The City Budget Office formally accepts these funds by compiling departmental grants acceptances and similar agreements into three separate ordinances in the first, second, and fourth quarter of the year. The attached ordinance contains grant-related requests received during the fourth quarter of 2011.

Dear Council President Conlin:

I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill, which accepts grants and private funds from various agencies and organizations. Corresponding appropriations for items in this Council Bill are included in the City Budget Office's 2011 Fourth Quarter Supplemental Ordinance, which is being transmitted to the Council under separate cover.

This Bill accepts 34 grants or private funds from various agencies or organizations totaling approximately \$20.7 million on behalf of nine City departments: the Seattle Fire Department, the Seattle Police Department, the Department of Information Technology, the Department of Parks and Recreation, the Office of Civil Rights, the Human Services Department, Seattle City Light, the Department of Transportation, and Seattle Public Utilities.

In addition, the Bill accepts a subsidized loan in the amount of \$4 million to the Seattle Public Utilities from the State of Washington Public Works Trust Fund. This 0.5% 20-year loan will provide low-interest funding for property acquisition, design and construction of a 3 million gallon storm water detention facility and water quality treatment pond located at North 107th Street and Midvale Ave North.


