 iii). The City's goals which should articulate what is expected to be achieved
4 through the City's investments in human services; overall goals, and goals for specific lines
5 of business and program areas.

6 iv). Comprehensive strategies for achieving these goals that look at how the City
7 assists human service clients to improve the quality of their lives, as well as specific
8 program measures;

9 v). Systems that ensure program accountability including specific outcomes and
10 performance measures at both the line of business and program level;

11 vi). Evaluation and financial tools that will allow the City to assess the
12 effectiveness of its investments in human services; and

13 vii). A schedule for updating and evaluating the City's strategic plan for human
14 services.

15
16 **6. Environment and Sustainability**

17 a. Identify policies and practices and coordinate with other departments in order to meet
18 Seattle's commitment to the Endangered Species Act.

19
20 **7. Economic Development**

21 a. Identify policies and practices that would improve Seattle's business climate and increase
22 economic opportunities for low-income citizens.

23 b. Support the development of strategies to implement the Economic Opportunity Task
24 Force recommendations.

1 c. Identify best practices for revitalizing neighborhood business districts and bring a plan
2 for application of these practices to the following priority areas: University District, Capitol
3 Hill, Pioneer Square and key Central District business nodes.

4
5 8. Neighborhood Planning And Comprehensive Plan.

6 a. Continue to assist departments in identifying approaches that maximize the City's ability
7 to implement neighborhood plans and ensure that other major projects are consistent with
8 Comprehensive Plan policies.

9 b. Develop a mechanism for ensuring that all division and department work plans, goals,
10 and measures relate to citywide goals as specified in the Comprehensive Plan.

11 c. Assist in the development, analysis, and implementation of plans and programs for the
12 following priority areas: Rainier Valley, South Lake Union, and Northgate.

13
14 9. Infrastructure

15 a. Begin a system-wide assessment of the City's infrastructure including buildings, roads,
16 bridges, sidewalks, water, and electrical systems and identify strategic plans for long-term
17 investment, maintenance and replacement.

18
19 10. South Downtown/South Waterfront.

20 a. Develop a vision and implementation strategy to guide future development in the South
21 Downtown/South Waterfront area, which shall include an examination of zoning and land-
22 use policies, planning for King Street Station and a major focus on the North Kingdome Lot
23 development and other significant development opportunities in Pioneer Square.




1 Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and
2 after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten
3 (10) days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Municipal Code Section
4 1.04.020.






