WHEREAS, Ordinance 102229 created the Landmarks Preservation Board and established a procedure for the designation and preservation of structures and areas having historical, cultural, architectural, engineering or geographical importance; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance 102229 and due notice, the Landmarks Preservation Board after a public hearing on November 5, 1975 considered (a) the evidence and testimony presented at such hearing, including the Seattle Historic Building Data Sheet in C.F. 283720, and (b) the conformance or lack of conformance of the proposed designation with the Comprehensive Plan of Seattle and with the purposes and standards of Ordinance 102229, and based upon such evidence and consideration determined that Trinity Parish Church situated upon

Lots 2, 3, 6 and 7, Block 57, Terry's 1st Addition

at 609 Eighth Avenue, Seattle, satisfies each of the following criteria required under Ordinance 102229 for designation of a Landmark:

Section 6. "(3) exemplifies the cultural, political, economic, social or historic heritage of the community;"

Section 6. "(4) portrays the environment in an era of history characterized by a distinctive architectural style;" and

Section 6. "(9) owing to its unique location or singular physical characteristic, represents an established and familiar visual feature of the neighborhood, community or city;"

and recommended to the City Council that the Trinity Parish Church be designated as a Landmark and that certain features thereof should be preserved; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Urban Development Committee of the City Council considered the report and recommendation of the Landmarks Preservation Board at a public hearing held July 21, 1976 pursuant to due notice, and reported to the City Council in favor of such recommendation; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the attached report and recommendations

4 Lots 2, 3, 6 and 7, Block 57, Terry's 1st Addition
5 at 609 Eighth Avenue, Seattle, is hereby designated a Landmark

9 of the Landmark Preservation Board, and the Secretary of the
10 Landmark Preservation Board is hereby directed to send to
11 the owner of record of the property designated, by registered
12 or certified mail, and to the Superintendent of Buildings, a
13 copy of this ordinance and a letter outlining the basis for
14 such designation and the obligations and restrictions which
15 result from such designation within ten days after approval
16 by the Mayor.

17 Section 2. That the following particular features of
18 the Landmark designated in Section 1 above shall be preserved:

- 19 a) the structural form of the Church and its exterior,







By way of clarification and amplification of our prior request for legislation in the C.F. above cited, we request that you forward this letter to the City Council for inclusion in said C.F.

The Landmark Preservation Board, after a public hearing held on November 5, 1975 pursuant to due notice, at which time said Board duly considered (a) the evidence and testimony presented at such hearing, including the Seattle Historical Building Data Sheet in C.F. 283720, and (b) the conformance or lack of conformance of the proposed designation with the Comprehensive Plan of Seattle and with the purposes and standards of Ordinance 102229 and based upon such evidence and consideration determined that the (subject to be designated) Trinity Parish Church

situated upon (legal description of site) Terrys 1st Addition, Block 57, lots 2,3,6 & 7

at (street address or other commonly used description of location of landmark) 609 Eighth Avenue

satisfies each of the following criteria required under Ordinance 102229 for designation as a Landmark:

~~Section 6(1) has significant character, interest or value, as part of the development, heritage or cultural characteristics of the City, State of Nation; or is associated with the life of a person significant in the past;~~

~~Section 6(2) is the site of an historic event with a significant effect upon society;~~

Section 6(3) exemplifies the cultural, political, economic, social or historic heritage of the community;

Section 6(4) portrays the environment in an era of history characterized by a distinctive architectural style;

~~Section 6(5) embodies those distinguishing characteristics of an architectural-type or engineering specimen;~~

~~Section 6(6) is the work of a designer whose individual work has significantly influenced the development of Seattle;~~

~~Section 6(7) contains elements of design, detail, materials or craftsmanship which represent a significant innovation;~~

~~Section 6(8) by being part of or related to a square, park or other distinctive area, should be developed or preserved according to a plan based on a historic, cultural or architectural motif;~~

Section 6(9) owing to its unique location or singular physical characteristic, represents an established and familiar visual feature of the neighborhood, community or city;


and recommends to the City Council that the foregoing Trinity Parish Church be designated as a Landmark and that the following features thereof should be preserved by the following controls:

"That with respect to the above described landmark, no person shall do or cause to be done, any of the following except pursuant to a Certificate of Approval duly issued by the Landmark Preservation Board (See Section 8 of Ordinance 102229):

- a. demolition of the structure, or portions of the structure;
- b. structural changes requiring a building permit;
- c. repair or replacement of exterior masonry and wooden steeple, other than in kind;
- d. painting of exterior trim.

In cases where such proposed changes are necessitated by changes in the liturgy, the owner will communicate the nature of such changes to the Landmarks Preservation Board in order to receive comment, and, if required, a Certificate of Approval. Prior to such issuance, the Board and owner will then jointly explore possible alternative design solutions, such as appropriate or necessary, in order to protect the designated structure. In any such discussions it is understood the owner is the exclusive authority on liturgy and is the decisive party in determining what architectural changes are appropriate to the liturgy.



Section 2. That the following particular features of the Landmark designated in Section 1 above shall be preserved:

a) the structural form of the Church and its exterior, including its exterior masonry and wooden steeple and painting of exterior trim;

provided, that nothing herein shall prevent any changes in such features where such changes are necessitated by changes in the liturgy; it being understood that the owner is the exclusive authority on liturgy and is the decisive party in determining what architectural changes are appropriate to the liturgy; provided further, that when it is proposed to make changes necessitated by changes in the liturgy, the owner shall communicate the nature of such proposed change to the Landmarks Preservation Board in order to receive comment and if required, a Certificate of Approval and prior to the issuance of any required Certificate, the Board and owner shall jointly explore such possible alternative design solutions as may be appropriate or necessary in order to preserve the above-specified features of the designated structure.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.
