- AN ORDINANCE relating to the financing of the Lake Union Park Project; authorizing the loan of funds from the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool, or its participating funds, to the South Lake Union Trust Fund; and providing for the repayment thereof.
- WHEREAS, the Mayor proposed and the City Council approved a 2009 Budget and 2009-2014 Capital Improvement Program that includes design and construction activities for the Lake Union Park Project (LU Park); and
- WHEREAS, construction of LU Park has been undertaken in phases and construction of Phase I of LU Park was completed in March 2008 and Phase II is currently underway; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 121963 authorized the execution of an Agreement between the Seattle Department of Parks and Recreation ("DPR") and the Seattle Parks Foundation ("Foundation") committing the Foundation to launch a fundraising campaign to raise Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000) to be donated to the City for design, development, and construction of LU Park; and
- WHEREAS, the Foundation has completed its fundraising campaign and payments are scheduled to be made to the City through 2013; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 121902 authorized the execution of an Agreement between DPR and City Investors, Inc. and City Investors provided Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) to the City for the LU Park Project; and
- WHEREAS, City Investors has committed to providing an additional Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) for the LU Park Development project conditioned on the City having a funding plan in place and being within one year of commencing construction of improvements to Valley Street, as outlined in Ordinance 121902; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 122757 authorized acceptance of the \$10 million donation from the Foundation and the \$5 million donation from City Investors to be used for the construction of Phase II of LU Park; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 121963 (section 3.4.1) commits the City to moving forward with construction of Phase II of the project regardless of whether the conditions have been satisfied to secure City Investors' conditional release of the Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000); and
- WHEREAS, funds necessary to complete the LU Park Project have been identified but may not be received at the time project expenditures are incurred, creating a temporary funding

gap, and a loan from the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool, or its participating funds, will be utilized as interim financing; and

WHEREAS, interest on the Five Million Dollar (\$5,000,000) portion of the loan will be paid by the City's General Subfund and the Foundation will pay interest on the portion of the loan used in lieu of outstanding pledges; and

WHEREAS, there is sufficient cash in the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool, or its participating funds, to support a loan of up to Five Million Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$5,350,000) of principal and up to Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) of accumulated interest to the South Lake Union Trust Fund, terminating no later than December 31, 2013; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that this cash pool loan will be repaid once funds are received from City Investors and the Seattle Parks Foundation; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. A loan of up to Five Million Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$5,350,000) of principal and up to Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) of accumulated interest outstanding at any one time is hereby authorized to be made from the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool, or its participating funds, to the South Lake Union Trust Fund from which may be paid capital costs related to the Lake Union Park Project. Said loan is to be repaid no later than December 31, 2013, with interest on the loan at the rate of return of the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool.

Section 2. The Director of Finance may effectuate the loan authorized in Section 1 by transferring cash from one or more of the funds participating in the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool to the South Lake Union Trust Fund, or by carrying the South Lake Union Trust Fund in a negative cash position in an amount not to exceed Five Million Eight Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$5,850,000), until no later than December 31, 2013.

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to the financing of the Lake Union Park Project; authorizing the loan of funds from the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool, or its participating funds, to the South Lake Union Trust Fund; and providing for the repayment thereof.

Summary and background of the Legislation:

The proposed legislation authorizes an interfund loan up to \$5.35 million from the City's Consolidated (Residual) cash Pool to fund construction costs related to the Lake Union Park Development (LU Park) project in order to finish Phase II of the project on schedule.

The existing Capital Improvement Program project (Lake Union Park – Development K733134) is funded by the 2000 Neighborhood Parks, Green Spaces, Trails, and Zoo Levy, (2000 Parks Levy) as well as by other City and grant funds. The construction of the project was divided into two phases. Phase I, which is completed, included constructing terraces, a boardwalk, and a pedestrian bridge; replacing the bulkhead; installing utilities, and preparing the park for Phase II of the project. The scope of work in Phase II includes removal of most of the existing landscape and installs a new entrance to the park, tree grove, interactive water fountain of jets, grass, model boat pond, History Trail, boardwalk extension, parking, pathways, beach for hand launched boats, landscape, landforms, furniture, lighting systems and irrigation. In addition, work includes shoreline stabilization and planting on the lake edge and repairing/regrading pavements to tie into existing surrounding surfaces.

In 2005, the Seattle Parks Foundation committed to raising \$10 million for development of LU Park, which was in addition to a commitment of a \$10 million donation from City Investors (CI), a major property owner and developer in the South Lake Union area. Ordinance 121963 authorized the execution of the Agreement between DPR and the Foundation concerning their roles in fundraising, design, development, construction, operation and maintenance of LU Park. In 2006, Ordinance 122084 authorized amendments to the 2005 Agreement between DPR and the Foundation. The Foundation has completed its fundraising campaign and payments are scheduled to be made to the City through 2013.

CI donated an initial \$5 million to the Foundation, which was subsequently given to DPR for development of LU Park. CI pledged an additional \$5 million for the LU Park project, payable at such time as (1) the City and the Foundation raise an additional \$10 million to develop LU Park consistent with the approved designs; and (2) construct certain Valley Street improvements within one year of commencement. CI is expected to make the final \$5 million donation once all the contingencies are satisfied pursuant to the agreement. The Agreement between DPR and CI and acceptance of CI's initial \$5 million donation was authorized by Ordinance 121902.



Ordinance 121963 (section 3.4.1) states that the City is committed to moving forward with construction of phase two of the project regardless of whether the conditions have been satisfied to secure CI's conditional release of the \$5 million donation. This commits the City to provide these funds should condition (2) above not be met.

Phase I of the LU Park Development Project was completed in March 2008. Phase II is under construction and scheduled for completion in 2010. The funds necessary to complete the LU Park Project have been identified and appropriated, but may not be received at the time project expenditures are incurred, creating a temporary funding gap. A loan from the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool will be used for interim financing. The Foundation will pay interest on the portion of the loan used in lieu of outstanding pledges starting in July 2010 and the City's General Subfund will pay interest on the \$5 million portion of the loan.

I am transmitting the attached proposed Council Bill that authorizes an interfund loan of up to \$5.35 million from the City's Consolidated (Residual) Cash Pool to fund construction costs related to the Lake Union Park Development project. The cash loan will allow the completion of Phase II of the project as scheduled in 2010.

The Lake Union Development project expects a funding gap due to a difference in timing between payment of project costs and receipt of revenue, which includes \$5 million from City Investors (CI) and \$350,000 from the Seattle Parks Foundation. The \$5 million from CI will be received after certain improvements to Valley Street are made as outlined in the agreement between CI and the City that was adopted via Ordinance 121902. The Seattle Parks Foundation has completed its fundraising campaign, resulting in \$10 million in payments that are scheduled to be paid to the City through 2013.

Lake Union Park is an important addition to Seattle's park system and to the growing Lake Union community. The interfund loan authorized by this Bill will assure that the Lake Union Park will be developed as planned and previously approved. Thank you for your consideration of this legislation.
