She has been involved in technical aspects of pedestrian accessibility, beginning with award-winning research on sidewalk accessibility under the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act). Her graduate research thesis involved environmental and conceptual perception of urban space, specifically for the pedestrian in the streetscape, and how design of such spaces affects behavior and choice. In the past year Lydia moved to an address with a perfect 100 walk and transit score and has gone completely car-free, making 90% of her trips on foot. Lydia characterizes her passion as "walking in cities and making urban environments more walkable, thereby increasing all of the desirable quality of life factors." Lydia Heard

Lydia is a passionate public-realm urbanist with more than twenty years of experience in both physical and policy planning and research. She has worked in both the public and private sectors, including a range of independent consulting activities. With an extensive background in public speaking and seminar-style training, she presents possibilities to clients, to public officials, and to the citizenry utilizing graphic imagery, visualizations, and elements of both form-based and evidence-based design. An advocate of pedestrian usage in the public realm, she was involved in a decade-long ADA policy implementation and public education process, and in national award-winning accessible sidewalk research. She initiated a new method of correlating behaviors such as opportunistic crime to the design of urban spaces and is now looking at utilizing methods of pedestrian analysis to measure the positive impacts of urban design. Acting from belief that land use and transportation are key to many of the issues that cities face, Lydia seeks opportunities which encourage and allow people to enjoy a high quality of life in livable, walkable communities.

Research Interests

- Correlations between geometric measures of visibility and other environmental factors of public street space with crimes of opportunity
- Analysis of integration and accessibility measures of proposed pedestrian network improvements in order to increase walking trips, particularly in transit corridors and districts
- Integrating network measures of public street space with the framing land use, building and environmental characteristics for more full-spectrum analysis
