Dear Council President Conlin:

I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill that approves a total of \$300,000 in Technology Matching Funds for 24 community projects. The proposed projects were selected from 53 applications reviewed by the Citizens' Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Board (CTTAB). The projects to be funded will provide digital opportunities for a wide range of residents in need, including at-risk youth, immigrants and refugees, seniors, and people with disabilities. These projects will reach more than 15,000 residents providing employment, life skills, and English as Second Language (ESL) training, foster civic engagement and community building using technology, and help guide residents to online resources for housing, education and healthcare. In addition to basic computing and Internet applications, participants will be building their skills in assistive technologies, audio, video, and digital arts. These projects further the City's commitment to supporting youth and families, inclusive public engagement and race and social justice.

Resolution 29673 established the Technology Matching Fund to make matching grants to eligible organizations for the purpose of promoting citizen access to information technology and literacy in using technology, and to apply technology to foster civic engagement. While access to technology has increased for many, our recent Seattle Technology Access and Adoption study still shows a troubling gap in access and the literacy skills that are essential for full participation in our digital society. The projects selected by CTTAB for funding serve to minimize this gap and further our efforts to make Seattle a city of digital inclusion, rather than exclusion.

Thank you for your consideration of this legislation. The increased access, skills training and services to be provided by these funds will make a great difference in the lives of residents in need. Should you have questions, please contact Chief Technology Officer Bill Schrier at 684-0633.

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**ORDINANCE \_\_\_\_\_**

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Technology Matching Fund Program; making allocations and authorizing implementation of certain Technology Matching Fund projects in 2010; providing that 2010 appropriations for the Technology Matching Fund from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the Information Technology Fund shall automatically carry forward into the 2011 fiscal year; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts.

WHEREAS, the City of Seattle has determined that it is important to enable digital equity and provide opportunity for all its residents, including sufficient access to electronic information, technology literacy, and the application of technology for civic engagement; and

WHEREAS Resolution 29673 established a Technology Matching Fund Program for such purposes and identified project selection criteria and a process for selecting projects; and

WHEREAS, the City of Seattle has appropriated \$300,000 in the 2010 Adopted Budget from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the Information Technology Fund for the Community Technology Program to implement Technology Matching Fund projects; and

WHEREAS, the Citizens' Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Board (CTTAB) has recommended projects for funding, and the Chief Technology Officer (CTO) concurs with those recommendations; NOW, THEREFORE,

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:**

Section 1. The Mayor or his designee is hereby authorized to proceed with implementation of the following 24 projects on behalf of the City:

3 Section 3. Any portion of \$300,000 allocated to the Technology Matching Fund Program  
4 from the appropriation made from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund for the Cable Fee  
5 Support to Information Technology Fund Budget Control Level (D160B) and from the  
6 appropriation made from the Information Technology Fund for the Office of Electronic  
7 Communications Budget Control Level (D4400) in the 2010 Adopted Budget, not spent or  
8 encumbered in 2010, shall not lapse at the end of the 2010 fiscal year but shall automatically  
9 carry over into the 2011 fiscal year until fully expended, abandoned or reappropriated to other  
10 authorized activities; provided, however, that the appropriations shall lapse at the end of the 2011  
11 fiscal year unless carried over further by a future ordinance.

14 Section 4. Any acts done consistent with and after the passage and prior to the effective  
15 date of this ordinance are hereby ratified and confirmed.

16 Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days from and after its  
17 approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after  
18 presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

**Legislation Title:**

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Technology Matching Fund Program; making allocations and authorizing implementation of certain Technology Matching Fund projects in 2010; providing that 2010 appropriations for the Technology Matching Fund from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the Information Technology Fund shall automatically carry forward into the 2011 fiscal year; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts.

• **Summary of the Legislation:**

This legislation authorizes the disbursement of \$300,000 from the Department of Information Technology, Office of Electronic Communications Budget Control Level (D4400), Community Technology Program to 24 grantees for the purpose of increasing residents' technology access and literacy, and for increasing civic engagement using information technologies. These funds are appropriated in the 2010 Adopted Budget from the Cable Television Franchise Subfund and from the Information Technology Fund. The projects to be funded will provide digital opportunities for a wide range of residents in need, including at-risk youth, immigrants and refugees, seniors, and people with disabilities. Reaching more than 15,000 residents, the projects will provide employment, life skills, and English as Second Language (ESL) training, foster civic engagement and community building using technology, and help guide residents to online resources for housing, education and healthcare. In addition to basic computing and Internet applications, participants will be building their skills in assistive technologies, audio, video, and digital arts.

• **Background:** *(Include brief description of the purpose and context of legislation and include record of previous legislation and funding history, if applicable):*

Resolution 29673 established the Technology Matching Fund (TMF) to make matching grants to eligible organizations for the purpose of promoting citizen access to information technology and literacy in using technology, and to apply technology to foster civic engagement. The resolution established project eligibility and selection criteria, with the proviso that additional requirements may be established as necessary by the Chief Technology Officer (CTO), in consultation with the Citizens' Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Board (CTTAB), to ensure projects meet the program goals and are consistent with other City contracting and financial accountability rules and regulations.

The TMF awarded \$1,850,832 for 153 projects between 1998 and 2009. The maximum allowable award per project by legislation is \$50,000; the current maximum award per project is



\$20,000. The current maximum award was set in order to ensure that a greater number of projects could be supported by the TMF. In 2010, \$300,000 is available for these grants. No additional funding is required, as the funds were appropriated in the 2010 Adopted Budget and the revenue was generated from cable television franchise fees.

The City's contribution to the organizations receiving grants will be matched by the community through cash, donations of hardware, software and supplies and labor. A one-to-one match is required; however, the community contribution is often greater than the City's support. This year's projects are expected to provide more than \$506,825 in community matching resources.

The CTO is required to submit recommendations for funding to the City Council for approval. Recommendations for funding projects are made to the CTO by CTTAB. This year five current members and one former member of CTTAB served on the TMF Application Review Committee. A summary of the projects recommended for funding is provided in the table below.
