





I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill that will create an Immigrant and Refugee Advisory Board for the City of Seattle.

In September 2005, the City Council adopted Resolution 30796 calling for the establishment of a community advisory task force to advise the City on issues facing Seattle's growing immigrant and refugee population. The Board established by this Bill will advise the Mayor and City Council on ways to enhance and improve access to City services and resources, as well as increase opportunities, for immigrants and refugees to inform and participate in the civic life of the City.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten (10) days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.
