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2 AN ORDINANCE relating to the Technology Matching Fund Program; making allocations and
3 authorizing implementation of certain Technology Matching Fund projects in 2011;
4 providing that 2011 appropriations for the Technology Matching Fund from the Cable

8 WHEREAS, the City of Seattle has determined that it is important to enable digital equity and
9 provide opportunity for all its residents, including sufficient access to electronic
10 information, technology literacy, and the application of technology for civic
11 engagement; and

12 WHEREAS, Resolution 29673 established a Technology Matching Fund Program for such
13 purposes and identified project selection criteria and a process for selecting projects; and

14 WHEREAS, the City of Seattle has appropriated \$320,000, with \$225,000 in the 2011 Adopted
15 Budget and an additional \$95,000 in the 2011 First Quarter Supplemental Budget
16 (Ordinance 123664), from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the
17 Information Technology Fund for the Community Technology Program to implement
18 Technology Matching Fund projects; and

19 WHEREAS, the Citizens' Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Board (CTTAB) has
20 recommended projects for funding, and the Chief Technology Officer (CTO) concurs
21 with those recommendations; NOW, THEREFORE,

22 **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:**

23 Section 1. The Mayor or his designee is hereby authorized to proceed with

3 carry over into the 2012 fiscal year until fully expended, abandoned or reappropriated to other
4 authorized activities; provided, however, that the appropriations shall lapse at the end of the 2012
5 fiscal year unless carried over further by a future ordinance.
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8 Section 4. Any acts done consistent with and after the passage and prior to the effective
9 date of this ordinance are hereby ratified and confirmed.
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11 Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by
12 the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it
13 shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Technology Matching Fund Program; making allocations and authorizing implementation of certain Technology Matching Fund projects in 2011; providing that 2011 appropriations for the Technology Matching Fund from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the Information Technology Fund shall automatically carry forward into the 2012 fiscal year; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts.

Summary of the Legislation:

This legislation authorizes the disbursement of \$320,000 from the Department of Information Technology, Office of Electronic Communications Budget Control Level (D4400), Community Technology Program to 23 grantees for the purpose of increasing residents' technology access and literacy, and for increasing civic engagement using information technologies. The 2011 Adopted Budget appropriated \$225,000 of these funds and an additional \$95,000 was appropriated in the 2011 First Quarter Supplemental Budget (Ordinance 123664) from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the Information Technology Fund.

The projects to be funded will assist a wide range of residents in need, including the unemployed and homeless, low income entrepreneurs, at-risk youth, immigrants and refugees, seniors, and people with disabilities. Almost half (48%) of this year's projects are new grantee organizations. Eight of the projects this year will increase use of technology for community building and civic engagement. Twelve of the 23 organizations have been funded by the Technology Matching Fund in the last 5 years, which builds on and sustains existing capacity. These projects will reach thousands of residents with employment training, homework help, STEM education, community safety, and health information online. Participants will be gaining skills in using social media, assistive technologies, audio and video production, and digital storytelling, in addition to basic computer and Internet skills.

Background:

Resolution 29673 established the Technology Matching Fund (TMF) to make matching grants to eligible organizations for the purpose of promoting citizen access to information technology and literacy in using technology, and to apply technology to foster civic engagement. The resolution established project eligibility and selection criteria, with the proviso that additional requirements may be established as necessary by the Chief Technology Officer (CTO), in consultation with the Citizens' Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Board (CTTAB), to ensure projects



meet the program goals and are consistent with other City contracting and financial accountability rules and regulations.

The TMF awarded a total of \$2,150,832 for 177 projects between 1998 and 2010. The maximum allowable award per project by legislation is \$50,000; the current maximum award per project is \$20,000. The current maximum award was set in order to ensure that a greater number of projects could be supported by the TMF. In 2011, \$320,000 was appropriated for these grants and the revenue was generated from cable television franchise fees.

The City's contribution to the organizations receiving grants will be matched by the community through cash, donations of hardware, software and supplies and labor. A one-to-one match is required; however, the community contribution is often greater than the City's support. This year's projects are projected to provide more than \$844,172 in community matching resources.

The CTO is required to submit recommendations for funding to the City Council for approval. Recommendations for funding projects are made to the CTO by CTTAB. This year five current members and two former members of CTTAB served on the TMF Application Review Committee. A summary of the projects recommended for funding is provided in the table below.

These funds are appropriated from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund (00160) for the Cable Fee Support to Information Technology Fund Budget Control Level (D160B), and then in turn from the Information Technology Fund (50410) for the Office of Electronic Communications Budget Control Level (D4400). The proposed legislation specifies that any portion of the \$320,000 allocated for the TMF from these appropriations that is not spent or encumbered in 2011 will automatically carry over into the 2012 fiscal year.

Dear Council President Conlin:

I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill that approves a total of \$320,000 in Technology Matching Funds for 23 community projects. The proposed projects were selected from 56 applications reviewed by the Citizens' Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Board (CTTAB) and reviewed by the Chief Technology Officer (CTO). These projects further the City's commitment to supporting youth and families, broadband adoption, public safety, inclusive public engagement and race and social justice. The projects will assist a wide range of residents in need, including the unemployed and homeless, low income entrepreneurs, at-risk youth, immigrants and refugees, seniors, and people with disabilities. A variety of projects will provide residents with employment training, homework help, STEM education, community safety, and health information online.

Resolution 29673 established the Technology Matching Fund to make matching grants to eligible organizations for the purpose of promoting citizen access to information technology and literacy in using technology, and to apply technology to foster civic engagement. While access to technology has increased for many, our Seattle Technology Access and Adoption study and other national reports still show significant gaps in access, literacy skills and social media skills that are essential for full participation in our digital society. The projects selected by CTTAB for funding serve to minimize this gap and further our efforts to make Seattle a city of digital inclusion, rather than exclusion.




