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4 AN ORDINANCE authorizing the transfer of a Crown Victoria Police Interceptor to the Seattle
5 Metropolitan Police Museum upon certain conditions being met.

6 WHEREAS, the Seattle Police Department made the decision to gradually retire its fleet of
7 Crown Victoria Police Interceptors and replace them with Ford Police Interceptor Utility
8 vehicles; and

9 WHEREAS, the “Crown Vic” has been the primary vehicle for the Police Department since
10 1995 and is one of the most publicly recognizable symbols of the Department; and

11 WHEREAS, the Seattle Metropolitan Police Museum (“Museum”) was formed in 1997 by
12 Seattle Police Officers and officially recognized by the City Council through Resolution
13 29886 in 1998; and

14 WHEREAS, the Museum holds a fleet of 20 original vintage police vehicles dating from 1949 to
15 present – the largest known collection in the United States – and displays these vehicles
16 at public events around the city and region; and

17 WHEREAS, the Museum has expressed an interest in obtaining a Crown Vic; and

18 WHEREAS, the Department of Finance and Administrative Services estimates the value of a
19 retired single vehicle at \$2,500 and would otherwise be sold as surplus; and

20 WHEREAS, the City Council finds that preserving a Crown Vic in the Museum’s collection
21 would hold historical value and further the efforts of the Museum to “demystify” the
22 policing profession to the public; NOW, THEREFORE,

23 **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:**


24 Section 1. The City Council authorizes the Director of Finance and Administrative
25 Services to negotiate and execute an agreement with the Seattle Metropolitan Police Museum for
26 the transfer of a single Crown Victoria Police Interceptor deemed surplus from the Seattle Police
27 Department to the Museum. The agreement should provide that the Museum will use the vehicle
28 to further its mission to improve police-community relations through education about the history




1 of policing in Seattle and King County. The use and display of the vehicle at public activities that
2 improve police-community relations shall constitute the compensation to the City, in lieu of cash
3 payment, for the transfer of the vehicle.

4 Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by
5 the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it
6 shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE authorizing the transfer of a Crown Victoria Police Interceptor to the Seattle Metropolitan Police Museum upon certain conditions being met.

Summary of the Legislation: This legislation authorizes the Director of Finance and Administrative Services to negotiate and execute an agreement with the Seattle Metropolitan Police Museum for the transfer of a single Crown Victoria Police Interceptor deemed surplus from the Seattle Police Department to the Museum. The Museum's use and display of the vehicle at public activities that improve police-community relations shall constitute the compensation to the City, in lieu of cash payment, for the transfer of the vehicle.

Background:

The Seattle Metropolitan Police Museum holds a fleet of 20 original vintage police vehicles dating from 1949 to the present. The Seattle Police Department made the decision to gradually retire its fleet of Crown Victoria Police Interceptors and replace them with Ford Police Interceptor Utility vehicles and the Museum expressed an interest in obtaining a single vehicle.

The Department of Finance and Administrative Services estimates the value of a retired single vehicle at \$2,500 and the vehicle, if not transferred to the museum, would be sold as surplus and this revenue would be realized by the City. The museum is providing in-kind public relations services to the City in lieu of paying this \$2,500 in cash.

Yes, Finance and Administrative Services would have to negotiate and execute the agreement called for in the bill. The Police Department will benefit from improved relationships with the community.

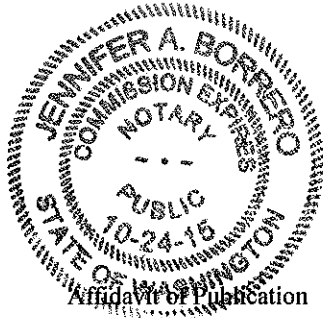
