ORDINANCE NO. 35757

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit smoking in polling places in the City of Seattle, and providing penalties for violation.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke any cigar, cigarette or pipe, or use tobacco in any form by smoking, in any polling place in the City of Seattle at any election held within said city during the hours such polling place is open for the casting of ballots.

Section 2. Any person found guilty of a violation of the provisions of Section 1 hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred (100) dollars, or imprisoned in the city jail for a term not exceeding thirty (30) days, or may be both fined and imprisoned.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.
