Please list and describe any groups or organizations that you're currently involved with or that you plan to be involved with next year.

Currently I am singing in the Shades of Praise Gospel Choir, in my school's diversity Trust for Historic Preservation's Youth Summit, in my Church Youth Group, and will be speaking at the Juneteenth Festival in the Central Area, and will be spending a week in Yakima this summer building homes for Habitat for Humanity.

1. Why do you want to become a member of the Seattle Youth Commission? I want to be a part of the youth commission, because I care for the direction of the city and feel that I have something to offer.

2. What issues are you passionate about in your community, and why? The issues that I'm most passionate about in my community are preservation of my neighborhood's historic resources, equitable housing, and mass transit. I am a resident of Ballard but spend much time in Seattle's Central area and both areas have many historic resources that make the neighborhoods unique and interesting. Imagine if all the buildings in these areas were new. If that was so, these neighborhoods would not have the diverse range of styles represented that make walking down the block fascinating. More importantly my kids would not be able to experience our heritage by seeing homes and buildings from another era such as Ballard's Stimson Mill Office. These communities should be fair and equitable meaning that no matter what your income is you should be able to live in a densely populated area like Seattle. Finally both neighborhoods are close to downtown and I believe mass public transit is vital, because as oil prices and car loans become available to fewer people, more and more Americans will be squeezed out of personal transport (A CAR!!) and we need as society to invest in public mass transit.

3. What are your greatest strengths, and in what areas would you like to improve? My greatest strengths are being outgoing, persistent, and passionate about my concerns for my community. I would like to improve my communication skills in regard to making a case for something I believe in strongly so that I can inspire and persuade others.

4. As a Youth Commissioner, you'll spend a lot of time working in groups. What's your most comfortable role in a group? My role in the group is that I enjoy hearing what others have to say because it broadens my understanding on issues and ideas. But after I listen I like to voice my views too. In other words I am not a passive listener.
