Dear Council President Conlin:

I am pleased to transmit the attached proposed Council Bill that authorizes both the Director of Housing and the Superintendent of Seattle City Light to accept over a million dollars in Enron Corporation legal settlement revenues from the State of Washington and Puget Sound Energy. Approximately \$230,000 of these funds will be used by the Office of Housing's HomeWise Program, to further support low-income residential weatherization assistance in 2010. The remainder of the funds, over \$790,000, will be used to support Seattle City Light's Emergency Low Income Assistance or Project Share programs, which help to reduce heating expenses for low-income households.

In 2005, the Attorney General of the State of Washington reached a legal settlement with the Enron Corporation over the cost to Washington taxpayers of Enron's manipulation of energy markets in 2000 and 2001. Due to the impracticality of providing refund to individual ratepayers, the Attorney General determined that the settlement funds would be used to support low-income residential weatherization programs or residential low-income energy assistance. While Seattle City Light received a direct allocation, due to the residential population it serves, Puget Sound Energy (PSE) was awarded \$2.1 million of the total Enron settlement. Of the funds allocated to PSE, the Office of Housing was one of 11 community service agencies granted funds to administer weatherization program on PSE's behalf. The program assists homeowners in saving energy and provides employment opportunities to small construction contractors who complete energy-saving home improvement measures on contract with the City.

This legislation will accept funding that increases the City's ability to better serve Seattle's low-income residents hit the hardest by the energy crisis and the current economic recession. 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ORDINANCE _____

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AN ORDINANCE accepting Enron Corporation legal settlement revenues from the State of Washington and Puget Sound Energy; authorizing related agreements; amending the 2010 Adopted Budget to increase appropriations for the Office of Housing and the City Light Department; and ratifying and confirming prior acts; all by a three-fourths vote of the City Council.

WHEREAS, the Attorney General of the State of Washington reached a legal settlement with the Enron Corporation in 2005 over the cost to Washington ratepayers of Enron's manipulation of energy markets in 2000 and 2001, and subsequently determined that the settlement funds will be used to support residential low-income energy assistance or low-income residential weatherization; and

WHEREAS, Puget Sound Energy received approximately \$2.1 million from the 2005 settlement, based upon the number of customers it serves, and intends to apply the funds to its 2010 low-income weatherization program; and

WHEREAS, Puget Sound Energy has awarded the City of Seattle's HomeWise Program with a sub-recipient grant of \$238,442 for low-income weatherization services, which Puget Sound Energy requires the City to disburse by no later than December 31, 2010; and

WHEREAS, the City Light Department has received \$793,539 from the Washington State Attorney General's office, relating to the settlement from the Enron Corporation, because City Light customers were impacted by the 2000-2001 energy crisis rate increase, and intends to apply the funds to certain residential accounts via low-income program(s);
NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Director of Housing, or his or her designee ("Director") is authorized to accept funding from Puget Sound Energy in up to the amount listed below, and to execute, deliver, and perform on behalf of The City of Seattle agreements that the Director reasonably deems necessary for the receipt of the funds and to carry out the purpose for those funds described below. The acceptance by the Superintendent of City Light, or his or her designee ("Superintendent") of funds from Washington State Attorney General's Office in the amount set



1 forth below and the execution by the Superintendent of an agreement accepting the funds are
2 ratified and confirmed, and the Superintendent is authorized to execute, deliver, and perform on
3 behalf of The City of Seattle any other agreements that the Superintendent reasonably deems
4 necessary related to the receipt of the funds and to carry out the purpose for those funds
5 described below. The money accepted under this section shall be deposited in the receiving
6 funds identified below to support, or as reimbursement for, the corresponding appropriations set
7 forth in Section 2 of this ordinance.

19 **Section 2.** Contingent, as to the Office of Housing, upon the execution of the grant or
20 other funding agreement with Puget Sound Energy as authorized in Section 1, the appropriations
21 for the following items in the 2010 Budget are increased from the funds shown, as follows:

Unspent funds so appropriated shall carry forward to subsequent years until they are exhausted or abandoned by ordinance.

Section 3. Any act authorized by this ordinance and taken after its passage is ratified and confirmed.

Section 4. The foregoing appropriations are made to meet actual necessary expenditures of the City for which insufficient appropriations have been made due to causes which could not have been foreseen at the time of the making of the 2010 Budget, in accordance with RCW 35.32A.060.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days from and after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE accepting Enron Corporation legal settlement revenues from the State of Washington and Puget Sound Energy; authorizing related agreements; amending the 2010 Adopted Budget to increase appropriations for the Office of Housing and the City Light Department; and ratifying and confirming prior acts; all by a three-fourths vote of the City Council.

- **Summary of the Legislation:** This legislation authorizes the acceptance of funds, made available through Washington's State's 2005 legal settlement with the Enron Corporation, to the Office of Housing's HomeWise low-income weatherization program and to Seattle City Light's Emergency Low Income Assistance or Project Share programs. Both department's 2010 Adopted Budgets are increased to authorize expenditures of these funds.
- **Background:** The Attorney General of the State of Washington reached a legal settlement with the Enron Corporation in 2005 over the cost to Washington ratepayers of Enron's manipulation of energy markets in 2000 and 2001. Over \$9 million was disbursed state-wide to programs benefitting utility customers affected by the energy crisis. Due to the impracticality of providing refunds to individual ratepayers, the Attorney General determined that the settlement funds will be used to support residential low-income energy assistance or low-income residential weatherization. The City of Seattle will receive funds to support both types of programs.

The State awarded \$2.1 million of the total Enron settlement to Puget Sound Energy (PSE), based upon the number of customers served by the utility, to provide additional funding of its low-income weatherization program. The Office of Housing, through its HomeWise Program, is one of 11 community service agencies that administers a weatherization program under a contract with PSE. The HomeWise Program assists homeowners in saving energy and provides employment opportunities to small construction contractors who complete energy-saving home improvement measures on contract with the City. This legislation authorizes the acceptance by the Office of Housing of \$238,442 of grant funds, and authorizes the Director of Housing to enter into a community agency service agreement with PSE for expenditure of the grant funds.

Based on the residential populations it serves, the City Light Department or Seattle City Light (SCL) was determined eligible by the Washington State Attorney



General, along with other Washington utilities, to receive a direct allocation of the Enron Corporation settlement award. SCL's allocation totals \$793,539 and will be used to support its Emergency Low Income Assistance or Project Share programs. These program help reduce heating expenses for households by applying credits directly to the SCL residential customers accounts. Both programs provide one-time payment assistance for eligible low-income residential customers facing electrical disconnection. SCL may also use a portion of the funds to support its weatherization programs. This legislation authorizes Superintendent of Seattle City Light to accept this award amount.

Announcement of the sub-grants came too late for the grant funds to be included in either departments' 2010 Adopted Budget. The grant award requires that the funds be expended by no later than December 31, 2010.
