RESOLUTION 30874

A RESOLUTION supporting the naming of a park in honor of rock and roll legend Jimi Hendrix.

WHEREAS, James Marshall Hendrix, universally known as Jimi Hendrix, was born on November 27, 1942, to parents Al Hendrix and Lucille Jeter Hendrix in Seattle's King County Hospital; and

WHEREAS, Jimi Hendrix grew up in Seattle's Central District, a predominantly African American neighborhood, where he taught himself to play the guitar as a teenager; and

WHEREAS, despite not knowing how to read or write music, Jimi Hendrix became a 20th Century rock and roll legend in his short-lived but long-celebrated musical career, pioneering electric guitar through an innovative combination of fuzz, feedback and controlled distortion that created a revolutionary musical art form; and

WHEREAS, since his death nearly 36 years ago, the City of Seattle has yet to establish a fitting tribute to honor the significant historical and cultural contributions of Jimi Hendrix, one of its most famous native sons; and

WHEREAS, the Urban League Village, in historic Colman School located at 2400 S. Massachusetts Street in Seattle's Central District and home to the Northwest African American Museum, will open its doors in 2007; and

WHEREAS, the Northwest African American Museum will serve as a cultural and historical center celebrating Seattle's African American traditions and innovations in art, education, music, history and culture in Seattle and beyond; and

WHEREAS, in 2000, the voters of Seattle approved the Pro Parks Levy, an eight-year program to raise \$198 million in funds to improve Seattle's parks and recreation system; and

WHEREAS, in 2003, \$309,000 was allocated from the Pro Parks Levy for the Colman School Parking Lot redevelopment project, the site of the old Colman School playground that is adjacent to the Northwest African American Museum at the Urban League Village; and

WHEREAS, redevelopment of the site is underway and suggestions are currently being considered for naming the park; and

1 WHEREAS, Michael Malone, founder of AEI Music Network, Incorporated and owner of a
2 bronze statue of Jimi Hendrix presently located on Broadway near Pine Street, is willing
3 to present the statue to the City of Seattle, so that the statue can be integrated into the park
and village design, which may include additional art honoring Jimi Hendrix; and

4 WHEREAS, Experience Hendrix, the Hendrix family organization, the Northwest African
5 American Museum, the Urban League of Metropolitan Seattle, AEI Music Network and
6 other groups support creating a lasting tribute to Jimi Hendrix with a park in his name;
and

7 WHEREAS, creating a Jimi Hendrix Park adjacent to Sam Smith Park and the Northwest
8 African American Museum would be a fitting tribute to the Hendrix legacy; and


9 WHEREAS, the Seattle City Council acknowledges the authority of the Superintendent of Parks
10 and Recreation to name parks and recognizes the process, which includes
11 recommendations from the Parks and Recreation Naming Committee and a final decision
by the Superintendent; NOW, THEREFORE,

12 **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE, THAT:**

13 Section 1. The Seattle City Council supports the naming of the park being created at the
14 Colman School Lot in honor of Jimi Hendrix and encourages the Parks Naming Committee and
15 the Parks Superintendent, while carrying out the Parks and Recreation Naming Committee
16 Policy, to recognize the cultural contributions of Jimi Hendrix by considering naming this park in
17 his honor.
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19 Section 2. The Seattle City Council acknowledges that the relocation of the Jimi Hendrix
20 statue will require the assistance of the City of Seattle, Office of Arts and Cultural Affairs and
21 the Northwest African American Museum and, further, urges the appropriate City agencies to
22 work with the museum and other parties to help facilitate relocation efforts by providing
23 appropriate resources for the placement of the Jimi Hendrix statue in this park.

Legislation Title: A RESOLUTION supporting the naming of a park in honor of rock and roll legend Jimi Hendrix.

Summary and background of the Legislation:

Seattle City Council supports the naming of the park being created at the Colman School parking lot in honor of "Jimi Hendrix" and encourages the Parks Naming Committee and the Parks Superintendent to recognize his significant world-wide cultural contributions by considering naming this park in his honor.

The Seattle City Council acknowledges that the relocation of the Jimi Hendrix statue will require assistance from the City's Office of Arts and Cultural Affairs and the Northwest African American Museum (NAAM) and requests the appropriate City agencies to work with NAAM and other parties to help facilitate relocation efforts by providing appropriate resources for the relocation the Jimi Hendrix statue in this park.

This project, part of the 2000 Parks Levy, improves the Colman School parking lot, formerly an unused 20,000 square foot, asphalt area near the I-90. Prior to that, the lot was the site of the old Colman School playground and is adjacent to the Northwest African American Museum at the Urban League Village. \$309,000 from the Pro Parks Levy was allocated in 2003 for paving and landscaping improvements and enhanced connections to Sam Smith Park.
