ORDINANCE 123049

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Department of Neighborhoods; authorizing implementation of certain Neighborhood Matching Fund projects in 2009, and specifying that 2009 appropriations for the Neighborhood Matching Subfund shall carry forward automatically to future budget years.

WHEREAS, Resolution 27709 established a Neighborhood Planning and Assistance Program, including a Neighborhood Matching Fund and a Citywide Review Team, to provide support for neighborhood improvement activities, leveraging citizen contributions and volunteer hours for a variety of neighborhood-based planning, development, and improvement projects; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 27965, and subsequent revisions, set forth the City of Seattle's Neighborhood Matching Fund Application and Review Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, in the 2009 budget \$3,829,693 was appropriated for the Neighborhood Matching Subfund, including \$1,295,563 for Large Projects funding; and

WHEREAS, \$64,023 of the amount appropriated for the 2008 Neighborhood Matching Fund Subfund and allocated to Large Projects funding was not awarded and, therefore, carried forward automatically;

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Citywide Review Team are recommending identical Neighborhood Matching Fund Large Projects for funding; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Department of Neighborhoods (hereinafter "Department") is hereby authorized to proceed with implementation of the following Large Projects as provided below:

11 Expenditures may be made for the above projects upon vouchers drawn by the
12 Department Director from funds allocated for the Neighborhood Matching Subfund. The
13 Department can encumber funds in the amounts allocated.

15 Section 2. The Department shall have the authority to administer the City's public works
16 contracting process and execute contracts for any Neighborhood Matching Fund public works
17 projects to which funds are allocated by this Ordinance. Any public works contracts must
18 comply with state and local law requirements. The Department is authorized to enter into
19 agreements with public and private entities to implement the projects listed in Section 1. In the
20 case of an agreement with a private entity, the agreement shall specifically describe the public
21 benefit received by the City.

23 Section 3. The Department is hereby authorized to reallocate funds in the Neighborhood
24 Matching Fund Subfund allocated above among the projects identified in Section 1 of this
25 ordinance as necessary, provided that the sum of such changes shall not exceed One Hundred and
26 Fifty thousand Dollars (\$150,000), and further provided that the Mayor or his designee notify in

1 writing the Chair of the Planning, Land Use, and Neighborhoods Committee of the City Council
2 of the nature of and reasons for the reallocation.

3 Section 4. Appropriations made from the Neighborhood Matching Subfund shall not
4 lapse and shall be carried over each year until fully expended, abandoned or reappropriated to
5 other authorized activities.

6 Section 5. Any act consistent with the authority and prior to the effective date of this
7 ordinance is hereby ratified and confirmed.


8 Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after
9 its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten (10) days
10 after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Department of Neighborhoods; authorizing implementation of certain Neighborhood Matching Fund projects in 2009, and specifying that 2009 appropriations for the Neighborhood Matching Subfund shall carry forward automatically to future budget years.

- **Summary of the Legislation:**

This proposed legislation allocates funds for 19 projects in the 2009 Neighborhood Matching Subfund (NMF) Large Projects Fund totaling \$1,359,586. While funds are already appropriated in the 2009 Adopted Budget, this ordinance allocates funds to the 19 specific projects, and gives the Department authority to execute public works contracts, if appropriate. There is a total of \$64,023 being awarded from the 2008 Large Projects Fund that was not awarded in 2008.

- **Background:**

The Neighborhood Matching Fund (NMF) program was established in 1989 via Resolution 27709 to fund neighborhood-based projects initiated and directed by people who live or own/operate businesses in a Seattle neighborhood. Projects include capital improvements, planning, organizing, and public school partnerships, all sponsored by a variety of neighborhood organizations including community councils, business organizations, school site councils, or PTSAs, other community groups, or ad hoc groups of neighbors. Applicant groups are not required to have nonprofit status.

The Citywide Review Team (CRT), a group of 16 community volunteers from across the city, considers applications and makes recommendations for awards from the Large Projects Fund. Award recommendations for Large Projects Fund projects require support of the Mayor and approval of the City Council. This ordinance allocates funds for the Large Projects Fund in 2009 based on the recommendations of the CRT with concurrence by the Mayor. This set of awards totals \$1,359,586 and will be matched by \$1,899,650 in community cash or in-kind donations. Attachment 1: 2009 Large Projects Fund Award Recommendations provides a summary of the project descriptions, award amounts, and match values.

By not implementing this legislation, the City would not be able to leverage non-City resources (including cash) valued at \$1.8 million provided by the community for these 19 projects.

Project implementation requires partnerships with Seattle Department of Transportation and Seattle Parks and Recreation to ensure that relevant policies and procedures are followed. NMF provides funding for .5 FTE in SDOT and 1.0 FTE in Parks to help manage the NMF-related work in each department and to provide a single point of contact to facilitate customer service for NMF project sponsors.

Operating and maintenance costs associated with the following four Parks and Recreation projects total \$87,989. NMF funds will not be used to cover the O&M costs. Three of the four projects are primarily funded by the Parks and Green Spaces Levy. The funding source of Parks O&M costs is the Parks and Recreation Fund.


Dear Council President Conlin:

I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill, which allocates funds from the Neighborhood Matching Fund Subfund ("NMF") for Large Projects. The Citywide Review Team (CRT) and City Neighborhood Council recently approved 19 projects totaling \$1,359,586, which will be funded with appropriations included in the 2009 Adopted Budget and with \$64,023 from 2008 NMF unspent funds. The community match totals \$1,899,650 including cash, volunteer labor, donated professional services and donated materials

The Large Projects Fund includes projects that benefit local neighborhoods with awards of up to \$100,000. The projects approved for funding by this legislation include eleven physical improvement projects, three non-physical improvement projects, one planning project, one community organizing project, and three public school partnership projects. Ten projects are related to neighborhood planning, seven support race and social justice objectives, six have a youth focus, two are from refugee/immigrant communities, four involve Parks improvements, and four are in the arts arena. The projects will benefit Seattle neighborhoods with five projects in Southeast Seattle; three projects in Delridge; two projects each in Downtown, Greater Duwamish, and Lake Union; and one project each in Ballard, Central, East, Northwest, and Southwest Seattle.


