Please list and describe any groups or organizations that you're currently involved with or that you plan to be involved with next year.

I currently take Arabic classes two days a week through One World Now and participate in weekly leadership workshops. I plan to continue taking the classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays next year. I also play recreational soccer in the fall and spring on the weekends. On my winter weekends I teach cross country skiing to kids. Finally I participate in International Club and the South African Pen Pal Club, both of which I plan to do next year.

1. Why do you want to become a member of the Seattle Youth Commission? I am eager to represent the voice of my Seattle peers. I think that the Seattle Youth Commission serves an important part in representing the interests of us local youth who otherwise don't have the opportunity to partake in government. I would like to help serve as part of the link between citizens and the elected officials. I would also like to broaden my perspective by working with youth from around the city. Through meeting people from other parts of the city, I can learn about the different issues facing different communities and work on giving back to my own part of the city and to others.

2. What issues are you passionate about in your community, and why? At my school, my involvement this year with the green team has made me conscious about how many resources we waste. That's why I'm interested in helping my community to reduce our consumption of resources. I think that encouraging people to recycle and compost is an important step in this process. My school has made an effort to show people how to properly dispose of their used products and make recycling cans more easily available. I would like to see these measures implemented at other local schools and community centers. I also have noticed that people travel very inefficiently to school. Many people drive alone to and from school when they could easily carpool with their neighbors or even better, walk or bike. Helping to set up a carpool

system or an incentive to travel by foot could help to solve this issue. Also taking a city bus is a great way to get to school, but often they aren't convenient. One thing I would like to help improve is the busing system to make it more accessible for students by changing the times or routes. Overall a lot of people just aren't aware of their polluting lifestyles and I want to help inform people to make small changes in their daily habits.

3. What are your greatest strengths, and in what areas would you like to improve? My greatest strength is that I like communicating with people and learning from them. I am always happy to meet new people and get to know them. One of the reasons I am learning Arabic and Spanish is so that I can communicate more effectively with people who speak those languages and gain a different perspective from speaking with them. I also consider my organizational skills a strength, I like to stay on top of homework and projects. Recently I have been able to improve these skills even more by taking a project management class at my school which has allowed me to learn how to manage projects among a larger group of people and has taught me valuable scheduling skills. A skill I would like to improve is my public speaking. I realize that being a good public speaker could also help me to further improve my strengths.

4. As a Youth Commissioner, you'll spend a lot of time working in groups. What's your most comfortable role in a group? When working in a group, I tend to take on the role of an organizer. I enjoy helping to oversee projects and ensure that all the separate parts are working on time and in unison. I think my project management skills have allowed me to take this position even more naturally. But I also like to take on an equal part in the project work as everyone else. I like to share my visions for the project and see if they can be combined with other peoples' for the best possible outcome. My favorite part of working in a group though is seeing how every individual's unique opinions converge in the process.
