# RESOLUTION SPECIFYING GROUPS TO BE TARGETED BY THE HOUSING LEVY'S SPECIAL NEEDS PROGRAM

BACKGROUND / WHAT THIS RESOLUTION DOES

As you will recall, the Housing and Human Services Committee has looked at this issue twice in recent weeks: HSSPO presented their research and recommendations on populations to be served by the Levy's Special Needs Program, and then a panel discussed these recommendations at the last Committee meeting.

This resolution essentially states that the Special Needs Program should be targeted to the homeless in general and to the groups recommended by HSSPO in particular. In addition, however, the resolution states that some flexibility should be provided for programs for homeless individuals not on HSSPO's list (Section 3), as recommended by several participants in the panel discussion.
