

Both of these organizations operate on national and international level to serve the interest of the people of Nepali origin.

Pradeepta Upadhyay is a Planning and Development Director with over fourteen years of experience working in the areas of community development and health and human services. Recently, she was Director of Programs for the South Asian Network (SAN), a grassroots community organization based in Artesia, CA, she worked extensively on social justice and health care issues faced by immigrant communities (with a particular focus on South Asian communities). As the founder of Women's Inspiration Community, a nonprofit organization in her hometown of Katmandu, Nepal, she successfully planned and implemented HIV/AIDS education programs for at-risk groups, reproductive health programs for rural women, gender sensitization programs for men, and income generation programs aimed at empowering rural communities.
