

<p><b>Comments:</b>  <b>Dori Cahn</b> has worked with immigrants and refugees in the Seattle area for many years, as a teacher and writer, and as a community activist. As a teacher of adult ESL and ABE learners, her students have come from all over the world. Through them she has learned a lot about what it means to come to the U.S. and start over, sometimes with literally nothing, and overcoming challenges way beyond learning language and understanding cultural norms. She has advocated for immigrants' rights, working with immigrant/refugee communities and community organizations, and writing about immigrant/refugee issues.</p> <p>When the U.S. began deporting Cambodian refugees back to Cambodia ten years ago, Dori was deeply involved in communicating with affected families about their legal and political options, and helped organize individuals to advocate for their community that was already struggling with poverty, low graduation rates, and family breakdowns. Dori was awed and honored by the efforts of so many members of that community. She still believes deportation of former refugees is a failure of U.S. policy and she continues to engage with this issue.</p> <p>In her role as an educator and advocate, Dori has worked with the Wing Luke Museum to create exhibits about deportation and refugee experiences, with the goal of educating all members of the Seattle area community about the challenges faced by those among us who were not born here. She is currently working on gathering oral histories of people who had experiences at the former Immigration Building on Airport Way from 1932 to 2004. She anticipates that these stories will tell us much about the society we have become and how we got here.</p> <p>Dori earned degrees from the University of Washington and the University of Michigan, as well as certifications in writing and teaching ESL from the University of Washington and Seattle University, respectively.</p>

I am currently working on gathering oral histories of people who had experiences at the former Immigration Building on Airport Way over the course of its life, from 1932 to 2004. These stories tell us much about the society we have become and how we got here, and I am excited to further develop this project.

I would be honored to work with the Commission on Immigrants and refugees as another outlet for advocating for, and educating about, immigrants and refugees in Seattle.
