WHEREAS, drafts of the principles were presented for review by the general public at two waterfront planning forums sponsored jointly by the Planning and Design Commissions in June and November of 2003; and

WHEREAS, the draft principles received further review through September and October, 2003 by technical discussion groups comprised of waterfront experts representing public agencies and other public and private interests charged with identifying key issues to be addressed in the waterfront plan; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the City's work with the community, the City has developed the current version of the principles to guide the development of the Central Waterfront Plan; and

WHEREAS, the principles address the following issues: 1) balance and integration; 2) access and connection; 3) authenticity and identity; 4) destination and movement; 5) diversity and flexibility; 6) economic development; and 7) environmental sustainability; NOW THEREFORE,
