

Summary of Qualifications

A proven track record of successfully working with low income and minority populations and stakeholders in Seattle and King County around issues of preventive health, built environment, human services, economic development, economic opportunity and civic engagement.

Strong quantitative and qualitative research and analysis skills. Oversaw and wrote multiple issue papers, technical reports and policy recommendations on challenges facing vulnerable and underrepresented populations.

Lead interdisciplinary teams on projects to streamline processes and systems for increasing access to physical activity and healthy foods for low income and minority populations disproportionately affected by chronic diseases.

Provide grant management, program coordination and fund development planning.

Worked collaboratively with immigrants and refugee community residents from 10+ countries as well as community and research partners to develop and implement a five-year Community Participatory Based Research Project to address health disparities and achieve policy and systems change in two public housing communities (High Point in West Seattle and Greenbridge in White Center).

- Developed and implemented community assessments and research plans and coordinated data collection. Built and maintained databases to track project impact. Conducted data analysis and produced reports and presentations for stakeholders including limited English speaking audiences.
- Led multilingual interdisciplinary teams cultivating cultural competency principles to implement interventions and conduct data collection.
- Developed multilingual and age diverse community action teams, established partnerships and committees with broad representation to develop and steer project collaboratively.

- Planned and implemented strategies to build community capacity, increase physical activity, social connections, and civic engagement impacting immigrant, refugees and vulnerable populations, such as gender and age-specific exercise and swimming, cultural celebrations, community forums and potlucks, health fairs, family nights, open houses, field trips and hiking trips and cooking classes.
- Coached community members to advocate for their needs for neighborhood safety, access to health, information and transportation and testified at public meetings and in front of the Seattle City Council.

High Point Survey Coordinator. March 2008 - March 2010

- Oversaw the data collection of a longitudinal multilingual research study of 400 residents at High Point in West Seattle to learn how changes in the built environment affect their health, social networks and job search.

High Point Family Center Program Coordinator. March 2008 - August 2008

- Developed and implemented the start-up of a City of Seattle funded community service center in the heart of High Point, a multicultural multilingual public housing community.
- Developed culturally relevant programs and established community partnerships to increase programming.

- Implemented a two year home visit curriculum with immigrant families in a US Department of Housing and Urban Development and Lead Hazard Control funded project to reduce asthma triggers in a public housing community through environmental changes and education.
