ORDINANCE 123154

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Animal Fee Ordinance; adjusting spaying and neutering fees at the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic; and amending Subsection 9.26.060 A of the Seattle Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, spay and neuter surgery fees were last raised effective January 1, 2009 (Ordinance 122847); and

WHEREAS, the proposed fee increases will allow the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic to fully recover expenditures while continuing to provide low-cost services to Seattle citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Executive Administration will continue to use private donations in the Pet Population Control Fund as needed to assist low-income citizens with spay and neutering service costs; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Effective January 1, 2010, Subsection 9.26.060 A of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance 122847, is amended as follows:

9.26.060 Spay and Neuter Clinic fees.

The fees at the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic shall be:

A. Surgery fees:

Cats

Spaying....\$((60)) <u>90</u>

Neutering...\$((55)) <u>85</u>

Dogs

Dog neuter under 50 pounds....\$((90)) $\underline{120}$

Dog neuter 50 - 80 pounds....\$((105)) <u>135</u>

Dog neuter over 80 pounds....\$((125)) $\underline{155}$

Dog spay under 50 pounds....\$((100)) <u>130</u>

Animals other than cats and dogs may be spayed or neutered at the discretion of the Director of Executive Administration, or his/her designee, who shall charge a fee for the service that is based upon estimated costs, not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per hour of surgery.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten (10) days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Animal Fee Ordinance; adjusting spaying and neutering fees at the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic; and amending Subsection 9.26.060 A of the Seattle Municipal Code.

- <u>Summary of the Legislation:</u> The proposed legislation raises spaying and neutering fees charged by the City's Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic.
- <u>Background</u>: Ordinance 122847, which was passed during the 2009 budget process, adjusted spaying and neutering fees, effective January 1, 2009. Under the current proposal, spay/neuter surgical services would be raised by \$30 for each procedure, effective January 1, 2010, allowing the City's Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic to recover its surgical service costs. Based on a recent survey of local service providers, the Clinic's new fees will continue to be significantly below those charged in the private market.

Low spay and neuter rates encourage citizens to alter their companion animals, thereby reducing the number of unwanted and uncared for pets on city streets and in the Seattle Animal Shelter. While the proposed standard fee levels will be less than those charged by private clinics, the Municipal Clinic's low-income customers will have access to financial assistance with the cost of spaying and neutering their pets, using donations made to the City's Pet Population Control Fund. This type of financial assistance will ensure that all Seattle citizens have access to these important animal welfare services.

Dear Council President Conlin:

I am transmitting the attached proposed Council Bill for consideration with the 2010 Proposed Budget. This legislation proposes a modest increase in fees for services performed at the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic, pursuant to Seattle Municipal Code (SMC) Section 9.26.060. The fee levels set forth in this Bill will generate an additional \$93,000 in General Fund revenue while allowing the City to continue providing low-cost spay and neuter clinic services to the public. Ordinance 122847 last raised Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic fees, effective January 1, 2009.

The new rates established in this Bill raise the fees by \$30 each for surgical services performed at the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic for cost recovery purposes. As shown in a recent survey of local veterinary clinics, fee levels established through this legislation will remain significantly below those charged in the private sector. The City will continue to assist low-income citizens to pay for these services using donated funds from the City's Pet Population Control Fund.

The rates established in this Bill will both permit the Municipal Spay and Neuter Clinic to recover its costs and encourage pet owners to alter their companion animals, thereby reducing the number of uncared for pets on our streets and in the Seattle Animal Shelter.
