WHEREAS, the residents of Seattle and those throughout Washington State deserve to breath clean air, drink healthy water, and live in protected environments; and

WHEREAS, over 600,000 Washingtonians live with asthma and thousands more suffer from

2	commitments to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and meet Seattle's commitment to the
3	Paris Climate Agreement; and
4	WHEREAS, Seattle is a signatory to the King County-Cities Climate Collaboration Joint Letter
5	of Commitment, which includes the following:
6 7 8 9 10 11 12	Catalytic Policy Commitment: Advocate for comprehensive federal, regional and state science-based limits and a market-based price on carbon pollution and other greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. A portion of revenue from these policies should support local GHG reduction efforts that align with these Joint County-City Climate Commitments, such as funding for transit service, energy efficiency projects, and forest protection and restoration initiatives.
13	WHEREAS, state, county, and City shared climate change goals cannot be met without the
14	accelerated phase-out of electricity produced by burning fossil fuels and replacement
15	with renewable energy, investments in energy efficiency, cleaner forms of transportation,
16	and investments in healthy forests and agriculture, all of which will be aided by the
17	passage of Initiative Measure 1631 ("I-1631"); and
18	WHEREAS, The City of Seattle supports policies that provide consumers with cleaner, more
19	affordable, and more efficient fuel, energy, and transportation choices; and
20	WHEREAS, the largest corporate polluters, causing the most damage to our health, are currently
21	not held accountable nor required to mitigate the damage they cause to our communities;

5	pollution by targeting investments to provide direct, meaningful, and assured benefits to
6	those communities; and
7	WHEREAS, I-1631 provides assistance to families with low incomes as we transition to clean
8	energy; and
9	WHEREAS, I-1631 invests in our state's natural resources, which are vital to our state's
10	economy and industries like agriculture, timber, tourism, and fishing, and which protect
11	our health by reducing pollution in the air and water, and secure our community by
12	lowering the risk of fires, floods, and landslides; and
13	WHEREAS, I-1631 provides funding to restore and protect estuaries, fisheries, and marine
14	shoreline habitats; prepare for sea level rise; increase sustainable supply of water; and

17	WHEREAS, I-1631 respects tribal sovereignty and ensures that affected communities and tribal
