2 A RESOLUTION establishing the City's intention to provide technical assistance to the Central  
3 Area Motivation Program (CAMP) in order to allow CAMP to continue providing

6 WHEREAS, in the spring of 1964 a group of motivated central area residents and friends began  
7 mobilizing around anti-poverty issues, compelling the formation in 1965 of the Central  
8 Area Motivation Program (CAMP); and

9  
10 WHEREAS, through the efforts of many, CAMP became the service arm of the Seattle Civil  
11 Rights Movement in Seattle during those first prolific years, growing to over 300  
12 employees in the summer of 1967 and encompassing a huge corps of volunteers; and

13  
14 WHEREAS, the mission of CAMP is to reduce the impact of poverty on families and individuals  
15 by providing services and promoting institutional and community change through  
16 advocacy; and

17  
18 WHEREAS, over its 40 year tenure in Seattle, CAMP has at various times provided programs to  
19 address homelessness, employment and training for the unemployed, education for at-risk  
20 students, food for the hungry, and financial assistance for hundreds of needy families  
21 needing heat in the winter; and

23 WHEREAS, CAMP currently provides food bank services and assistance for income-eligible  
24 families and individuals in obtaining, conserving, and maintaining adequate energy  
25 resources;



1 WHEREAS, CAMP is undertaking bold efforts to realign its Board and leadership structure to  
2 ensure the best level of services to the poor and disadvantaged; and

4 WHEREAS, successful implementation of these reforms will allow CAMP to continue to offer  
5 food and other forms of necessary support to the poor and disadvantaged of Seattle; and

7 WHEREAS, the City of Seattle would like to ensure that CAMP continues to serve the central  
8 area community to the best of its ability; NOW, THEREFORE,


10 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE, THE MAYOR

16 identify short term challenges and to embark on a long term strategic planning process.  
17 Assistance may include, but shall not be limited to, board leadership and development consistent  
18 with agency by-laws, financial management, grants management, fund development, and  
19 program evaluation and development. Such assistance will be provided through the Department  
20 of Human Services organizational capacity program for non-profit organizations.



The Mayor and Council intend for this assistance to enable CAMP to provide more effective and efficient services to poor and disadvantaged Seattle residents.

CAMP currently provides food bank services and assistance for income-eligible families and individuals in obtaining, conserving, and maintaining adequate energy resources.

The City has funded technical assistance and capacity building assistance to community-based non-profit organizations for a number of years, and funding is on-going through 2008.


