ORDINANCE 99767

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Police Department, establishing a Community Service Officer Program, creating and abolishing certain positions in the Police Department, authorizing the Chief of Police and the Model Cities Director to execute an interdepartmental memorandum and certain agreements in connection therewith; and superseding Ordinances 99575 and 99586 to the extent inconsistent.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Chief of Police is hereby authorized to establish a Community Service Officer Program using personnel with a distinctive uniform and insignia to aid regular police officers by performing community services associated with law enforcement, conducting crime prevention activities, assisting youth in the neighborhood, and undertaking other duties to improve relations between the community and the Police Department, and through such community services activities and training, developing potential police officers, and in connection therewith the following positions are hereby established in the Police Department with the duties and with the salary or salary scale indicated:

Thirty-five (35) Community Service Officer positions, to assist the Police Department and City residents by performing community services associated with law enforcement activities, at a starting monthly salary of \$524 with successive increments at 6-month intervals to \$582-\$612-\$641-\$670-\$699;

One (1) Program Coordinator, charged with administration of job training and coordination of the Community Service Officer Program under supervision

of an Assistant Chief of Police, at a monthly salary of One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$1,100);

One (1) Educational Specialist, responsible for the academic training of Community Service Officers, at a monthly salary of One Thousand Eighty-three Dollars (\$1,083);

Two (2) additional positions of Sergeant at the compensation provided for like positions in Ordinance 99575;

Two (2) Counselors, with the duty to advise, orient, and assist Community Service Officers and perform other assigned tasks, at a monthly salary of Nine Hundred Ninety-five Dollars (\$995);

One (1) position of Stenographer-Clerk II at the compensation provided for like positions in Ordinance 99575;

all of such duties being more fully described in C.F. 268625, and the Chief of Police is authorized to fill said positions, subject to civil service laws and rules, provided that affirmative action shall be taken to insure that:

- (a) residents of the Model Neighborhood Area and present Public Safety Trainees assigned to the Police Department are given maximum opportunities for training and employment in the Community Service Officer, Program Coordinator, Educational Specialist and Counselor positions herein established and made possible by or resulting from funds

received from the United States of America, pursuant to the "Grant Agreement for a Comprehensive City Demonstration Program" contained in C.F. 264621; and

- (b) in the recruiting of applicants for Community Service Officer positions appropriate steps will be taken to seek and encourage participation by persons at an economic or educational disadvantage as identified by federal standards to be set forth in the interdepartmental memorandum authorized in Section 3 hereof;

all as recommended by the Mayor in C.F. 268625.

Section 2. Upon appointment of an incumbent Public Safety Trainee assigned to the Police Department to a position of Community Service Officer or upon a vacancy otherwise occurring in a position of Public Safety Trainee assigned to the Police Department, such position of Public Safety Trainee in the Police Department shall be abrogated, and the number of such Public Safety Trainee positions in the Executive Department, Personnel Office, and assigned to the Police Department shall be reduced accordingly.

Section 3. The Chief of Police and the Model Cities Director are hereby authorized to adopt a joint memorandum incorporating the terms and conditions under which the Community Service Officer Program shall be administered, consistent with this ordinance and with the "Grant Agreement for a Comprehensive City Demonstration Program"

contained in C.F. 264621 and substantially conforming with and implementing the Community Service Officer Program as outlined in C.F. 268625, including such terms as reimbursement of costs and expenses of the Community Service Officer Program, evaluation and monitoring and advisory responsibility, and recruitment and orientation of personnel.

Section 4. The Chief of Police is authorized to contract for the services of an accountant and to contract with the Seattle Opportunity Industrialization Center (SOIC), New Careers and/or other appropriate corporations for the recruitment, orientation and training of personnel for the Community Service Officer Program upon such terms and conditions as the Chief of Police and the Director of Model Cities shall specify in the interdepartmental memorandum authorized in Section 3 above.

Section 5. Any act pursuant to the authority and prior to the effective date of this ordinance is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Section 6. That Ordinances 99575 and 95766 and all other ordinances to the extent inconsistent herewith are hereby superseded.

Section ⁷..... This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its passage and approval, if approved by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect at the time it shall become a law under the provisions of the city charter.



Section 4.
