RESOLUTION 31220

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2 A RESOLUTION relating to rental housing and the City's efforts to improve the quality of rental
3 housing, requesting that the Department of Planning and Development report back to the
4 Council by July 1, 2011 on its efforts to utilize the inspection warrant authority recently
5 granted by State law.

6 WHEREAS, there has been consistent growth in the amount of rental housing within the City of
7 Seattle, estimated in the 2000 Census as exceeding 51% of the housing stock; and

8 WHEREAS, the City intends that rental housing meet basic life, health and safety standards and
9 therefore has adopted the Seattle Housing and Building Maintenance Code (Seattle
10 Municipal Code 22.200); and

11 WHEREAS, the City expends significant effort to provide that all housing, regardless of
12 ownership, meets or exceeds City and state codes governing building and life safety
13 construction, fire safety, energy consumption, sanitation, electrical services and other
14 such considerations; and

15 WHEREAS, despite the demonstrated commitment to responsible ownership by the majority of
16 rental housing owners, the City continues to experience problems caused by poor
17 maintenance of and failure to comply with basic life, health and safety standards in its
18 rental housing stock; and

19 WHEREAS, the City has an interest in preserving the stock of rental housing and the long term
20 health of its rental housing market; and

21 WHEREAS, the City finds that the existence of substandard and unsanitary rental units are a
22 detriment to the physical, social and economic stability of all housing in the City of
23 Seattle and the health and welfare of the citizens of the City of Seattle; and

24 WHEREAS, in 2007 the City Council commissioned a study to gauge the effectiveness of the
25 City's approach to housing code enforcement; and

26 WHEREAS, in 2008 the Cedar River Group presented the results of its study (known as the
27 Cedar River Study) to the City Council; and

28 WHEREAS, the Cedar River Study recommended that the City enhance its enforcement efforts
by, among other things, seeking State legislation to secure inspection warrant authority;
and



1 WHEREAS in 2010 the State Legislature authorized limited inspection warrant authority for
2 rental housing by passing SSB 6459, which will take effect on June 10, 2010; and

3 WHEREAS, the City Council would like to gauge the effectiveness of the new warrant authority
4 in improving the City's housing code enforcement efforts; NOW, THEREFORE,

5 **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE, THE
6 MAYOR CONCURRING, THAT:**


7 Section 1. Pursuant to the recommendation in the Cedar River Study and now that the
8 State Legislature has passed legislation authorizing inspection warrants for rental housing in
9 limited circumstances, the City Council requests that the Department of Planning and
10 Development (DPD) utilize the new inspection warrant authority whenever possible as a tool in
11 its toolbox of Housing Code enforcement efforts, and among other things, develop policies and
12 procedures for the use of the warrant authority and provide outreach and education to other
13 agencies and sources that might provide documentation of the conditions of rental properties that
14 could serve as the basis for seeking an inspection warrant.

16 Section 2. The City Council requests that DPD report back to the Council by July 1,
17 2011, evaluating the effectiveness during its first year of use of the new inspection warrant tool
18 in DPD's efforts to improve its Housing Code enforcement efforts.



Legislation Title:

A RESOLUTION relating to rental housing and the City’s efforts to improve the quality of rental housing, requesting that the Department of Planning and Development report back to the Council by July 1, 2011 on its efforts to utilize the inspection warrant authority recently granted by State law.

• **Summary of the Legislation:**

The resolution requests that the Department of Planning and Development (DPD) report to the City Council by July 1, 2011 on policies and procedures developed to implement an administrative warrant program in the City of Seattle. This resolution is intended to complement the rental housing licensing and inspection program authorized under Council Bill 116857. This resolution also complements work requested by Council in a separate resolution that requests that DPD develop a report to Council by February 1, 2011, in consultation with stakeholder groups, on at least 12 different issues affecting the implementation of the rental housing licensing and inspection program.

• **Background:** *(Include brief description of the purpose and context of legislation and include record of previous legislation and funding history, if applicable):*

The City has followed the issue of administrative warrant authority for many years, extending back to its initial program to regulate rental housing through a license and inspection program adopted in the 1980’s, later overturned in a series of lawsuits in the 1980’s and 1990’s. Administrative warrant authority, also known as civil warrant authority, allows a third party to report to City officials rental housing conditions that pose a threat to the life or safety of a tenant. Currently, authority to seek and obtain a warrant to inspect a property is only available to the City’s public safety officials (Fire and Police).

In 2007 the City Council commenced work to consider local implementation of a rental housing licensing and inspection program. The desire to implement such a program grew out of a mandatory rental housing licensing and inspection program adopted by the City of Pasco in 1997, upheld through a series of Court challenges. In 2007, the Council passed Resolution 31031, setting aside \$50,000 of Council funds to study options to adopt a local rental housing licensing and inspection program.



In 2008, the Cedar River Group was commissioned to develop this study. The study was provided to Council in February 2009. While the study recommended options that included the development of a mandatory rental housing licensing and inspection program, its primary recommendation was that the City seek administrative warrant authority from the State of Washington.

In 2010 the State Legislature passed SSB 6459, which sets forth the terms by which a local jurisdiction can adopt a Pasco-style rental housing licensing and inspection program. Included with the state legislation are provisions that allow for administrative warrant authority.

The work required under this resolution is expected to be performed under existing budget resources provided to DPD. It is expected that the work required to develop the report will require approximately .25FTE, distributed among existing staff, estimated at approximately \$16,000 in personnel costs (i.e., salary and benefits), excluding overhead. This may require reallocation of existing staff time and resources from other projects under DPD's work plan.
