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ORDINANCE 123360

AN ORDINANCE relating to a grant from the Department of Energy allocated through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009; accepting the grant funds, authorizing the Mayor or his designee to execute related agreements, increasing appropriations in the 2010 Adopted Budget for the Office of Sustainability and Environment, Office of Economic Development, and Seattle City Light, creating four term-limited positions in the Office of Sustainability and Environment and one term-limited position in Seattle City Light, and ratifying and confirming prior acts; all by a two-thirds vote of the City Council.

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has authorized \$452 million in the Energy Efficiency & Conservation Block Grant Retrofit Ramp-Up ("EECBG-RU") program as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("ARRA"); and

WHEREAS, the City submitted an application to the Department of Energy on December 14, 2009 to request EECBG-RU funds; and

WHEREAS, based on the City's successful application, the Department of Energy has awarded \$20 million to the City of Seattle from these EECBG-RU funds; and

WHEREAS, the EECBG-RU grant funding constitutes one-time funding for programs to deliver deep energy efficiency retrofits in residential, commercial, hospital, and municipal buildings in the Central District and parts of Southeast Seattle; and

WHEREAS, the retrofit programs will reduce over 50,000 metric tons of greenhouse gases, and create thousands of new living wage green jobs; and

WHEREAS, the City is not obligated to continue or maintain ARRA grant funding levels for the EECBG-RU once ARRA grant funds have lapsed; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to increase appropriations in the 2010 Adopted Budget for the Office of Sustainability and Environment, Office of Economic Development, and Seattle City Light, to reflect the anticipated receipt and authorize the expenditure of these EECBG-RU funds; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City of Seattle hereby accepts American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("ARRA") funds from the Department of Energy for the Energy Efficiency and



Conservation Block Grant Retrofit Ramp-up ("EECBG-RU") program in the amount of \$20 million for the following purposes:

Item	Program and Description
1	Loan fund and credit enhancement. Expand existing loan programs and explore creating new loan programs to provide cost effective financing for retrofits.
2	Carbon Reduction Fund. Establish competitive process to provide financial incentives for retrofit projects based on carbon reduced by the project.
3	Outreach and marketing. Market program to targeted/eligible properties across numerous sectors identified by the City.
4	Workforce Development. Expand existing green workforce development efforts currently underway by the City, including a focus on worker placement, and worker and employer support services.
5	Measurement & Verification. Compile and analyze energy usage and performance data regularly to assess program results.
6	Grant Administration. This funding will allow the City to respond to the administration, monitoring and reporting requirements of the grant.

The Mayor or his designee is authorized to execute and deliver and perform for and on behalf of the City of Seattle such EECBG-RU agreements and certifications as may be necessary to accept the ARRA funds. Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Retrofit Ramp-up funds, when received, shall be deposited into the appropriate funds, as follows:

The Mayor or his designee is further authorized to execute and deliver documents relating to the EECBG-RU agreements if required by federal guidelines.

Section 2. Contingent upon the execution of the EECBG-RU agreement(s) authorized in Section 1 and the receipt of the funds, the appropriations for the following items in the 2010 Budget are increased from the funds shown, as follows:

Unspent funds shall carry forward to subsequent years until they are exhausted or abandoned by ordinance.

Section 3. To carry out purposes of the appropriations in Section 2 of this ordinance, the following new positions, which are exempt from Civil Service and Public Safety Civil Service rules and laws, are created in the Office of Sustainability and Environment and Seattle City Light:

The Director of the Office of Sustainability and Environment and Seattle City Light Superintendent are authorized to fill the positions in their respective departments. Given the anticipated duration of this funding, these positions are abrogated effective December 31, 2013.

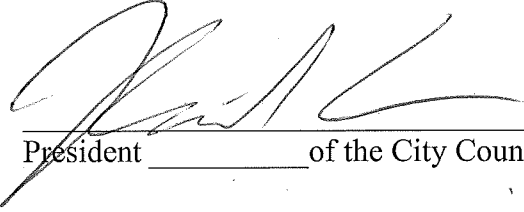

Notwithstanding the requirements of Seattle Municipal Code Chapters 20.50 and 20.60, the Director of the Office of Sustainability and Environment is authorized to enter into consultant and service contracts with the entities specified in Attachment A hereto, up to the dollar amounts stated and for the purposes described in Attachment A.

Section 5. Any act authorized by this ordinance and taken after its passage is ratified and confirmed.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days from and after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to a grant from the Department of Energy allocated through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009; accepting the grant funds, authorizing the Mayor or his designee to execute related agreements, increasing appropriations in the 2010 Adopted Budget for the Office of Sustainability and Environment, Office of Economic Development, and Seattle City Light, creating four term-limited positions in the Office of Sustainability and Environment and one term-limited position in Seattle City Light, and ratifying and confirming prior acts; all by a two-thirds vote of the City Council.

- **Summary of the Legislation:**

This legislation provides grant acceptance authority and appropriations to spend \$20,000,000 of grant funds made available through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("ARRA"). The grant supports programs to retrofit residential, commercial, hospital, and municipal buildings in the Central District and parts of Southeast Seattle, reduce approximately 70,000 metric tons of greenhouse gases, and create up to 2,000 new living wage green jobs. The legislation creates 4.0 FTEs in the Office of Sustainability and Environment and 1.0 FTE in Seattle City Light to administer the grant. The positions will be abrogated effective December 31, 2013 unless additional funding is identified and appropriated.

- **Background:**

In April 2010, the City of Seattle was awarded a \$20 million grant from the US Department of Energy for a neighborhood-based building retrofit program aimed at achieving deep energy efficiency across all building sectors, reducing greenhouse gases, and creating green jobs. The grant funds are significantly leveraged through strategic partnerships and local investment. The grant program's budget and associated leverage are outlined in two attachments to this fiscal note (Attachments A and B).

With this EECBG grant, the City of Seattle will fund the following activities:

Notes: This table reflects anticipated spending in 2010 and 2011. Most expenses will occur in 2010 through contracts for the capitalization of loan and carbon reduction funds. An additional \$1,306,000 is anticipated to be spent in 2012 and 2013 for a total spending plan of \$20,000,000.

What is the financial cost of not implementing the legislation? Without this legislation, the City will not receive \$20,000,000 in revenues to support programs to retrofit residential, commercial, hospital, and municipal buildings in the Central District and parts of Southeast Seattle, reduce approximately 70,000 metric tons of greenhouse gases, and create up to 2,000 new living wage green jobs.

Does this legislation affect any departments besides the originating department? Both the Office of Economic Development and Seattle City Light receive direct funding from this grant. In addition, existing City programs have been identified as leverage contributions for the EECBG Ramp-Up program, together with other community, utility, financial and business partners. These leveraged contributions are described in Attachment B to this fiscal note, and include programs in Seattle City Light (Energy Conservation, Rebates, and Financing), Office of Housing (Homewise Weatherization), and potential retrofits of City facilities (Municipal Building Retrofits). While this leveraged funding is *not* a specific local match requirement for this grant, demonstrating these leveraged contributions was instrumental in the Department of Energy's grant selection process.

What are the possible alternatives to the legislation that could achieve the same or similar objectives? Acceptance of the grant award is a prerequisite for the receipt of these federal economic stimulus funds. There are no alternatives that could achieve the same or similar objectives.

Is the legislation subject to public hearing requirements: No.

Other Issues: The EECBG Ramp-Up program is a new grant program, and continued funding for future grant cycles is uncertain. The City programs receiving these funds have developed spending plans based on a one-time grant, however the City may apply for additional funds in the future if the Ramp-Up program is continued or if other fund sources are identified.

Dear Council President Conlin:

I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill, which accepts the City's \$20 million Retrofit Ramp-Up award from the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE). The City of Seattle was one of just 25 communities nationwide to receive a Ramp-Up award through the ARRA-funded Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant program.

The City's Ramp-Up award will catalyze a \$140 million neighborhood-based building retrofit initiative to achieve deep energy efficiency and create green jobs. Specifically, the initiative will:

- Retrofit residential, commercial, hospital, and municipal buildings in the Central District and parts of Southeast Seattle.
- Achieve between 15% and 45% energy savings per building retrofitted.
- Create up to 2,000 new living wage green jobs.
- Leverage grant funds 7-to-1 through strategic partnerships and local investment.

The initiative's programs will help building owners and tenants understand the energy efficiency opportunities in their buildings, provide access to financing for building retrofits, and ensure there are training and career pathways for workers to access building retrofit jobs.

The proposed Council Bill increases budget appropriations and authorizes related contracts to reflect anticipated receipt and expenditure of the grant funds, and creates five term-limited positions to implement the grant program. According to the terms of the DOE award, the City is required to spend the grant funds within three years from June 1, 2010.

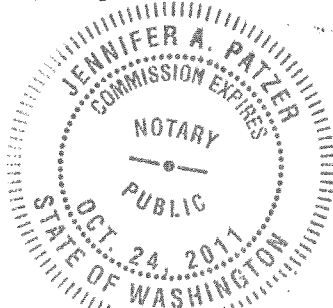

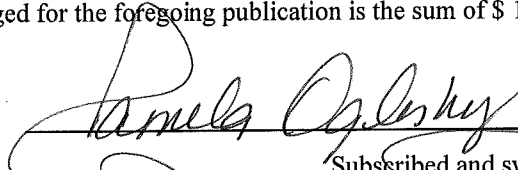
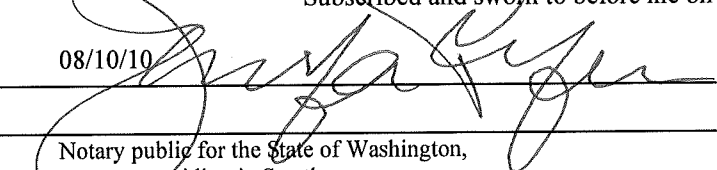
