COUNCIL BILL 117919

AN ORDINANCE relating to the City's traffic code; amending various sections and subsections in and adding sections to Chapters 3.33, 11.14, 11.20, 11.22, 11.30, 11.31, 11.56, 11.57, 11.58, 11.64, 11.72 and 11.84 of the Seattle Municipal Code to conform with changes in state law.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 3.33.020 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as follows:

3.33.020 Jurisdiction—Authority.

The Municipal Court has jurisdiction to try violations of all City ordinances and all other actions brought to enforce or recover license penalties or forfeitures declared or given by any such ordinances. It is empowered to forfeit cash bail or bail bonds and issue execution thereon, to hear and determine all causes, civil or criminal, arising under such ordinances, and to pronounce judgment in accordance therewith; provided, that for a violation of the criminal provisions of an ordinance no greater punishment shall be imposed than is authorized by state law. Judges of the Municipal Court shall not defer sentence for an offense sentenced under Section 11.56.025. As authorized by RCW 35.20.255, the period of probation shall not extend for more than five (5) years from the date of conviction for a defendant sentenced under Section 11.56.025 or for a domestic violence crime, which includes any non-felony crime listed in RCW 10.99.020, and the following crimes when committed by one (1) family or household member, as that term is defined in Section 12A.06.120, against another: Assault under Section 12A.06.010, Stalking under Section 12A.06.035, Reckless Endangerment under Section 12A.06.050, Coercion under Section 12A.06.090, Interfering with the Reporting of Domestic Violence under Section 12A.06.187, Violation of an Order under Section 12A.06.180, Property Destruction under Section 12A.08.020, Criminal Trespass First Degree under Section 12A.08.040 and Criminal Trespass



1 Second Degree under Section 12A.08.040; and two (2) years in all other cases. All civil and criminal
2 proceedings in Municipal Court, and judgments rendered therein, shall be subject to review in the
3 Superior Court by writ of review or on appeal. Costs in civil and criminal cases may be taxed as
4 provided by law.

5 Section 2. A new section is added to Chapter 11.14 of the Seattle Municipal Code as follows:

6 **11.14.637 THC concentration.**

7 “THC concentration” means nanograms of delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol per milliliter of a
8 person's whole blood. THC concentration does not include measurement of the metabolite THC-COOH,
9 also known as carboxy-THC. (RCW 46.04. ___)

10 Section 3. Section 11.20.340 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as follows:

11 **11.20.340 Financial responsibility required.**

12 A. No person may operate a motor vehicle subject to registration under Chapter 46.16A RCW in
13 this City unless the person is insured under a motor vehicle liability policy with liability limits of at least
14 the amounts provided in RCW 46.29.090, is self-insured as provided in RCW 46.29.630, is covered by a
15 certificate of deposit in conformance with RCW 46.29.550, or is covered by a liability bond of at least
16 the amounts provided in RCW 46.29.090. Proof (~~Written proof~~) of financial responsibility for motor
17 vehicle operation must be provided on the request of a law enforcement officer in the format specified
18 under RCW 46.30.030.

19 B. A person who drives a motor vehicle that is required to be registered in another state that
20 requires drivers and owners of vehicles in that state to maintain insurance or financial responsibility
21 shall, when requested by a law enforcement officer, provide evidence of financial responsibility or
22 insurance as is required by the laws of the state in which the vehicle is registered.
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1 C. When asked to do so by a law enforcement officer, failure to display proof of financial
2 responsibility for motor vehicle operation (~~(an insurance identification card)~~) as specified under RCW
3 46.30.030 creates a presumption that the person does not have motor vehicle insurance.

4 D. Failure to provide proof of motor vehicle insurance is a traffic infraction and is subject to
5 penalties as set by the supreme court under RCW 46.63.110 or community service.

6 E. For the purposes of this section, when a person uses a portable electronic device to display
7 proof of financial security to a law enforcement officer, the officer may only view the proof of financial
8 security and is otherwise prohibited from viewing any other content on the portable electronic device.

9 F. Whenever a person presents a portable electronic device pursuant to this section, that person
10 assumes all liability for any damage to the portable electronic device. (RCW 46.30.020(1))

11 Section 4. Section 11.20.347 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as follows:

12 **11.20.347 Scope of financial responsibility sections.**

13 The provisions of Sections 11.20.340 and 11.20.345 shall not govern:

14 A. The operation of a motor vehicle registered under RCW 46.18.220 or 46.18.255
15 ~~((46.16.305(4)))~~, governed by RCW 46.16A.170 ~~((46.16.020))~~, or registered with the Washington
16 Utilities and Transportation Commission as common or contract carriers; or

17 B. The operation of a motorcycle as defined in Section 11.14.340, a motor-driven cycle as
18 defined in Section 11.14.345, or a moped as defined in RCW 46.04.304. (RCW 46.30.020(3))

19 Section 5. A new section is added to Chapter 11.22 of the Seattle Municipal Code as follows:

20 **11.22.085 License plate must correspond with vehicle registration.**

21 A. 1. It is unlawful for a person to display a license plate on a vehicle that does not match or
22 correspond with the registration of the vehicle unless the vehicle is inventory for a properly licensed
23 vehicle dealer.

1 2. It is unlawful for a person to have an installed license plate flipping device on a vehicle, use
2 technology to flip a license plate on a vehicle, or use technology to change the appearance of a license
3 plate on a vehicle.

4 3. It is unlawful for a person or entity to sell a license plate flipping device or sell technology
5 that will change the appearance of a license plate.

6 B A person who switches or flips license plates on a vehicle physically, utilizes technology to
7 flip or change the appearance of a license plate on a vehicle, sells a license plate flipping device or
8 technology that will change the appearance of a license plate, or falsifies a vehicle registration in
9 violation of this section, in addition to any traffic infraction, is guilty of a gross misdemeanor punishable
10 by confinement of up to three hundred sixty-four (364) days in jail and a fine of one thousand dollars
11 (\$1,000) for the first offense, two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for a second offense, and five
12 thousand dollars (\$5,000) for any subsequent offense, which may not be suspended, deferred, or
13 reduced.

14 C. For purposes of this section, "license plate flipping device" means a device that enables a
15 license plate on a vehicle to be changed to another license plate either manually or electronically.
16 "License plate flipping device" includes technology that is capable of changing the appearance of a
17 license plate to appear as a different license plate. (RCW 46.37.____)

18 Section 6. Subsection A of Section 11.30.120 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as
19 follows:

20 **11.30.120 Redemption of impounded vehicles.**

21 Vehicles impounded by the City shall be redeemed only under the following circumstances:

22 A. The vehicle may be redeemed only by the following persons or entities: the legal owner;
23 ~~((Only))~~ the registered owner; ~~((;))~~ a person authorized in writing by the registered owner; the vehicle's
24



1 insurer or a vendor working on behalf of the vehicle's insurer; a third-party insurer that has a duty to
2 repair or replace the vehicle, has obtained consent from the registered owner or the owner's agent to
3 move the vehicle, and has documented that consent in the insurer's claim file, or a vendor working on
4 behalf of a third-party insurer that has received such consent; provided, however, that at all times the
5 registered owner must be granted access to and may reclaim possession of the vehicle. For the purposes
6 of this subsection, "owner's agent" means the legal owner of the vehicle, a driver in possession of the
7 vehicle with the registered owner's permission, or an adult member of the registered owner's family; a
8 person who is determined and verified by the operator to have the permission of the registered owner of
9 the vehicle; or a person (~~or one~~) who has purchased the vehicle from the registered owner, who
10 produces proof of ownership or authorization and signs a receipt therefore (~~may redeem an impounded~~
11 vehicle)). A person redeeming a vehicle impounded pursuant to Section 11.30.105 must prior to
12 redemption establish that he or she has a valid driver's license and is in compliance with Section
13 11.20.340. A vehicle impounded pursuant to Section 11.30.105 can be released only pursuant to a
14 written release authorization from the Seattle Police Department pursuant to Section 11.30.120 C or a
15 written release authorization or order from Municipal Court pursuant to Section 11.30.120 B or C.

16 * * *

17 Section 7. Section 11.31.121 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as follows:

18 **11.31.121 Monetary penalties—Parking infractions**

19 The base monetary penalty for violation of each of the numbered provisions of the Seattle
20 Municipal Code listed in the following table is as shown, unless and until the penalty shown below for a
21 particular parking infraction is modified by Local Rule of the Seattle Municipal Court adopted pursuant
22 to the Infraction Rules for Courts of Limited Jurisdiction ("IRLJ") or successor rules to the IRLJ:

3 Section 8. Section 11.56.020 of the Seattle Municipal Code and the title of that section are
4 amended as follows:

5 **11.56.020 Persons under the influence of intoxicating liquor, marijuana or any drug.**

6 A. Driving While Intoxicated.

7 1. A person is guilty of driving while under the influence of intoxicating Liquor, marijuana or
8 any drug if the person drives a vehicle within the City:

9 a. And the person has, within two (2) hours after driving, an alcohol concentration of 0.08 or
10 higher, as shown by analysis of the person's breath or blood made under RCW 46.61.506; or

11 b. The person has, within two (2) hours after driving, a THC concentration of 5.00 or higher as
12 shown by analysis of the person's blood made under RCW 46.61.506; or

13 c. ~~((b-))~~ While the person is under the influence of or affected by intoxicating liquor, marijuana
14 or any drug; or

15 d. ~~((e-))~~ While the person is under the combined influence of or affected by intoxicating liquor,
16 marijuana and any drug.

17 2. The fact that any person charged with a violation of this subsection is or has been entitled to
18 use a drug under the laws of this state shall not constitute a defense against any charge of violating this
19 subsection.
20

21 3. a. It is an affirmative defense to a violation of subsection A1a of this section which the
22 defendant must prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant consumed a sufficient
23 quantity of alcohol after the time of driving and before the administration of an analysis of the person's
24



1 breath or blood to cause the defendant's alcohol concentration to be 0.08 or higher (~~more~~) within two
2 (2) hours after driving. The court shall not admit evidence of this defense unless the defendant notifies
3 the prosecution prior to the omnibus or pretrial hearing in the case of the defendant's intent to assert the
4 affirmative defense.

5 b. It is an affirmative defense to a violation of subsection A1b of this section, which the
6 defendant must prove by a preponderance of the evidence, that the defendant consumed a sufficient
7 quantity of marijuana after the time of driving and before the administration of an analysis of the
8 person's blood to cause the defendant's THC concentration to be 5.00 or higher within two (2) hours
9 after driving. The court shall not admit evidence of this defense unless the defendant notifies the
10 prosecution prior to the omnibus or pretrial hearing in the case of the defendant's intent to assert the
11 affirmative defense.

12 4. a. Analysis of blood or breath samples obtained more than two (2) hours after the alleged
13 driving may be used as evidence that within two (2) hours after the alleged driving a person had an
14 alcohol concentration of 0.08 or higher (~~more~~) in violation of subsection A1a of this section, and in
15 any case in which the analysis shows an alcohol concentration above 0.00 may be used as evidence that
16 a person was under the influence of or affected by intoxicating liquor or any drug in violation of
17 subsections (~~A1b or~~) A1c or A1d of this section.

18 b. Analyses of blood samples obtained more than two (2) hours after the alleged driving may be
19 used as evidence that within two (2) hours of the alleged driving a person had a THC concentration of
20 5.00 or higher in violation of subsection A1b of this section, and in any case in which the analysis shows
21 a THC concentration above 0.00 may be used as evidence that a person was under the influence of or
22 affected by marijuana in violation of subsection A1c or A1d of this section.

23 5. Driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any drug is a gross misdemeanor.
24



B. Physical Control.

1 1. A person is guilty of being in actual physical control of a motor vehicle while under the
2 influence of intoxicating liquor, marijuana or any drug if the person has actual physical control of a
3 vehicle within the City:

4 a. And the person has, within two (2) hours after being in actual physical control of the vehicle,
5 an alcohol concentration of 0.08 or higher, as shown by analysis of the person's breath or blood made
6 under RCW 46.61.506; or

7 b. The person has, within two (2) hours after being in actual physical control of a vehicle, a THC
8 concentration of 5.00 or higher as shown by analysis of the person's blood made under RCW 46.61.506;

9 or

10 c. While the person is under the influence of or affected by intoxicating liquor, marijuana or any
11 drug; or

12 d. ((e-)) While the person is under the combined influence of or affected by intoxicating liquor,
13 marijuana and any drug.

14 2. The fact that any person charged with a violation of this subsection is or has been entitled to
15 use a drug under the laws of this state shall not constitute a defense against any charge of violating this
16 subsection. No person may be convicted under this subsection if, prior to being pursued by a law
17 enforcement officer, the person has moved the vehicle safely off the roadway.

18 3. a. It is an affirmative defense to a violation of subsection B1a of this section which the
19 defendant must prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant consumed a sufficient
20 quantity of alcohol after the time of being in actual physical control of the vehicle and before the
21 administration of an analysis of the person's breath or blood to cause the defendant's alcohol
22 concentration to be 0.08 or higher ((more)) within two (2) hours after being in actual physical control of
23
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1 the vehicle. The court shall not admit evidence of this defense unless the defendant notifies the
2 prosecution prior to the omnibus or pretrial hearing in the case of the defendant's intent to assert the
3 affirmative defense

4 b. It is an affirmative defense to a violation of subsection B1b of this section, which the
5 defendant must prove by a preponderance of the evidence, that the defendant consumed a sufficient
6 quantity of marijuana after the time of being in actual physical control of the vehicle and before the
7 administration of an analysis of the person's blood to cause the defendant's THC concentration to be
8 5.00 or higher within two (2) hours after being in control of the vehicle. The court shall not admit
9 evidence of this defense unless the defendant notifies the prosecution prior to the omnibus or pretrial
10 hearing in the case of the defendant's intent to assert the affirmative defense.

11 4. a. Analysis of blood or breath samples obtained more than two (2) hours after the alleged
12 being in actual physical control of a vehicle may be used as evidence that within two (2) hours after the
13 alleged being in actual physical control of a vehicle a person had an alcohol concentration of 0.08 or
14 higher ((more)) in violation of subsection B1a of this section, and in any case in which the analysis
15 shows an alcohol concentration above 0.00 may be used as evidence that a person was under the
16 influence of or affected by intoxicating liquor or any drug in violation of subsections ((B1b-or)) B1c or
17 B1d of this section.

18 b. Analyses of blood samples obtained more than two (2) hours after the alleged being in actual
19 physical control of a vehicle may be used as evidence that within two (2) hours of the alleged being in
20 control of the vehicle, a person had a THC concentration of 5.00 or higher in violation of subsection B1b
21 of this section, and in any case in which the analysis shows a THC concentration above 0.00 may be
22 used as evidence that a person was under the influence of or affected by marijuana in violation of
23 subsection B1c or B1d of this section.



1 5. Being in actual physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating
2 liquor or any drug is a gross misdemeanor.

3 C. Minor Driving Or Being In Actual Physical Control Of A Motor Vehicle After Consuming
4 Alcohol.

5 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of this title, a person is guilty of minor driving or being
6 in actual physical control of a motor vehicle after consuming alcohol or marijuana if the person:

7 a. Operates or is in actual physical control of a motor vehicle in the City;

8 b. Is under the age of twenty-one (21); and

9 c. Has, within two (2) hours after operating or being in actual physical control of the motor
10 vehicle, either an alcohol concentration of at least 0.02 but less than 0.08, as shown by an analysis of the
11 person's breath or blood made under RCW 46.61.506; or a THC concentration above 0.00 but less than
12 the concentration specified in subsection Alb of this section, as shown by analysis of the person's blood
13 made under RCW 46.61.506.

14 2. It is an affirmative defense to a violation of this subsection which the defendant must prove by
15 a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant consumed a sufficient quantity of alcohol or
16 marijuana after the time of driving or being in actual physical control of the vehicle and before the
17 administration of an analysis of the person's breath or blood to cause the defendant's alcohol or THC
18 concentration to be in violation of subsection C1 of this section (~~at least 0.02 but less than 0.08~~) within
19 two (2) hours after driving or being in actual physical control of the vehicle. The court shall not admit
20 evidence of this defense unless the defendant notifies the prosecution prior to the earlier of (a) seven (7)
21 days prior to trial; or (b) the omnibus or pretrial hearing in the case of the defendant's intent to assert the
22 affirmative defense.
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1 3. Analysis of blood or breath samples obtained more than two (2) hours after the alleged driving
2 or being in actual physical control of the vehicle may be used as evidence that within two (2) hours after
3 the alleged driving or being in actual physical control of the vehicle a person had an alcohol or THC
4 concentration in violation of this subsection.

5 4. Minor driving or being in actual physical control of a motor vehicle after consuming alcohol is
6 a misdemeanor.

7 D. Mandatory Appearance After Charging and Conditions of Release.

8 1. A defendant who is charged with a violation of this section shall be required to appear in
9 person before a judicial officer within one (1) judicial day after the arrest if the defendant is served with
10 a citation or complaint at the time of the arrest. The Municipal Court may by local court rule waive the
11 requirement for an appearance within one (1) judicial day if it provides for the appearance at the earliest
12 practicable day following arrest and establishes the method for identifying that day in the rule.

13 2. A defendant who is charged with a violation of this section and who is not served with a
14 citation or complaint at the time of the incident shall appear in court for arraignment in person as soon as
15 practicable, but in no event later than fourteen (14) days after the next day on which court is in session
16 following the issuance of the citation or the filing of the complaint or information.

17 3. At the time of an appearance required by this subsection, the court shall determine the
18 necessity of imposing conditions of pretrial release according to the procedures established by court rule
19 for a preliminary appearance or an arraignment.

20 4. Appearances required by this subsection are mandatory and may not be waived.

21 5. Failure of the court to comply with the requirements of this subsection shall not be grounds
22 for dismissal of any charge under this section nor the establishment of a constructive date of arraignment
23 for purposes of Criminal Rule for Courts of Limited Jurisdiction 3.3.
24

1 6. a. When any person charged with or arrested for a violation of subsection A or B of this
2 section, in which the person has a prior offense as defined in RCW 46.61.5055 and the current offense
3 involves alcohol, is released from custody before arraignment or trial on bail or personal recognizance,
4 the Municipal Court shall require, as a condition of release, that person (i) have a functioning ignition
5 interlock device installed on all motor vehicles operated by the person, with proof of installation filed
6 with the court by the person or the certified interlock provider within five (5) business days of the date
7 of release from custody or as soon thereafter as determined by the court based on availability within the
8 jurisdiction; or (ii) comply with 24/7 sobriety program monitoring, as defined in Laws of 2013, 2nd Sp.
9 Sess., chapter 35, section 26; or both.

10 (b) Upon acquittal or dismissal of all pending or current charges relating to a violation of
11 subsection A or B of this section, the court shall authorize removal of the ignition interlock device and
12 lift any requirement to comply with electronic alcohol/drug monitoring imposed under this subsection.
13 Nothing in this section limits the authority of the court under Section 11.20.230.

14 Section 9. Section 11.56.025 of the Seattle Municipal Code is amended as follows:

15 **11.56.025 Penalty for persons under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any drug.**

16 * * *

17 B.1. A person who is convicted of a violation of Subsection 11.56.020 A or B who has one (1)
18 prior offense within seven (7) years and whose alcohol concentration was less than 0.15, or for any
19 reason other than the person's refusal to take a test offered pursuant to RCW 46.20.308 there is no test
20 result indicating the person's alcohol concentration, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than
21 thirty (30) consecutive days nor more than three hundred sixty-four (364) days, sixty (60) days of
22 electronic home monitoring, and a fine of not less than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) nor more than Five
23 Thousand Dollars (\$5,000). In lieu of the mandatory minimum term of sixty (60) days of electronic
24



1 home monitoring, the court may order at least an additional four (4) days in jail or, if available in
2 Seattle, a six-month period of 24/7 sobriety program monitoring pursuant to Laws of 2013, 2nd Sp. Sess.,
3 chapter 35, sections 23 through 32, and the court shall order an expanded alcohol assessment and
4 treatment, if deemed appropriate by the assessment.

5 2. A person who is convicted of a violation of Subsection 11.56.020 A or B who has one (1)
6 prior offense within seven (7) years and whose alcohol concentration was 0.15 or more, or who refused
7 to take a test offered pursuant to RCW 46.20.308, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than
8 forty-five (45) consecutive days nor more than three hundred sixty-four (364) days, ninety (90) days of
9 electronic home monitoring, and a fine of not less than Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750) nor more
10 than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000). In lieu of the mandatory minimum term of ninety (90) days of
11 electronic home monitoring, the court may order at least an additional six (6) days in jail or, if available
12 in Seattle, a six-month period of 24/7 sobriety program monitoring pursuant to Laws of 2013, 2nd Sp.
13 Sess., chapter 35, sections 23 through 32, and the court shall order an expanded alcohol assessment and
14 treatment, if deemed appropriate by the assessment.

15 C. 1.A person who is convicted of a violation of Subsection 11.56.020 A or B who has two (2)
16 or more prior offenses within seven (7) years and whose alcohol concentration was less than 0.15, or for
17 any reason other than the person's refusal to take a test offered pursuant to RCW 46.20.308 there is no
18 test result indicating the person's alcohol concentration, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less
19 than ninety (90) consecutive days nor more than three hundred sixty-four (364) days, if available in
20 Seattle, a six-month period of 24/7 sobriety program monitoring pursuant to Laws of 2013, 2nd Sp. Sess.,
21 chapter 35, sections 23 through 32, one hundred twenty (120) days of electronic home monitoring, and a
22 fine of not less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) nor more than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000). In
23 lieu of the mandatory minimum term of one hundred twenty (120) days of electronic home monitoring,
24



1 the court may order at least an additional eight (8) days in jail. The court shall order an expanded
2 alcohol assessment and treatment, if deemed appropriate by the assessment.

3 2. A person who is convicted of a violation of Subsection 11.56.020 A or B who has two (2) or
4 more prior offenses within seven (7) years and whose alcohol concentration was 0.15 or more, or who
5 refused to take a test offered pursuant to RCW 46.20.308, shall be punished by imprisonment for not
6 less than one hundred twenty (120) consecutive days nor more than three hundred sixty-four (364) days,
7 if available in Seattle, a six-month period of 24/7 sobriety program monitoring pursuant to Laws of
8 2013, 2nd Sp. Sess., chapter 35, sections 23 through 32, one hundred fifty (150) days of electronic home
9 monitoring, and a fine of not less than One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500) nor more than Five
10 Thousand Dollars (\$5,000). In lieu of the mandatory minimum term of one hundred fifty (150) days of
11 electronic home monitoring, the court may order at least an additional ten (10) days in jail. The court
12 shall order an expanded alcohol assessment and treatment, if deemed appropriate by the assessment.

13 D. “Prior offense,” “treatment” (~~offense~~) and “within seven (7) years” have the same meaning
14 as in RCW 46.61.5055.

15 E. If a person convicted of a violation of Subsection 11.56.020 A or B committed the offense
16 while a passenger under the age of sixteen (16) years was in the vehicle, the court shall:

17 1. order the use of an ignition interlock or other device under RCW 46.20.720 for an additional
18 six (6) months;

19 2. in any case in which the person has no prior offenses within seven (7) years, order an
20 additional twenty-four (24) hours of imprisonment and ((a penalty by)) a fine of not less than One

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to the City's traffic code; amending various sections and subsections in and adding sections to Chapters 3.33, 11.14, 11.20, 11.22, 11.30, 11.31, 11.56, 11.57, 11.58, 11.64, 11.72 and 11.84 of the Seattle Municipal Code to conform with changes in state law.

Summary of the Legislation:

This ordinance prohibits Municipal Court from deferring sentence for a DUI or Physical Control conviction, allows proof of automobile insurance to be displayed to a police officer on a portable electronic device, prohibits displaying a license plate that was not issued for the car, allows an automobile insurer to redeem an impounded car, increases the monetary penalty for unlawful parking at an electric vehicle charging station from \$42 to \$124, prohibits driving or being in physical control of a car while having a specified THC concentration, requires that a defendant charged with alcohol-related DUI or Physical Control who has a prior offense have an ignition interlock device installed on his car as a condition of pretrial release, authorizes alcohol treatment in lieu of electronic home detention for a defendant convicted of DUI or Physical Control who has a prior offense, increases the mandatory minimum punishment for a defendant convicted of DUI or Physical Control where a passenger under 16 was in the car, specifies the conditions for motorcycles occupying a lane of traffic, prohibits driving a car in a negligent manner and while exhibiting the effects of having consumed marijuana, authorizes a tow truck driver to allow persons to ride in a vehicle carried on a flatbed tow truck, and prohibits a commercial vehicle driver from sending a text message or using a cell phone while driving.

Dear Council President Clark:

Enclosed for the City Council's consideration is an ordinance making several changes to Seattle's traffic code to reflect changes made to the corresponding state statutes by the 2013 Legislature. These changes are necessary because our traffic code must be identical with state law.

Section 1 prohibits Municipal Court from deferring imposition of a sentence imposed for a DUI or Physical Control conviction. Section 3 authorizes display of automobile insurance on a cell phone. Section 5 requires that a vehicle's license plate match its registration. Section 6 allows redemption of an impounded vehicle by the owner's insurer. Section 7 increases the penalty for unlawful parking at an electric vehicle charging station from \$42 to \$124. Sections 2 and 8 prohibit driving or being in physical control of a vehicle while having a specified THC concentration and require that a defendant charged with an alcohol-related DUI or Physical Control who has a prior conviction have an ignition interlock device installed on his car as a condition of pretrial release. Section 9 authorizes alcohol treatment in lieu of electronic home monitoring for a defendant convicted of DUI or Physical Control who has a prior conviction and increases the mandatory minimum punishment for a defendant convicted of DUI or Physical Control where a passenger under 16 was in the vehicle. Section 10 specifies the conditions for motorcycles occupying a lane of traffic. Section 11 prohibits operating a vehicle in a negligent manner and while exhibiting the effects of having consumed marijuana. Section 12 authorizes a tow truck driver to allow persons to ride in a vehicle carried on a flatbed tow truck. Sections 14 and 15 prohibit a commercial truck driver from sending a text message or using a cell phone while driving.

Again, the reason for these changes is that Seattle's traffic code must be the same as state traffic laws.


