Legislation Title:

A RESOLUTION confirming that the City of Seattle's core value of race and social equity is one of the foundations on which the Comprehensive Plan is built.

Summary and background of the Legislation:

This resolution will confirm that the Race and Social Equity Core Value is one of the foundations on which the City of Seattle's Comprehensive Plan is built.

Background:

In 1994, Seattle was a national leader when it made Social Equity one of the four Core Values in the original Comprehensive Plan and with this legislation we will continue to be a leader.

Seattle is in an enviable position. It is an attractive place with a strong economy and people continue to move here. As we continue to grow it is important that we put in place policies and investments to help ensure Seattle is a city that plans for its people, one of its most important assets. It is time to put an emphasis on equity in planning. This means the City must find way to develop policies, programs and projects that discourage displacement and encourage community stability while improving peoples' ability to flourish. By making Race and Social Equity the foundation for our work, we will be a city in which everyone can reach their full potential. By making everyone strong the City will be stronger. This resolution describes four changes to how we plan for our future:

- We will all work toward a shared vision of race and social equity, and equitable growth citywide.
- We will incorporate new race and social equity goals and policies in all elements of our work.
- We will analyze the impacts of proposed growth strategies on our vulnerable communities, and we will change policies, programs and investments to help offset the impacts of the selected growth strategy.
- We will create, monitor and report on equity measures.

Approving this Resolution will help make Seattle a city in which everyone can achieve their full potential regardless of race or means.
