A RESOLUTION relating to the 2005 Transportation Strategic Plan Update, adopted by Resolution 30790, and the Seattle Transit Plan: To Get Seattle Moving, adopted by Resolution 30799; and authorizing an amendment to the Transit Classification Map.

WHEREAS, by Resolution 26904, the City of Seattle adopted the Seattle Comprehensive Transportation Program (SCTP), a classification system for all Seattle streets; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 27152, the City of Seattle adopted revisions to the SCTP, Street Classification Guidelines and the Street Classification Maps, which included traffic, transit, truck, bicycle, pedestrian and boulevard classifications; and

WHEREAS, by Resolutions 30790 and 30799, the City of Seattle adopted the TSP and the Seattle Transit Plan, which incorporate an updated classification system for all Seattle streets including traffic, transit, truck, bicycle, and boulevard classifications; and

WHEREAS, by Resolutions 31367, the City of Seattle adopted the Transit Master Plan, which identified key corridors linking urban villages and established performance standards; and

WHEREAS, Metropolitan King County's Metro Transit has proposed routing changes that require revisions to the Transit Classification Map; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that periodic changes to Metro Transit's service are necessary for transit service to be responsive to changing conditions, and to maintain a high quality of transit service consistent with the TSP and Seattle Transit Plan; and

WHEREAS, these transit classification changes are consistent with the street classification guidelines found in the Seattle Transit Plan, which focus transit service on streets that are designed to withstand transit vehicle weights and with compatible surrounding land uses; and

WHEREAS, these transit classification changes support the goals and policies of the Seattle Comprehensive Plan, last amended by Ordinance 123854, as well as the strategies of the City's TSP and Seattle Transit Plan; NOW, THEREFORE,

Section 1. The Director of Transportation is hereby authorized to amend the Transit

Classification Map for the City of Seattle to classify the following streets as Minor Transit

Streets:

- a. 3rd Avenue NW between NW 103rd Street and NW Holman Road;
- b. 7th Avenue NW between NW Holman Road and NW 100th Place;
- c. NW 100th Street between 7th Avenue NW and NW 100th Place;
- d. West McGraw Street between 3rd Avenue West and 6th Avenue West;
- e. 11th Avenue NW between NW Leary Way and NW Ballard Way
- f. NW Ballard Way between 11th Avenue NW and NW Leary Way
- g. SW 106th Street between 35th Avenue SW and SW Seola Drive/30th Avenue SW;
- h. Henderson Place SW between SW Henderson Street and SW Barton Street;
- i. 8th Avenue SW between SW Barton Street and SW Roxbury Street;
- j. SW Genesee Street between Delridge Way SW and SW Avalon Way

Legislation Title:

A RESOLUTION relating to the 2005 Transportation Strategic Plan Update, adopted by Resolution 30790, and the Seattle Transit Plan: To Get Seattle Moving, adopted by Resolution 30799; and authorizing an amendment to the Transit Classification Map.

Summary of the Legislation:

In 2012, King County Metro approved routing changes that require revisions to the Transit Classification Map. The revisions to the Transit Classification Map are necessary to allow King County Metro to operate service on designated streets. Thirty street segments are proposed for reclassification. Of these thirty segments, fourteen segments are proposed as major transit streets, ten segments are proposed as minor transit streets and six segments are proposed as local transit streets. By adopting the revised Transit Classification Map, this will allow King County Metro to provide transit service that is consistent with the Seattle Transit Master Plan and support the goals and policies of the Seattle Comprehensive Plan.

Background:

The proposed legislation relates to the 2005 Transportation Strategic Plan, adopted by Resolution 30790, and the Seattle Transit Plan: To Get Seattle Moving, adopted by Resolution 30799, and authorizing an amendment to the Transit Classification Map. Seattle Comprehensive Transportation Program (SCTP) was adopted by Resolution 26904 and Resolution 27152 adopted revisions to the SCTP, Street Classifications Guidelines and the Street Classification Maps, which included traffic, transit, truck, bicycle pedestrian and boulevard classifications. Resolution 31367 adopted the Seattle Transit Master Plan which identified key corridors linking urban villages and established performance standards. In 2012, King County adopted routing changes that required revisions to the Transit Classification Map.


