A RESOLUTION adopting the Seattle Food Action Plan

Summary of the Legislation:

Resolution adopting the city-wide Seattle Food Action Plan, which provides a framework for enhancing Seattle's food system.

Background:

The Seattle Food Action Plan was created in 2012 to develop a Citywide interdepartmental strategy that identifies goals and actions to help increase access to local and healthy food for Seattle residents while supporting public health, enhancing our environment, strengthening our economy, building community, and advancing racial and social equity.

The Food Action Plan includes action strategies for increasing access to healthy, affordable, local, sustainable, culturally appropriate food; expanding opportunities to grow food in Seattle and in our region; strengthening local and healthy food related businesses; and preventing food related waste. The approach to these actions includes interdepartmental and intergovernmental collaboration, a focus on racial and social equity, inclusive engagement, and the use of data to assess conditions, inform priorities, and track progress.
