ORDINANCE 123068

AN ORDINANCE authorizing, in 2009, acceptance of funding from non-City sources; authorizing the heads of the Seattle Department of Transportation, the Seattle Police Department, the Seattle Public Utilities, Seattle City Light, the Seattle Fire Department, the Human Services Department, and the Fleets and Facilities Department to accept specified grants and private funding and to execute, deliver, and perform corresponding agreements; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts..

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Director of the Human Services Department, the Director of the Seattle Department of Transportation, the Superintendent of City Light, the Chief of Police, the Fire Chief, and Director of Seattle Public Utilities, are hereby authorized to accept the following non-City funding from the grantors listed below, and to execute, deliver, and perform on behalf of the City of Seattle, agreements for the purposes described below. The funds, when received, shall be deposited in the receiving fund identified below to support, or as reimbursement for, the corresponding appropriations set forth in the ordinance introduced as C.B. 116607.

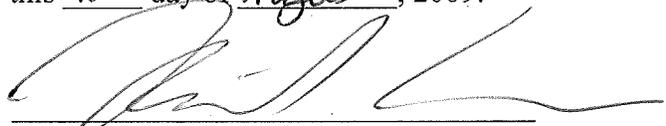

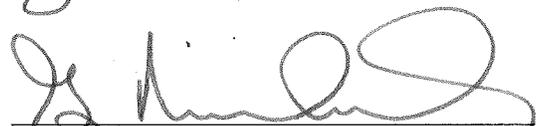

Section 1 – Appropriating Grant Resources		
1.1	Nursing Home Diversion Grant (Human Services Department - Human Services Operating Fund - 16200) This item increases support to the Nursing Home Diversion Project in Aging and Disability Services by \$437,091 from the State of Washington - Aging and Disability Services Administration. This grant provides funding to assist older adults, who might otherwise require placement in nursing home facilities. Funding is one-time, and will run from July 1, 2009 to March 31, 2010. There are no positions associated with this grant.	\$437,091
1.2	Workforce Investment Act (Human Services Department - Human Services Operating Fund - 16200) This item increases support to the Seattle Youth Employment Program by \$262,855 from the federal Workforce Investment Act grant program. This funding supplements \$537,145 already budgeted for this grant in 2009, bringing the total to \$800,000. This grant funds employment and training services for youth who are homeless. Funding will run from July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010. This grant requires a General Fund match, which is already included in the budget for the Seattle Youth Employment Program. No positions are associated with this grant.	\$262,855
1.3	Salmonid Habitat Restoration (Seattle City Light - City Light Fund - 41000) This item increases support to the salmonid habitat restoration project (Endangered Species Act Mitigation CIP #6990) by accepting \$30,000 from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. These resources will be used for a salmonid habitat restoration project in the Tolt River Watershed as authorized by Resolution 29905 and Ordinance 121114.	\$30,000
1.4	Aurora Avenue N and N 115th Street (Seattle Department of Transportation - Transportation Operating Fund - 10310) This item increases support to the Mobility - Capital (19003) BCL by \$182,000 from WSDOT. This project leverages a WSDOT Pedestrian & Bicycle Safety Program grant to construct pedestrian safety improvements at the intersection of Aurora Ave North and North 115th Street. Pedestrian improvements include, but are not limited to: new sidewalks, curb, gutter, ADA curb ramps, and a signalized crossing. SDOT will use local funding from an existing annual program to match the grant.	\$182,000

1.5	<p>2009 Crash Cushions (Seattle Department of Transportation - Transportation Operating Fund - 10310)</p> <p>This item increases support to the Mobility - Operations BCL by \$60,000 from WSDOT. The City was awarded a \$120,000 Federal Safety Grant for the upgrade and/or rehabilitation of substandard and damaged crash cushions at locations within serious and fatal collision buffer zones. Locations are high-speed and high-volume arterials. Local match will be provided by existing annual operations and maintenance programs. Remaining funds are expected to be spent in 2010.</p>	\$60,000
1.6	<p>N Northgate Way Safety Improvements (Seattle Department of Transportation - Transportation Operating Fund - 10310)</p> <p>This item increases support to the Mobility - Operations BCL by \$78,000 from WSDOT. The City was awarded a Federal Safety Grant for the installation of advance directional signage along N Northgate Way, from Meridian Avenue N to 3rd Avenue N. The signs will direct motorists to the correct lanes for I-5 access.</p>	\$78,000
1.7	<p>Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement Program (Seattle Department of Transportation - Transportation Operating Fund - 10310)</p> <p>This item increases support to the Major Maintenance/Replacement BCL by \$500,000 from the Bridge Replacement Advisory Committee (BRAC) for the Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement program (TC366850). The City received a \$1.5 million federal grant for the 15th Avenue NE & NE 105th Street Bridge. The 2009 Adopted Budget anticipated a federal grant award in 2010. SDOT expects to spend an estimated \$500,000 of the grant in 2009 on design, and the remaining \$1 million of the grant in 2010 on construction.</p>	\$500,000
1.8	<p>Grant for Firefighter Training - Mobilization Exercise (Seattle Fire Department - General Subfund - 00100)</p> <p>This grant increases support to the Operations Division by \$12,000 from the federal government to fund a mobilization exercise for Seattle members of the regional Urban Search and Rescue (US&R) team. Some 75 Seattle firefighters are members of this team, which can be deployed for national emergencies. There are 28 US&R teams organized around the country, whose members are highly trained in a number of critical response areas, including the ability to mobilize people and equipment around the country for rescue and recovery work. This periodic mobilization exercise is required, and financially supported, by FEMA. This funding requires no local match and does not create any new positions.</p>	\$12,000

1.9	CBRNE Personal Protective Equipment for Regional Tactical Teams (Seattle Police Department - General Subfund - 00100)	\$700,000
	<p>This item increases support to the Chief of Police program of the Seattle Police Department by \$700,000 from the King County Office of Emergency Management under the federal pass-through FY 08 State Homeland Security Grant. This funding will be used to purchase personal protective equipment for SWAT and Bomb team personnel in the Seattle area, to enable them to work safely during contingency operations involving chemical, biological, radiological or nuclear explosive (CBRNE) contaminants. The term for this grant runs from May 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010. There are no matching requirements or capital improvement projects associated with this grant.</p>	
1.10	CBRNE Planner Support (Seattle Police Department - General Subfund - 00100)	\$150,000
	<p>This item increases support to the Chief of Police program of the Seattle Police Department by \$150,000 from the King County Office of Emergency Management under the federal pass-through FY 08 State Homeland Security Grant. This funding will provide support for continuation of an existing CBRNE planner position in the Department's Homeland Security Bureau. The purpose of this position is to develop standardized protocols among regional law enforcement agencies for response to an incident involving use of chemical, biological, radiological or nuclear explosive (CBRNE) contaminants. The term for this grant runs from April 2, 2009 through June 30, 2010. There are no matching requirements or capital improvement projects associated with this grant. The CBRNE planner position will sunset in the future if grant support is not continued and alternate sources of support cannot be identified.</p>	
1.11	CBRNE Training and Exercise Support (Seattle Police Department - General Subfund - 00100)	\$200,000
	<p>This item increases support to the Chief of Police program of the Seattle Police Department by \$200,000 from the King County Office of Emergency Management under the federal pass-through FY 08 State Homeland Security Grant. This funding will provide support for the costs of training and exercises for law enforcement personnel in the Seattle area who are responsible for responding to incidents involving the use of chemical, biological, radiological or nuclear explosive (CBRNE) contaminants. The term for this grant runs from May 1, 2009 through August 1, 2010. There are no matching requirements or capital improvement projects associated with this grant.</p>

1.12	<p>SeaJIS Law Enforcement Safety Alerts Earmark (Seattle Police Department - General Subfund - 00100)</p> <p>This item increases support to the Field Support Administration program of the Seattle Police Department by \$500,000 from the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services of the U.S. Department of Justice for development of a multi-agency database accessible to officers in the field. This federal earmark will enable the City to further develop the Seattle Justice Information System (SeaJIS) with a focus on expedited sharing of information among police officers in the field, supervisors of probation, Seattle Municipal Court and the Seattle Law Department. The Seattle Police Department is transmitting this item on behalf of the SeaJIS Interdepartmental Team. The term of the earmark runs from May 1, 2009 through December 31, 2010. There are no matching requirements or capital improvement projects associated with this grant.</p>	\$500,000
1.13	<p>Traffic Safety Program Grants (Seattle Police Department - General Subfund - 00100)</p> <p>This item increases support to the Chief of Police program in the Seattle Police Department by \$44,000 from the Washington Traffic Safety Commission for two projects: (1) a traffic safety operation along Aurora Avenue; and (2) a pedestrian safety/driver awareness project. Both projects will fund officer overtime and related expenses involved in conducting these operations. The term for the grant runs from March through September 2009. There are no matching requirements or capital improvement projects associated with this grant.</p>	\$44,000
1.14	<p>WDFW Olympic Sculpture Park Monitoring - WF (Seattle Public Utilities - Water Fund - 43000)</p> <p>This item increases Water Fund support to the Olympic Sculpture Park post-construction shoreline monitoring program by \$50,000 from the Washington State Department of Fish & Wildlife (WDFW). See the description for a similar grant request in the Drainage & Wastewater Fund as \$50,000 was awarded to both the Water Fund and the Drainage Wastewater Fund for a total grant award of \$100,000 from WDFW.</p>	\$50,000

2.3	Recovery Act Loan from Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (SRF) (Seattle Public Utilities - Water Fund - 43000)	\$6,060,000
	This item authorizes SPU to accept a \$6,060,000 low-interest loan from Washington's Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (SRF), which received an additional allocation of money from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, otherwise known as the federal stimulus legislation. The loan will partially finance the roughly \$60 million cost of the Maple Leaf reservoir covering project (C101078), slated to begin construction in summer 2009, and will be repaid with Water Fund rate revenue. Low-interest financing via the SRF saves the water ratepayers roughly \$2 million in net present value over conventional bond financing. No additional appropriation authority is needed.
